# Livestock Owners Given Warning

Livestock owners are urged to make a close check of all livestock for any possible case of screwworms. On Friday of last week an animal was found with worms in a dehorning wound and a sample of the worms were sent to the Screwworm Eradication Center at Mission, Texas for identification. They were positively identified and an airplane was dropping sterile flies over the area four miles northeast of Denver City on Monday, Oct. 1.

This is the first case of screwworms in the county in over four years and only the second outbreak since the eradication program began. Livestock owners are urged to take samples of any suspected case and be sure the worms are sent to the laboratory for identification. There is a supply of containers at the County Agent's office. Containers were distributed to all livestock owners at the beginning of the screwworm eradication program, but it is likely that many of them have

This is a good time of the year to spray cattle for lice and grub control and by using one of the systematic insecticides, Co-Ral or Rue, lene, an application of spray material would be very beneficial in preventing the spread of screwworms.

Reared in Yoakum County, Cox suffered the heart attack at his home about 12:30 a.m. Friday.

Cox was born in Tulia, the son of a rancher; when he was a small child, however, the family moved to the Plains area of Yoakum County. He was reared there and attended Plains schools.

Following school, he was married to the former Miss Gwyn McLaren of Plains and the couple moved to a ranch at Bovina Where Cox worked for a time before moving back to Yoakum County.

On returning to Yoakum county, he operated his own ranching interests and was one of the founders of Yoakum County State Bank.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church. He was also a Mason and Shriner.

Survivors include his Wife, two sons, Robert of Denver City and Col. Bill Cox of the U.S. Airforce in Germany, a daughter, Mrs. Marie Adams of New Jersey, parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cox of Lovington, four brothers, Bill of Tulia, F. M. of Missouri, John Sam of Wyoming and Bob of Oklahoma, a sister, Mrs. Glen Carter of Happy, and seven grandchildren.

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




PLAINS TEACHERS HONORED BY TSA MO GA GROUP
