Rev. Jim Bozeman, pastor of the Plains First Baptist church, has announced his resignation effective Oct. 1.

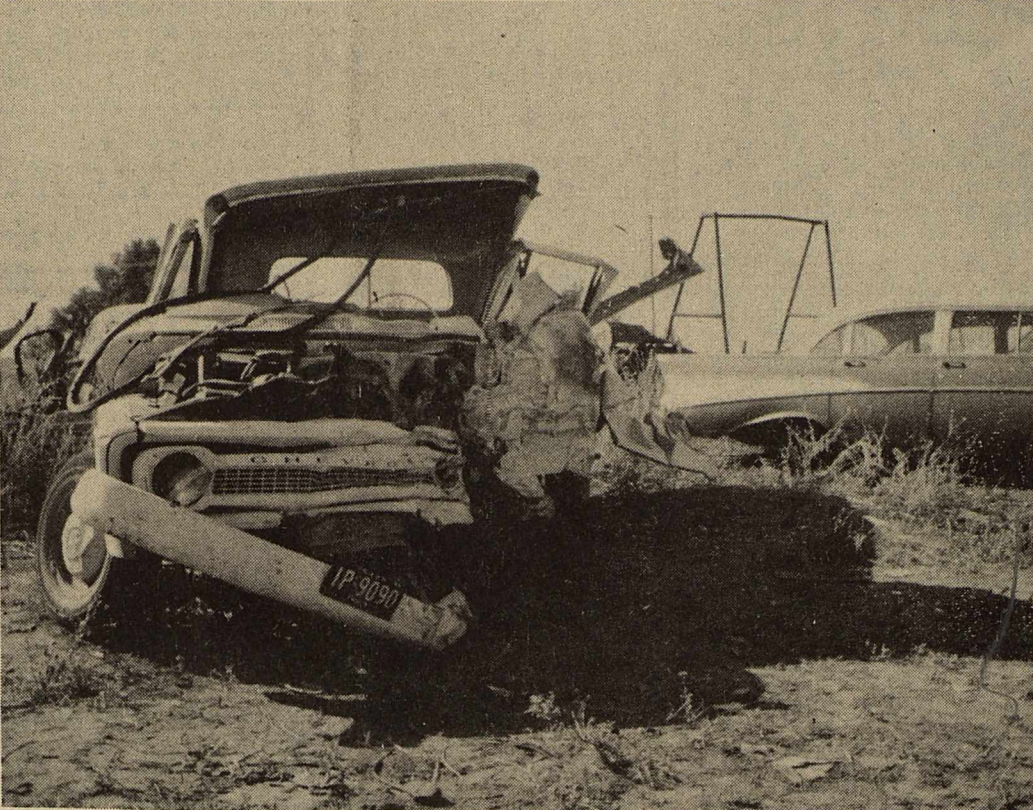
Rev. and Mrs. Bozeman have resided in Plains the past seven years.

# HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT OBSERVES SPECIAL WEEK

Our local Texas Highway Department is an integral part of a most important and efficient state organization which deals with the personal safety of each of us as residents of this state.

In addition to the excellent job our Department does to improve the safety and beauty of our highways, they furnish a tangible asset to our immediate community by representing an annual income into the local businesses of \$52,000.00 in salaries.

Our local department sees after a 178.8 mile stretch of our local highways maintaining to 15 miles to Cochran, the Bronco State line, and Denver City to Gaines County, to Terry County, and 1 mile west to Tokio.

They provide litter barrels saving tax money each year on picking up trash. They have mowers for right of ways and maintain the shoulders of the roads.

This year there will be 43 miles of seal coating for our local roads and re-topping with asphalt and gravel. There is also under investigation a direct communication with the New Mexico Highway Commission to obtain for the public immediate information on the conditions of roads during bad weather.

Safety is built into Texas highways just as surely and deliberately as bridges and drainage culverts.

That this policy pays off is proved by the decreasing fatality rate on the highways. In 1929, there were 17.5 fatalities for every 100 million vehicle miles driven. By 1967 this rate had been lowered 5.3 per 100 million miles driven.

One of the prime reasons highways are safer is because of the more than \$1 million invested annually on research by the Texas Highway Department. The reduced highway fatality rate can be traced directly to the application of research results to the design of new highways and the modification of older ones built in an age of fewer, less powerful vehicles.

