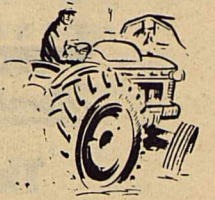

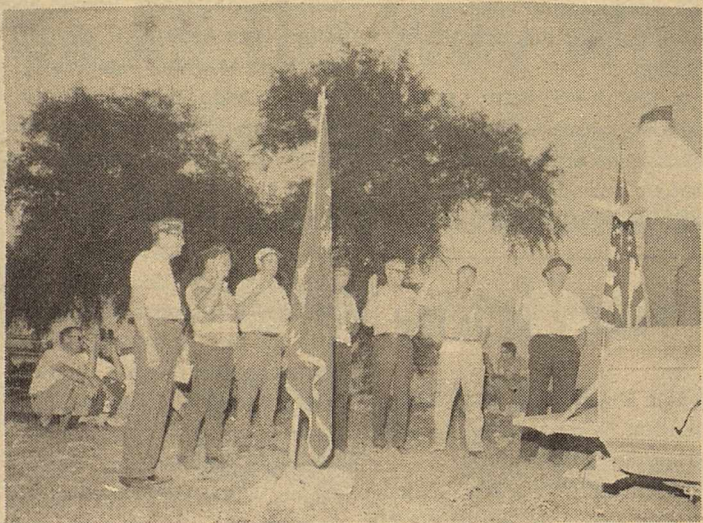

## New Clean Air Car



CHICAGO — This Clean Air Car which runs on liquefied petroleum gas can help reduce air pollution and smog because the engine exhaust is from one-third to one-half lower in hydrocarbon emissions than for most late model cars. The Clean Air Car, shown during an actual demonstration, is a 1969 stock production sedan that was converted to run on LP-gas engine fuel with simple external engine modifications. This fuel is readily available and powers city buses, over-the-road trucks, industrial lift trucks, taxi fleets, farm tractors and other vehicles.

## ASCS NEWS

TIME TO CERTIFY CROP AND LAND USE ACREAGES: Farm operators may now file acreage reports of cotton, diverted acres and feed grains (which includes grain sorghum, corn and barley). The acreage report must be filed not later than August 15th, 1969. We want to again remind farm operators that the crops and diverted acres should be carefully measured. Failure to report the correct acreage of each crop could result in a reduction or loss of payments. We expect to have help to measure all farms that farmers have requested measuring service. However, operators that requested measuring service are still required to file a report by August 15th showing acres and land uses.

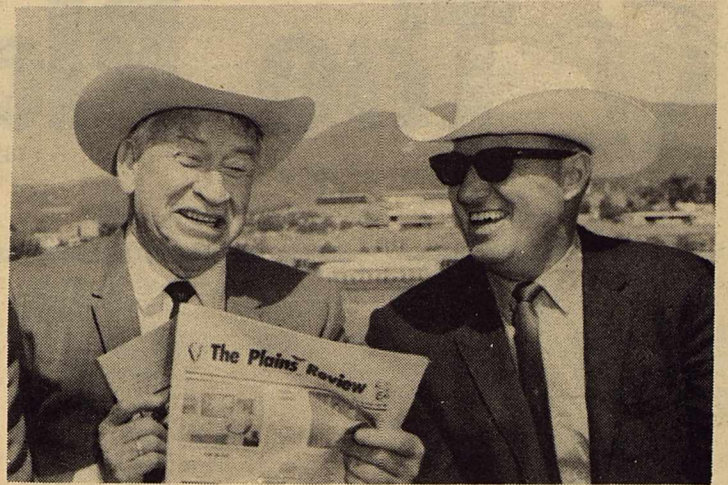
Regulations require that after operators have certified their crop acreages that a percent of the farms be measured by ASCS reporters. Generally speaking under the past year's programs farmers have done a good job of measuring their own crops and it is expected that a good job will be done this year.

With the producers copy of the cotton and feed grain program applications to participate in the program, which was mailed to producers, a list of approved conserving uses for diverted acres, a list of conserving uses for conserving base acres and a notice to farmers on the 1969 Feed Grain-Wheat program was enclosed. Farm operators are urged to file these 3 sheets of instructions and review them from time to time.

CROP SHARES: Operators should review the crop shares listed on the copies of program applications they received to be sure the shares are correct since price support payments must be made or divided among the individuals on the same basis as each individual shares in the crop. We must not forget the "hired employee" who has a few acres of crop.

CROSS COMPLIANCE: Each year it appears that some farmers comply with the feed grain program on one farm and later it is found that they operated or had some interest in feed grains on a farm that had excess feed grains which made them ineligible for payment on the complying farm. Any farmer that does not fully understand the cross compliance regulations is urged to check with their ASCS office or read the small pamphlet, Form PA-904, which was mailed with their feed grain base notice.

