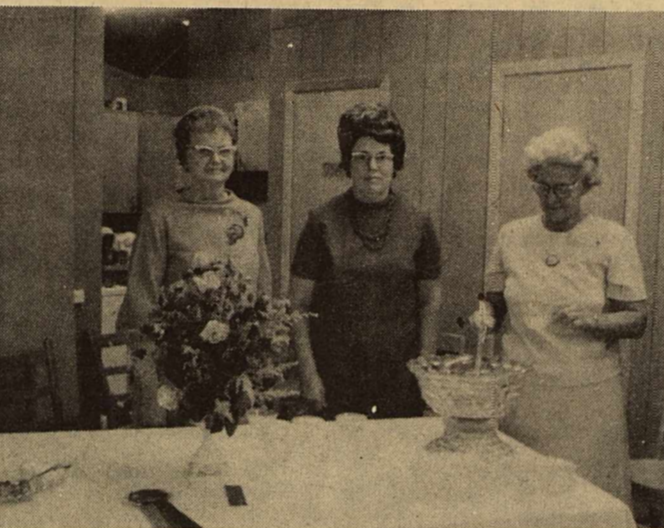
DENVER CITY HOMECOMING

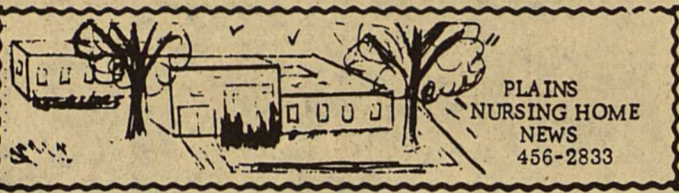

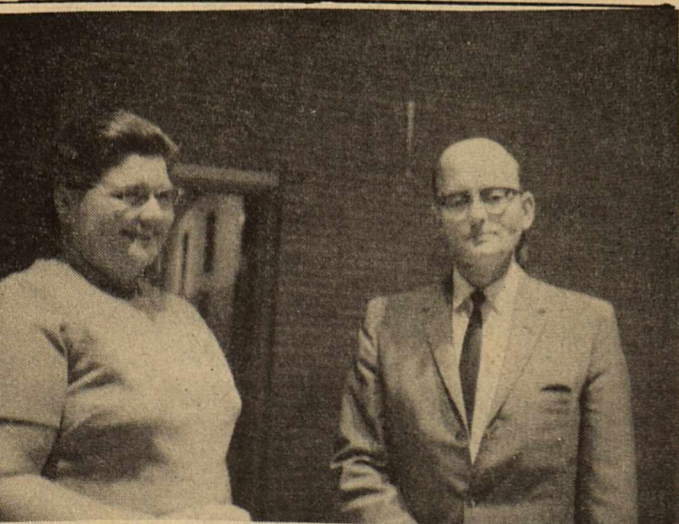
STATE LINE HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB MEET

INTER-SQUAD TENNIS TOURNAMENT

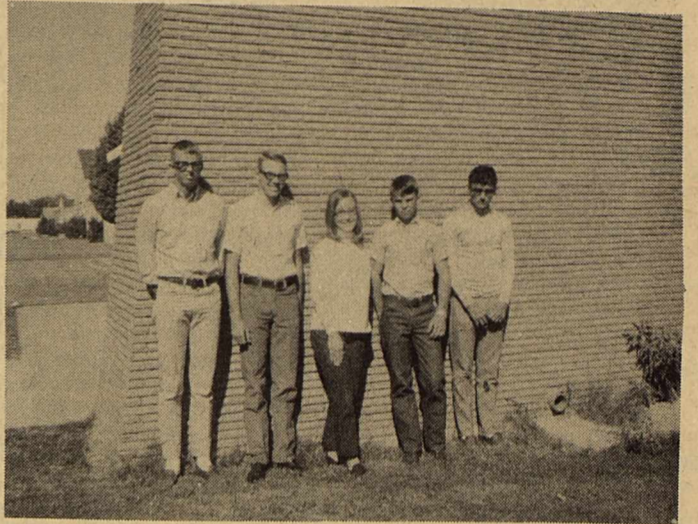

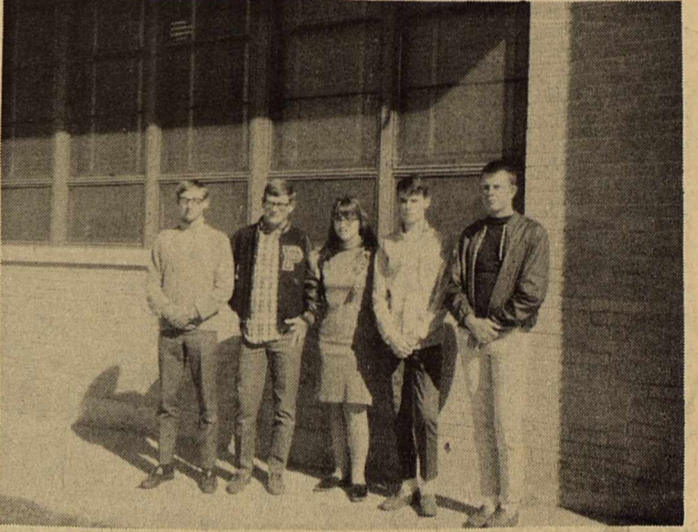

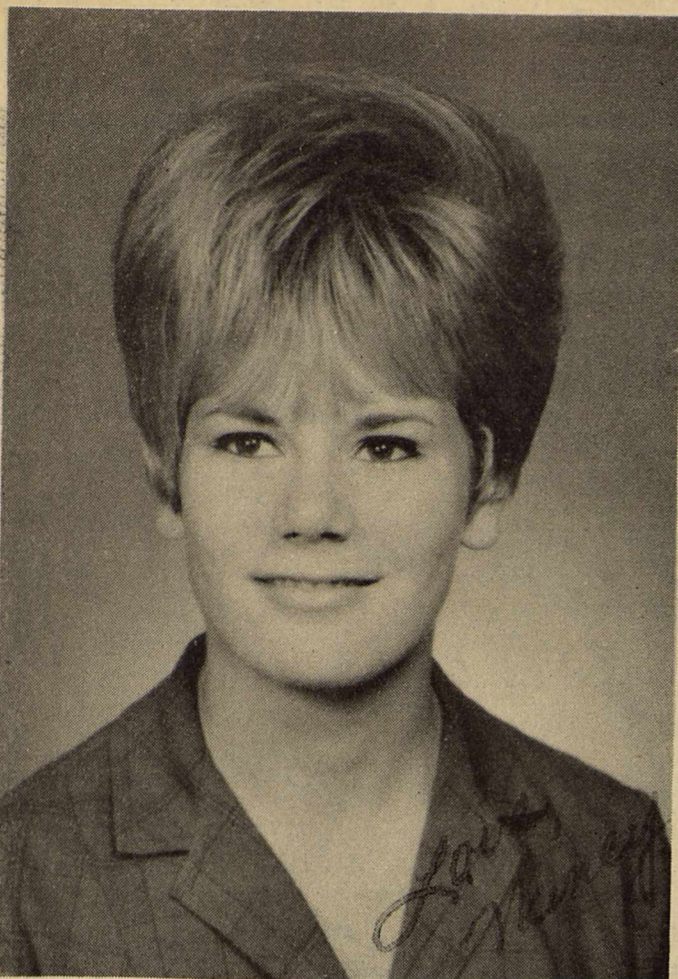
