


The weather in and about Plains has BEEN A BIT ON THE MUGGY SIDE this week. Sunday was the only day that the sky was clear at time of observation. The rest of the time it has been cloudy to partly cloudy. The high temperature for this past week was 60° the lowest 21°. The averages were; high-51°---low 30° and at 7:00, observation time, 35.6°. The December-January douth was broken by some rain this week. The amounts varying some what over this area. The official report shows .02 of an inch for Thursday and .72 for Friday of the past week. From the weather conditions observed this morning before we go to press we hope to be able to report more precipitation next week. This is only a hope and not a prediction.

This was the experience of this reporter last week. On returning from Denver City, we discovered a drilling rig operating 5 miles south of Plains and 1/2 mile west of hiway 214. On investigation we found Charles Miller of Lamesa with his late model Buyce Eyrus 28-L drilling a 16" hole for irrigation. 160 feet of casing was on the ground and Charles reported a depth of 100' at that time. We have not had an opportunity to check the results of the venture. The well is on the land farmed by James R. Chambliss 1204 E. 14th Plains and owned by Dr. Phillips of Levelland, Tex.

Mr. Miller has been drilling in the Plains area for the past year. He is favorably impressed with this community and stated that he is considering moving to Plains in the near future. This is good news for Plains. New businesses and new interest will be greatly welcomed by the folks of Plains.

The Wranglers didn't do so hot at the D.C. Tourny. All three teams came home losing. Oh, well, there's always next year!





Mother Fights For Child's Life

A pretty little five-year-old Denver City girl has lived a life's span--by standards of 10 years ago. Even bolstered by modern medical research, her five years may be counting for 20 or 30 years of the life of the average man who lives out his allotted time.

Sheila Denise Brown is a victim of cystic fibrosis, a disease of infants and children which attacks the digestive system and lungs to starve the body and make every breath a challenge.

Modern research is fighting to extend the expectancy of cystic fibrosis victims, and in such research--and through prayers to God--lie the future of Sheila and the hopes of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Brown.

Sheila is too young to understand the seriousness of her condition. To her, the often three times daily sessions under a breathing mask and nightly sessions under an oxygen tent, precautions against colds and respiratory disorders, and trips to visit medical specialists every four to six months in Dallas and Houston are routines of life.

But Mr. and Mrs. Brown understand. That's why Sheila's mother, Linda, has accepted the Yoakum County chairmanship of the February Cystic Fibrosis Month door-to-door research fund drive which will be conducted today in Denver City and Monday, February 24, in Plains.

Mrs. Brown won't be waging a lone effort for funds. Friends in her sorority will help. The Kappa Tac chapter of the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority assumed the sponsorship of the fund drive.

Those helping to conduct the drive in Plains will be Charlotte Kennedy, Latrell McDonnell and Archie Glover.

Money collected through the drive will be used to help finance research--the work which, in 10 years, has added 10 years to the lives of young victims of the disease.

Cystic Fibrosis is a non-contagious malady which occurs when both parents carry a cystic fibrosis gene which the child inherits. There is no test, yet, to detect carriers before they become parents. Cystic fibrosis, so far, cannot be cured but the disease responds to early diagnosis and specialized care.

In Sheila's case, the disease struck the digestive system. She was two years of age before the disease was diagnosed. For three years she has undergone specialized treatment.

There has been improvement. But Sheila still lives on time borrowed by research.

At the least hint of a cold or other respiratory disorder, Sheila undergoes three times daily "treatment" from a breathing mask and pure-air compressor to relieve fluid congestion which accompanies cystic fibrosis. After each session with the mask, Sheila is placed head down on an inclined board where her mother "burps" her to help remove the fluids.

At nights, if there's hint of respiratory trouble, Sheila sleeps under an oxygen tent through which she breaths compressor-provided clean air treated with special medication.

She is regularly administered

medication to allow her to digest her food.

Every four to six months, Sheila visits medical specialists in Dallas and Houston, alternating between the two cities.

Sheila takes these things in stride.

They're routine to her, along with playing "tom boy" with her three-year-old brother, Dougie--climbing trees and fences, swinging in swings, riding horses. Dougie is not a victim of his sister's malady.

