





Editorial

The local Lions Club met Thursday, Feb. 20. Alma's Cafe catered the luncheon. After a fine lunch the meeting was called to order by Vice-President Cordell Hudleston. Following the regular order of business the guests were introduced and new members acknowledged. There were 32 members, 6 guests and 1 new member present.

District director of Lions International Don Taylor, Plainview, was guest speaker of the meeting. Mr. Taylor has been visiting the different clubs in his district and reported that last year had been the finest year that the district has had. His purpose has been to encourage the many clubs in his district, enliven the drive for new memberships and organize new clubs. Mr. Taylor had set a goal of 7 new clubs in his district for this year. He stated that at the present time 4 new clubs have been organized and 2 are in the making and that he thought that the goal would be reached.

Mr. Taylor praised the local club for their interest in local youth movements and particularly in their decision to purchase a hog or a lamb at the Yoakum County Fat Stock Show this year. He discussed the foreign student exchange program and its advantages and the fine relations existing between the foriegn clubs and those at home.

Mr. Taylor stated that he will not be a candidate for re-electon for district director. He asked for a greater concern of the local club in leadership for the district directorship stating that there had not been a director from this area. He invited all Plains members to at some time visit his home club at Plainview

Mr. Taylor's talk was invigorating and quite informative and should inspire a greater interest of the members in their local club.

Mr. Jack Redshaw and Mr. Harold D. Holloway, representatives of the E. I. Dupont de Nemours & Company, were present and Mr. Redshaw presented a film showing some of the technicalities of the "Permacep" permeators now being installed in Plains for the purpose of purifying and removing much of the solids from the present water supply. The results of this project will be to furnish the users of city water with a soft water for all their domestic needs.

The Dupont Company has been researching the Plains for two years, first with a mobil unit and then with one of the units now operating at the City Hall, the type of which is being installed at the huge plant near the City's water tower in South Plains. Mr. Redshaw stated that when completed, this plant would constitute the largest of its kind in the world. The capacity of which is 100,000 gallons a day. There are other plants of this kind operating in other parts of this country, namely, Oklahoma Iowa and California, but none with such a capacity.

Mr. Redshaw furnished many facets of the "Permacep" project, the facts and analysis of the Plains water and the results to be expected. The program was fascinating and inspires pride in the fact that the small town of Plains, Texas, was chosen for the site of this huge and very important research project.

No definite date was set for the commencement of operations of the plant but it can be ex-

pected to be in the near future as the installation of the equipment is nearly completed.

The program was a very interesting and entertaining one, and with the fine luncheon, the results were a fine meeting.

At the beginning of the sale the bidders set up some very good floor prices. The Lubbock Auction and Commission put a floor of \$28.00 on the steers. Mr. James Stewart of Farm Pac Kitchens set a floor price of \$21.75 on the barrows, and Mr. Ty Field set a \$28.50 floor under the lambs. The one thing that made the 1969 sale look real good to everyone concerned was the fact that the animals sold for \$9,919.23 above the floor value. This is the total amount the buyers gave the exhibitors above the actual value of the animals.

Auctioneer Hand Mathews was on hand for the seventeenth time and this year he brought Mr. Charles Macha as his helper. As soon as the floor bids were posted, the sale of animals got under way with the selling of the Grand Champion Calf. Mr. D.P. Moorhead of the Yoakum County State Bank bought the top calf of the show. The bank paid \$1.00 per pound for the paid \$1,00 per pound for the

AN URCENT APPEAL TO ALL PROPERTY OWNERS IN

THE CITY OF PLAINS

On Saturday, April 5th, you will decide along with the other qualified voters of the City whether you want the 1% sales tax enacted within the City of Plains. Your vote will very likely decide the outcome of this election and we therefore urge you to vote for the 1% sales tax.

Here are some of the alternatives along with some questions and answers.

1. Why all of a sudden does Plains need this additional revenue?

This has not happened all of a sudden. Your city has been operating on the border line for the past few years. It has been only through the cooperation of the citizens and the City Government that some sort of additional revenue has not been implemented already, but time is running out and it is the feeling that the ad valorem taxes should not have to be raised to offset the increase over the past years in the cost of operations your city has experienced. This increase in cost of operations is nothing new to anyone in any type of business. All are experiencing the same thing. The question Plains will soon face is not whether to increase in the property tax, or an increase in the cost of services.

2. How much revenue would the penny tax produce each year?

On a population basis, it is estimated that the sales tax will bring in \$8,00 per person per year. This does not mean, however, that the sales tax will cost each Plains resident \$8.00 per year since visitors to the city, tourists, and persons living outside the city limits who buy in Plains will also pay the tax, which will reduce the resident estimate to between \$5.00 and \$6.00 per person.

3. When will the sales tax be collected?

5. Will a sales tax hurt business?

Not necessarily. Experience in other cities has proved that a sales tax will not hurt the retail business in a community. Rather, a clean, attractive and well-run city attracts people, makes it grow and makes business better.

6. Is a sales tax unfair and a burden on lower income people?

A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and it is not burdensome on any income group. A person in the lower or medium income bracket spends most of his money on the necessities of life which are exempt from the tax. A person in the higher income bracket naturally spends more money than a lower income person and therefore will pay more of the tax. It is a fair tax because everyone pays in proportion to what he or she has to spend.

A. E. Rash Rites Held Saturday

Funeral services for Abel (Abe) William Rash, 79, were held at 2;30 p.m. Saturday at the Aspermont First Baptist Church. He died Thursday in the Stonewall Memorial Hospital after a lengthy illness.

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



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CROP PRODUCTION MEETING MARCH 6
