## Pre-Registration Set April 16-18

Kindergarten pre-registration will be held here Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, April 16, 17 and 18, according to an announcement made this week by Dean Andrews, Superintendent of Plains Independent Schools.

Children who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1985 are eligible for registration. Each child who registers will be required to present a birth certificate and a copy of his/her immunization record.

Registration will begin at $9: 30$ a.m. each day and continue through lunch. A parent must accompany each child throughout registration. Lunch will be served at 11 a.m. for adults at $\$ 1.50$ and children, $\$ 2$.

Children may be registered on any of the designated days, but parents are asked to call the elementary office at $456-8490$ and specify the day they wish to bring in their child.
own." He attended college one semester, but decided beginning a farming operation was more important to him and he and his family moved back to the farm to stay.
He believes that taking care of the soil and water is a key part of staying in the farming business. He said he found that a rotation of cotton, milo and wheat helps maintain the productivity of the soil and gives him some diversification in his operation.

Bearden discovered that when cotton is followed by cotton, productivity falls. He tries never to plant cotton on the same land two years in a row.
"Every year is different," Bearden says, "You can't program in a specific routine to follow each year. A farmer must be observant to the conditions as they happen, to be able to make a crop."

In accepting the award, Bearden said that his son Ricky is fond of saying "Dad taught me everything he knows." However, Bearden stated that he felt now that Ricky is teaching me. I feel this award is unmerited but I am honored to have been selected.'

## New Board Members Take Oath Of Office

Members of the board of Plains Independent School District met in regular session Monday, April 8 at 7 p.m. in the administration building.

Canvassing of the ballots from the recent election was held and election results were approved as certified by the election judge.
Newly-elected board members Eddie Earnest, Edwin Livengood and Melvin Lowrey were sworn in by Superintendent Dean Andrews. Ty Earl Powell, also elected, was absent.
Following the swearing-in of the new members, the board held election of officers. Jack Palmer was elected president; Melvin Lowrey, vice present and Terry Davis, secretary.
Carlton Buesing, Director of the Four County Special Services Coop, presented a curriculum report.
New business conducted by the board included approval of pay for election officials with the judge receiving $\$ 75$ and clerks, $\$ 54$.
Summer driver education was discussed and Davis made a motion that Larry McMinn be employed as teacher of that course, with students being charged $\$ 60$ for classroom instruction and driving instruction; and $\$ 50$ for driving instruction only. Motion was seconded by Earnest and approved unanimously.
Other business was approval to pay accounts payable, hearing financial reports from Supt. Andrews for general operating, cafeteria, tax and transportation areas; and accepting the resignation of Andy Taylor to be effective at the end of the 1984-85 school year.
Other action included review of the status of various school projects by Supt. Andrews, a look at utility costs from January 1981 through March 1985, explanation of purchase order procedures, increasing the number of cheerleaders from

## FmHA Authorizes Overtime To Speed Loan Processing

Texas Farmers Home Administration has been authorized an additional $\$ 16,000$ to pay overtime to FmHA personnel to help speed up loan processing, according to State Director J. Lynn Futch.
"These funds, which are in addition to the $\$ 84,000$ overtime allotment that total to $\$ 100,000$ for fiscal year 1985, will help us get more operating loan funds into the hands of farmers in time for spring planting," Futch said.
"FmHA county supervisors and their staffs in 136 county offices around the state are working as fast as possible to process loans under the FmHA's normal farm loan programs as well as handling the more than 6,000 requests for loan reviews under the debt restructuring initiatives. This overtime will help speed up processing of all these loans," Futch said.

## SAUSAGE DIP

1 lb hot sausage - cooked
1 can cheddar cheese soup
1 can Ro-tel tomatoes
1 can green chilies
(You may add Velveeta cheese, if desired).

Combine all ingredients and heat until desired consistency. PECAN CARAMEL CANDY
2 c white Karo
2 c sugar
$1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$ butter*

CHICKEN CASSEROLE
$1 / 2$ chopped green pepper
$11 / 2$ chopped onion
$11 / 2$ chopped celery stalk
Saute in fat.
4 oz jar mushrooms (2 jars) fat for frying
$1 / 4 \mathrm{t}$ curry powder
2 beaten eggs
2 cans cream mushroom soup
4 c cooked, diced chicken
112 oz chicken Rice-A-Roni
1 c slivered almonds
1 t pepper
$1 / 4$ t sage
1 t salt, if using wild rice
1 pimento
Saute pepper, onion and celery in fat. Add 1 can mushroom soup and mushrooms, seasonings and pimento. Stir in chicken. Cook rice as directed. Add eggs to rice in separate bowl. Combine to chicken mixture. Stir in almonds. Spoon chicken into 3 qt casserole and bake at $350^{\circ}$ for 1 hr . With rest of soup simmer and serve over chicken.

## Yoakum Named 'Independence County'

NATIONAL SECRETARY WEEK IS APRIL 22-27

Yoakum County was officially designated as a 'Texas Independence County' during a special ceremony attended by city officials, county officials and Yoakum County Sesquicentennial Committee members Wednesday at the office of the Denver City Chamber of Commerce.

In conjunction with the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration, Lee Story, the West Texas representative for the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission, presented Sesquicentennial flags and a plaque from Governor Mark White to the city and county officials.
Both Plains and Denver City will be able to fly the special flags, while the plaque will be shared by the two cities. The plaque will be put on display in each of the school buildings in Plains and Denver City. Evaluation will tell the producer what a gallon of water is costing to pump it to the system. With an adjustment here and there, a producer can usually raise his efficiency by as much as 10 to 35 percent. This puts money back in his pocket. With the prices of farm commodities being low, this is one way a producer can lower his production cost by getting maximum efficiency on his inputs.