Sheila, bright eyes shining through dark-rimmed glasses and with a big smile on her face is looking forward to starting school next September.

"I can write numbers!", she exclaimed proudly. "But I can't spell," she added, as if learning to spell is the only challenge she faces in life.

Sheila's challenge is greater than learning to spell--right now, at least. Her challenge parallels that of research which will be financed by the generosity of Yoakum Countians today and Feb. 24.

"We just put our faith in the doctors and research and in God," said Mrs. Brown, who is the daughter of Yoakum County Sheriff and Mrs. Joe Deaton. Sheila's father's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Grady Brown.


Neither of Sheila's parents can determine from which side of the family the cystic fibrosis is inherited. In memory of family members, the disease never occurred. It is surmised that the inherited genes came from away back down the family line.






The new Editor, Mr. John McConnell of Plains, explained that due to some misunderstandings of both the contest and the manner of distribution of the paper in Tatum it was necessary to call off the contest at this time. Mr. McConnell explained that due to the fact that the subscriptions had been obtained on the premise that the paper would be circulated through the mail immediately, a dead line which could not be met, he felt that in all fairness to those who had bought their subscription on this contest basis should have their money refunded and that they be given the opportunity to re-subscribe according to their assessment of the new Editor and the quality of the paper. Mr. McConnell expressed a hearty welcome to all those who wish to subscribe to the Plains paper.

Mr. McConnell discussed the neighborliness of the Plains and Tatum communities dating from the early settler days and continuing into the present times. He described the similarity of interests, that being primarily oil, farming and the live stock industries and the friendly school relations the two communities enjoy. Mr. McConnell stated that he felt this relationship would assure the success of a unified publication.

He stated that he could no longer supply the sample copies through the Post Office but that the papers would be supplied

free through the local news stands and through the local business establishments.

Mr. McConnell's discourse was followed by an address by Mr. Orin Hatch, Librarian of the Hobbs New Mexico Junior College.

The main subject of Mr. Hatch's address was, "Community Service". In treating with this subject Mr. Hatch related the many ways that his college was involved in service to the community. He told some thing of the lack of education in the earlier days of our country and the lack of need for education then. He then showed the comparison of the needs of that day and the highly specialized world in which we now live. And the necessity of education that people better understand each other and are able to get along and live together. He described how cultural arts develop the individual and thus raise the environment in the community. In speaking of campus disturbances Mr. Hatch said, that people must be educated and learn to accept majority decisions. He expressed the dangers of the loss of the democratic process in the event of failure of education on this subject.

In speaking of the Hobbs Junior College Mr. Hatch stated that the educational program was extensive and that the short course program was large, offering short course in many subjects including such courses as refresher course on income tax reports. In the fine art the College has on exhibit the works of many fine artists including the works of Peter Herd. In the field of musical and dramatics the college is offering entertainment by the state university as well as other out of state universities.

Mr. Hatch reported that the college is involved in the needs of the community. He stated that it was not the purpose of the college to take over the community entertainment but rather assist in obtaining higher quality entertainment. He also stated that there would be a concerted drive led by himself and assisted by his secretaries to help promote special talent for the community.

From Mr. Hatch's reports of the college it must be concluded the the Hobbs Junior College is a fine asset to this community.

The names of all present were placed in a box and names were drawn for the prizes given. Three lovely Valentine boxes of candy and a lovely

white iced cake were given. A five dollar bill was offered for a drawing by the membership. The member drawn was not present so the five dollars was placed in a jackpot and with another five dollars will be offered for drawing at the next meeting.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year; President, Dr. Doyle Riley; Vice-President, Mr. W.S. Clary; Sec and Treasurer, Dorothy Bess.