CROPS DESTROYED BY NATURAL DISASTER: Producers that have cotton destroyed by natural disaster such as, hail, windstorm, etc., after this date and

believe it is too late to replant cotton may file a request with the county committee to have the acreage released to be planted to other crops and if approved price support payments made and cotton history retained. Request must be filed before planting to another crop. Feed grains if destroyed by natural disaster may be released if it cannot be replanted by July 1st.

SKIPROW PATTERNS: When eligible cropland is planted four normal rows cotton or feed grains and four blank. The four blanks may be counted as diverted. It would be necessary to skip a larger space if a vine crop such as cantaloupes, watermelons, etc., were planted in a skip row pattern. Any producers interested in a vine crop skip row pattern should contact the county office if the blank rows are needed for diverted land.

Mrs. J.C. Meeks is a patient in the Brownfield Hospital. She has been there three weeks and is improving.

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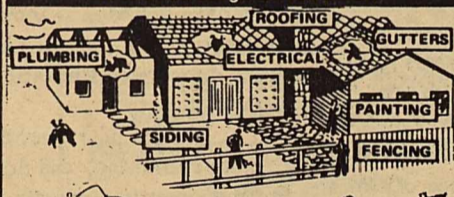

### WATER SAFETY

Everyone who goes on or around water should know how to swim or wear Coast Guard approved lifejackets. Even with safety devices worn, some persons drown anyway in stormy or cold weather.

Here are some tips from the Texas Health Bulletin worth noting with a full summer ahead.  
TIPS FOR SWIMMERS:

Always swim with a companion--never alone. On a long distance swim, arrange for someone in a boat to accompany you.

Swim in a safe place. The presence of lifeguards usually indicates the area is safe for swimming. Stay away from the area immediately in front of the diving board and do not swim near piers or pilings.

Before diving, make sure the water is deep enough and there are no hidden objects such as submerged rocks. In pools look for depth markings before entering.

If you have not been swimming since last summer, take it easy at first. Know your limitations, and stay within them.

Wait at least an hour after eating before swimming, and don't swim when overtired or overheated.

Make certain that reaching po-

les, buoys, and similar rescue equipment are readily available at your swimming area.

Don't depend on an inflated innertube or toy to hold you up. They may slip away from you.

Whenever a storm approaches, get out of the water--it is a conductor of lightning.

WATER SKIING TIPS FOR SKIERS AND BOATMEN:

Be a good swimmer before trying to water ski.

Always wear an appropriate ski belt or life jacket.

Take instruction from a qualified ski instructor.

Stay away from all objects such as docks, sea walls and boats. (Skiers seldom get hurt from hitting the water, but have been killed from hitting solid objects.)

Be thoughtful of the rights of swimmers, other boatmen and fishermen.

When landing, come in slowly, and release the tow a safe distance from shore. Do not land in swimming areas.

Always test equipment before skiing.

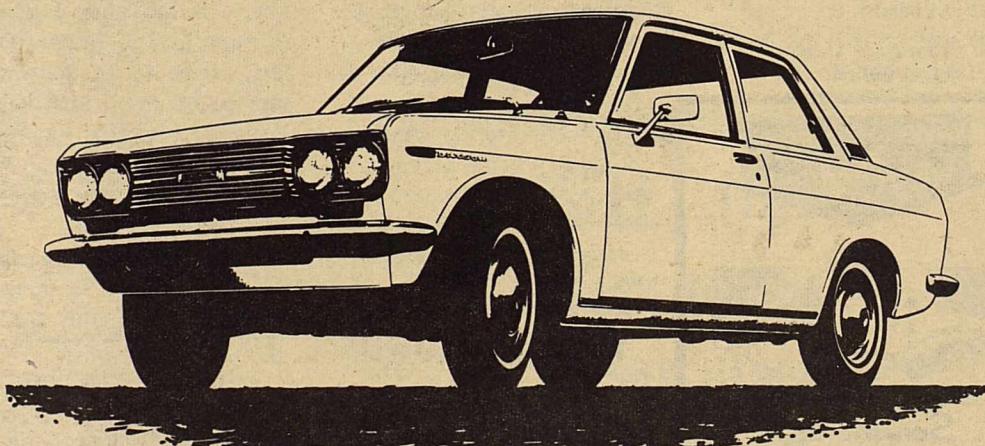

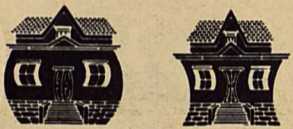
