#### Honey Production

Did you ever stop to think how much transportation is involved in the honey that goes so well with hot biscuits or hotcakes?

Even for bees, the honey business is mainly transportation. If a single bee should fly an average of a mile to a source of honey -- making sufficient trips to produce a pound of honey -- it would have to fly the equivalent of three thimes around the world ! Bees must have been flying more than ever last year. They produced a record crop, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Hot Honey Breads. Split English muffins or "leftovers" from last # Hamm and Dan Fields will be night's dinner rolls or muffins. Spread generously with a butter and honey mixture. Sprinkle with cimamon. Place under low broiler heat until honey bubbles and roll is gently tinged with brown.