Here Are Answers to Some of the Most Often Asked Questions:

- Q: What items are subject to the 1% municipal sales tax?
- A: The 1% city sales tax is applicable only to those sales now taxed under the State Sales & Use Tax Act.
- Q: There is a 2% State tax on automobiles. Would the city sales tax also apply to automobile sales?
- A: No. The 2% State tax on automobiles is an excise tax; the municipal sales tax would not apply to automobile sales.
- Q: Does the city sales tax apply to sales at wholesale?
- A: No, only to retail sales. Goods sold for resale are not taxable.
- Q: Does a person residing outside of the city limits pay the 1% municipal sales tax?
- A: Yes, when he makes a purchase of personal property subject to the tax in city which has adopted the local sales tax. In return, he enjoys the city's street facilities, police protection and other advantages of the city for which city residents pay the major share.
- Q: Is the local sales tax regressive—that is, will it cause a particular hardship for lower-income families?
- A: A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and this is particularly true in Texas, since so many essential items are exempt from the sales tax.
- Q: Why should a city dweller who rents his residence favor the local sales tax?
- A: For one matter, the person who rents enjoys the same services available to the property owner. For another, if it is necessary for the city to raise property taxes, the increased cost of this tax will be passed along in the form of higher rent charges.
- Q: Are city sales tax payments deductible from our Federal income tax reports?
- A: Yes.
- Q: Who can vote on the 1% local sales tax?
- A: Any registered voter in the city. A simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.

Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

Yoakum County Home Demonstration Clubs have a "first" coming up soon. On April 24, the District Texas Home Demonstration Association will meet in Denver City at the First Baptist Church. This is the first time the District Association has met in Yoakum County, and all club members are working hard to make this the best District meeting. About three hundred persons are expected to attend from twenty counties.

The clubs have been having programs this month on Tensions. Using physical activities to release tensions was given in story form. The following were discussed on how to control tension:

(1) Get adequate rest, have a good diet, and maintain good physical health, and you will be less likely to make mountains out of molehills. (2) Recognize warning signs of tension and take the necessary steps to slow down. (3) Develop some satisfying tension-reducers which work well for you. (4) Ask yourself, "Is that my problem?" and you will be less likely to maintain a state of tension over situations you can do nothing about. (5) Learn to talk over the things that bother you with the person involved. In this way you will be able to solve many issues and reduce tension. (You may increase tension at the time--but still skillful discussion can help you gain understanding.) (6) Make decisions instead of postponing them and you will have fewer things to bother you. (7) Sort out the really important things from those that will be of no consequence in five years. You will find a difference in your feelings if you can take a long-range look. (8) Escape temporarily when you are faced with an insolvable situation. Later you will be able to look at it from a fresh viewpoint or will have built some energy reserves to help you face it. (9) Develop the practice of asking yourself these questions: What appears to be the thing that provokes my tension? Do I want to change the situation? How can I change it? What can't I change? If I can't change a situation, how can I change my attitude to make the situation tolerable? (10) Seek professional help if you feel that you are in such a state of tension that your feelings about yourself and your relationships with family and friends are affected or if your physical health is affected.

Bill Gray was a dedicated member of the board of directors of the Yoakum County Agriculture and Livestock Association from 1960 through almost all of 1968. He died of an apparent heart attack November 2, 1968.

He was a staunch supporter of education, whether from books or by actual experience that boys and girls obtain from 4-H and F. F. A. training and projects. Bill felt that time spent by his boys on supervised 4-H and F. F. A. projects was time that they would not be hot rodding up and down the highways and streets likely to get in trouble or injured, and would give them an opportunity to do something constructive as well as profitable in many instances.

He wanted Jimmy and John to have winners in the projects that they exhibited. Therefore, he spent considerable time finding some of the best brood stock available to raise prospective livestock projects from. Bill felt that money invested in this manner would be both educational and profitable. It would give them experience that one obtains from taking responsibility to see that the animals were properly tended through the feeding period; that they were properly fitted and groomed just prior to the show. Then the experience of showing and competing that is so vitally needed in every day life.

Bill was in full accord with the 4-H Club Motto and Pledge which reads:




In pledging her energies as cystic fibrosis reasearch fund drive chairman of the county, Mrs Brown is fighting, in one of the only ways she knows, for the life of her child.

"Ten years ago, the cystic fibrosis child lived only five or six years," she said. "Now, the oldest in Texas is 17 years of age

"It seems that the age expectancy has been increased through results of laboratory research. And through the will of God and more research, cystic fibrosis children may live normal lives," she said.


