COWBOYS BEAT CROSBYTON AT HOMECOMING

A packed crowd of hopeful Exes and expectant fans were caught up in the action Friday night, as the High -Riding Cowboys displayed a brilliantly executed offense and a defense that once again spelled the difference. Crosbyton brought a band of Chief to Cowboy stadium large enough to rattle the rock of Gibraltor, but the Cowboys never wavered in their quest for Victory number 3.

Super-knat Winn started the action by making the tackle on his own kick-off. He scattered feathers on the Chiefs 26 yard line. Three play later the Cowboys started to work from the Chiefs 45 yard line. Tony Chandler crushed his way for a first down, then took a fake as Gary Livesay scampered 18 yards to the Chiefs E. Three plays later

Livesay carried another 9 yards, good for 6 points with only 3:50 gone in the first quarter. Everyone thought the extra point attempt was good, but the officials ruled it off to the right, A stunned team lined up for a kick-off but apparently wasn't ready. An 86 yard run back tied the score 6 all, Crosbyton failed on their extra point. The Cowboys took control again by marching up the field. The Chiefs finally held and took possession. A key tackle by Guerry Randall set the Chiefs for a loss of 11 yards. A tough Cowboy defense allowed them only 5 plays on this series. A fine punt left Plains on their own 17 yard line. The offense could'nt put the puzzle together this time, and a

the Cowboy 31, Crosbyton picked up a quick first down before the Cowboy defense decided to cut their braids. Sparked by a spine-tingling tackle by line-backer Shelly Simpson, the slaughter squad proceeded to make shambles of any immediate progressof the Chiefs. The ball changed hands one series with Plains holding Crosbyton to six tries. The Cowboys made one last drive before half time. Starting at their own 13 yard line, Plains paced off 8lyards in 13 plays, only to fumble on the 6 yard line with 15 seconds left. This drive saw some great moves by the backfield and exceptionally good blocking by an agressive line, that was outweighed considerably. They formed a tight pocket that enablshort punt plus a 15 yard penalty carried the ball down to ed sure-hand Lowe to conn-

ect for gains of 17 and 18 yards. One of these passes was to tight end. Jerry Parrish. Parrish had to reach for the aerial, which enabled him to avoid immediate contact and picked up a needed first down, Crosbyton kicked to Plains to start the second half.

The Cowboys fumbled the ball on the second play from scrimmage at their own 27. The slaughter squad refused to let the Chiefs even dream of scoring as they pushed them steadily back. On the third play, Mighty Moore plundered the right side of the line and plastered a Chief. A fumble attack by the defense spurred the offense, as they initiated a drive that ended in the Crosbyton end zone. This drive was for 70 yards in 12 plays. stalled. The defense allowed

The extra point attempt failed, leaving the score 12-6 with 5:35 left in the third quarter. The Chiefs refusing to bow in defeat, paraded to the Cowboy 12 yard line before "Mighty Moore once again rose to the occasion. After blocking a pass. Moore countered again and annihilated the quarterback to give Plains possession of the balls The Cowboy score machine was temporarily out of commission, but the defense was on target, A penalty returned a Chief threat that went for 30 yards, leaving them faced with fourth and 22. Gary Livesay snared the next pass after Moore missed throwing the quarterback for a loss by the width of a flea's hair. Moore's tackle would have been a safety. The offense

the Chiefs one play before Bruce Lester stormed the quarterback for another fumble. The Cowboys tried to lengthen the gap with a field goal, The attempt failed with 5:00 left in the game. The Chiefs went to work on the third play from scrimmage, their fullback galloped 60 yards for a score. The extra point attempt was good, leaving the score, 13to 12. in favor of Crosbyton. The Cowboys, with the same determination that clinched t heir two previous victories, drove down to the Chiefs 13. An interception what would have finished the game was ruled as pass interference and handed the ball to the Cowboy on the 7 yard line with 2:00 left in the game. Super-luat carried for six yards before Gary Livesay dove for paydirt, Super Knat Winn kicked

the point after leaving the score 19-13, with 1:15 to go. The game was far from over. considering that both the Chiefs scores came from long, opening field runs. Eddie Moore iced the cake with 45 seconds remaining by spilling the quarterback and creating a fumble. The cowboys stalled the remainder of the game to the delight of a packed crowd. The Home Team played

an outstanding game, I only wish I could elaborate on every play because each one viewed eleven young men giving 100 %. This type of team work makes it hard to hit

every highlight, since every man is a highlight. This is the type of team that draws respect from its fans.

Tomorrow night, Plains travels to Eagle country. They have a real good chance to plunk some feathers that haven't already been put into a Chief's bonnet, Should the Cowboys work together and hit agressively, we'll have our first district 5-A win, This is the one we've been waiting for Cowboys, so lets go get it. 



nonononononononon Crushed patents, a favorite

fabric for rain garments and sportswear, requires special techniques for sewing. A pattem with few seams makes it easier to manipulate the vinyltype fabric. Raglan or kimono sleeves are easiest, but some of the crushed patents are soft and pliable enough to sew-in sleeves.

The pattern should be al tered to fit before the garment is cut. Seams cannot be left out without damage to the fabric. When fastening the pattern to the fabric, place pins in seam allowances only or tape the pattern to the fabric. Cut with sharp shears. Mark darts seamlines and other construction details with chalk or a pencil on the wrong side of the fabric. Use a grease pencil when making markings on the right side. These can easily be wiped off.

A medium-sized machine needle and 10 or 12 stitches per inch are satisfactory for top stitching on crushed patents. A piece of tissue paper