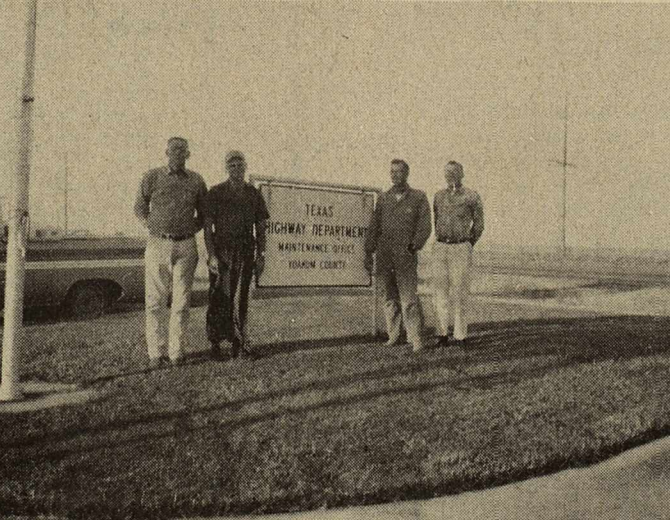
A rash of vehicle and sign collisions, some fatal, led to development in Texas of a sign structure that would yield on impact yet would withstand heavy winds and support large signs.

One of the features that most impress motorists in Texas is the abundance of roadside parks along the 68.5 thousand mile highway system.

Since winter, since one of every seven rest areas in the entire United States is in Texas.

The first invitation to Texas travelers to stop, rest and relax was issued by the Texas Highway Department back in the early '30's when the first roadside park greeted motorists on state Highway 71 in Fayette County.

Within a few years, nearly 500 parks were built by the

## Local Resident Loses Life in Accident

Two persons were killed in two separate accidents recently near Plains with three persons receiving injuries.

The first accident occurred at 6:45 p.m. Friday at 5 miles west of Plains on the State Line Road with L. J. Reagan, 34, of Denver City being pronounced dead on the scene by Justice of the Peace Hoyt Starling.

A passenger, Thomas L. Woodward, 22, also of Denver City, received slight injuries.

Highway patrolmen Joe Cox reported the one car accident resulted when Reagan lost control of the car when crossing Highway 82.

The 1958 Chevrolet ran off the road into the left ditch and back up on the road and then skidded sideways for about 100 yards before turning on its side and coming to rest on top. The driver was thrown about half way out of

the car, with the car coming to rest on the victim's head.

A two car accident at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, 1.2 miles west of Plains, resulted in fatal injuries for Lario Serda Arellano, 55.

A passenger, Francisco Alvarado, 44, in the 1964 Chevrolet pickup driven by Arellano received major injuries to the left leg along with cuts and bruises.

Arthur L. Wagnon, 26, of Lipon and driver of a 1962 Pontiac sedan, received minor cuts and bruises about the head and shoulders and face.

The accident occurred when the pickup, travelling east, met the sedan headon in the west bound lane.

The victim was reported to be a road construction employee while Wagnon is a custom combine worker. The injured victims were taken to the Yoakum county Hospital

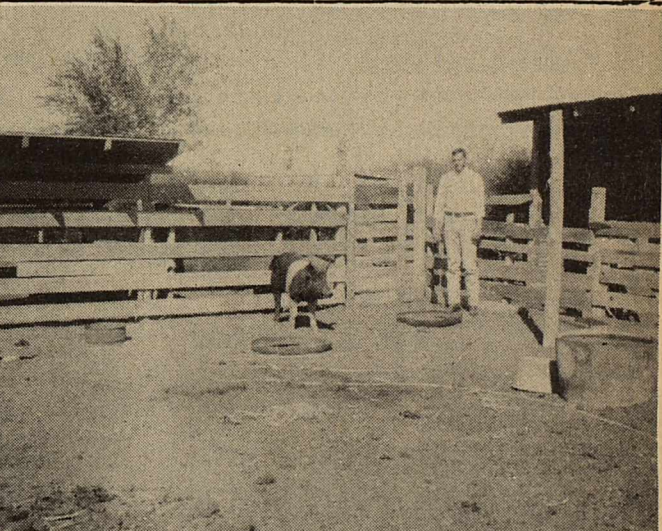
Burial was in the Brownfield Cemetery under the direction of Barrett's Funeral Home through cooperation with the Smith Funeral Home of Levelland.

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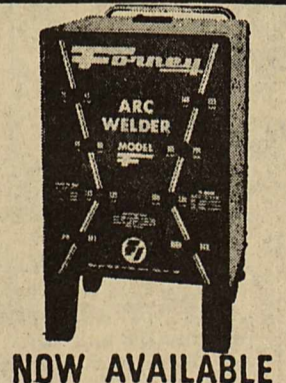

**SCHOOL NEWS**

Since there is more emphasis being placed on education everyday, and since the views of educators from all parts of the country have been the focal point of the country the focal point of news broadcasts and newspaper articles we wish to share with you a news bulletin from the Texas State Teachers Association in Austin. The report concerns a recent publication of the TSTA entitled, 'Where Texas Ranks: Vital Statistics About Our Standing in Public School Education.'

Texas State government and local school districts have made great strides in support of education during the past decade. But other states have been taking larger steps, the TSTA publication shows, leaving Texas with an education 'gap'.

The \$492 Texas now spends on each pupil is 61% more than 10 years ago. But the average increase for all states is 91% during the same period.

Texas population and school enrollment continue to grow faster than the nation as a whole while the gap in financial support of education widens.

This rapid population gain ranked Texas 14th among the states in rate of increase since 1960.

Texas ranks third in school enrollment this year.

Determining whether school children have qualified teachers is 'a job for people like you who pay the taxes and make education decisions,' a foreword in the TSTA publication directed to the public states.

Texas ranks 33rd among the states in average salary paid all public school teachers. The national average pay included all states with all kinds of living standards. Instructional staff salaries went up 48.4% in the last ten years but average increase for all states was 61%.

Pupil-teacher ratio is one indication of teacher overloading and crowded classrooms. Texas last year had a ratio of 24.2 pupils per teacher, slightly worse than the 24.1 average. But 30 other states

had better conditions and South Dakota led with only 18.6 pupils per teacher. This is an average attendance figure.

Dropouts and high school graduates are another indicator of the end result in education. Last year Texas ranked 42nd by graduating only 70.2 per cent of the students who started the ninth grade four years earlier! National average was 77.8 percent.

This article will provide food for thought for the Texas educators and the public.

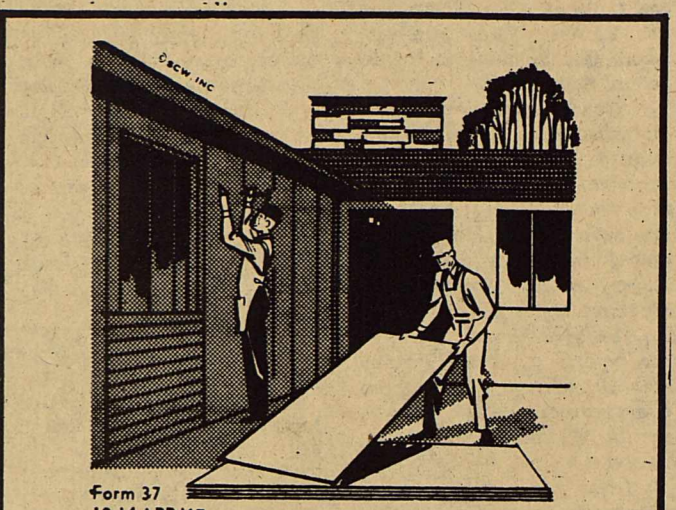

The first interstate safety rest area was dedicated in May 1963. Four years later, the first one incorporating rest rooms and travel information display units was completed on Interstate 35. Eventually there will be a safety rest area on each side of the interstate lanes an average of every 37 miles, and where water is available rest room facilities will be provided.

Whatever their style, Texas roadside parks have only one purpose: to provide a safe place in attractive surroundings where a motorist may stop to relax, for a few minutes or for a leisurely lunch, and then drive on refreshed. A rested driver is an alert driver, one less likely to be involved in an accident. Roadside parks, therefore, play an important role in the Highway Department's crusade for highway safety.

The convenient safety rest areas, roadside parks and scenic turnouts along Texas highways are pleasant reminders during 'Highway Week' and throughout the year—that 'Highways Are For People'.

At TTL studies continue in the fields of highway lighting, freeway traffic control, rail-highway grade crossings, and vehicle impact attenuation.

A group of interlocked barrels made of steel have been placed in the gore in front of the concrete walls of abutments, etc., to decrease the energy of a colliding vehicle by successive crushing of the barrels. Highway Department and TTL engineers will study the success of this device under day-to-day traffic before further installations are



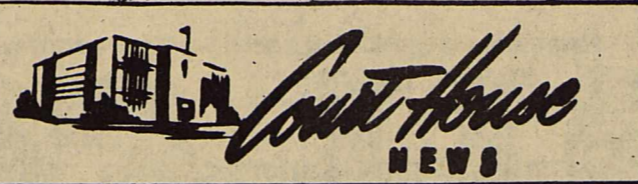
PLAINS COWBOY BAND WINS THIRD

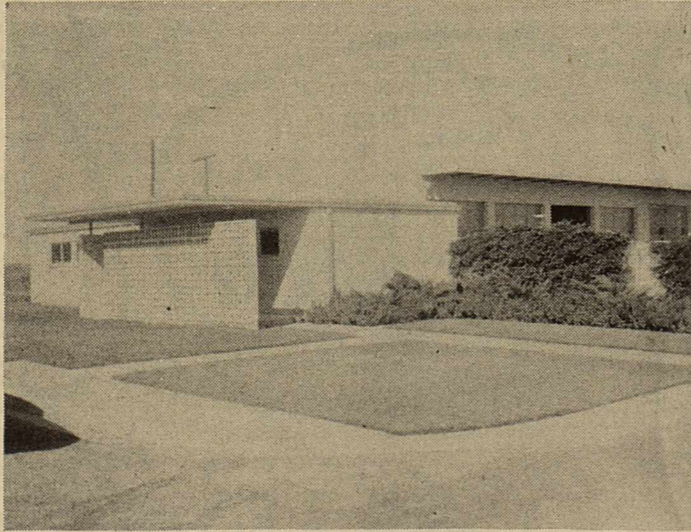
