He is married to the former Lela Parks and they are parents of three

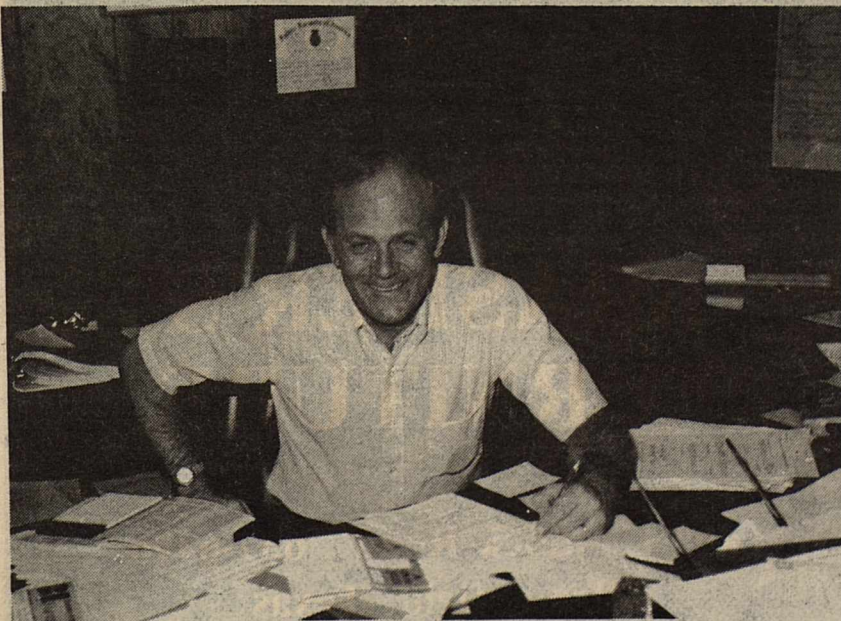
children, Steve, Russ and Doug.

Kennedy Named To Boys State

Commander Roy Perkins of Post No. 585 of The American Legion, announced the selection of Paul Kennedy, to participate in the 1985 session of Texas American Legion Boys State. The event will be held from June 8-14, at the University of Texas at Austin.

A student of Plains High School, he will participate in a workshop in the organization and operation of state and local governments. Paul is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Kennedy.

Departments (state and territorial organizations) of The American Legion will sponsor 51 of these Boys States this summer. Two outstanding youths from each of The American Legion Boys States will go to American Legion Boys Nation during July in Washington, D.C., where they will study federal government organization and operation in much the same manner as the Boys State delegates participate in state government.

During the Boys State sessions, the Plains youth will participate in the organization of political parties, campaigns, elections and the enactment and enforcement of their own laws within a mythical state. Elected State Officials will function "for a day" at the Capitol on June 14 and conclude with a Joint Session at the Boys State Legislature.

"As one of the Legions outstanding youth-training programs, Boys State affords these youngsters an opportunity to learn the functions of local and state governments," Commander Perkins stated. "Also, they will see the importance of the role a good citizen has in discharging his citizenship responsibilities. They soon discover how good government depends upon the active interest of every citizen."

American Legion Post 585, Lubbock, will host a banquet for the district boy and girl State honorees and their parents, on May 3.

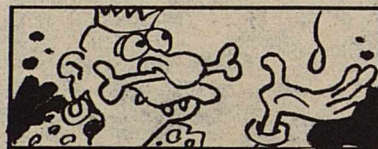
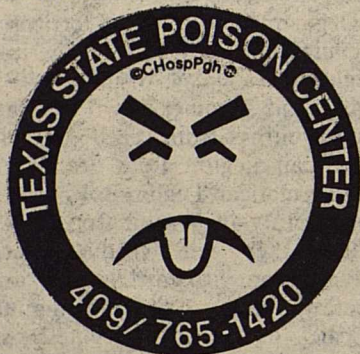
The club reported a total of \$142.95 earned from a recent plant sale, which will be used to finance club activities. Work was done at the triangle of highways 294 and 82 recently.

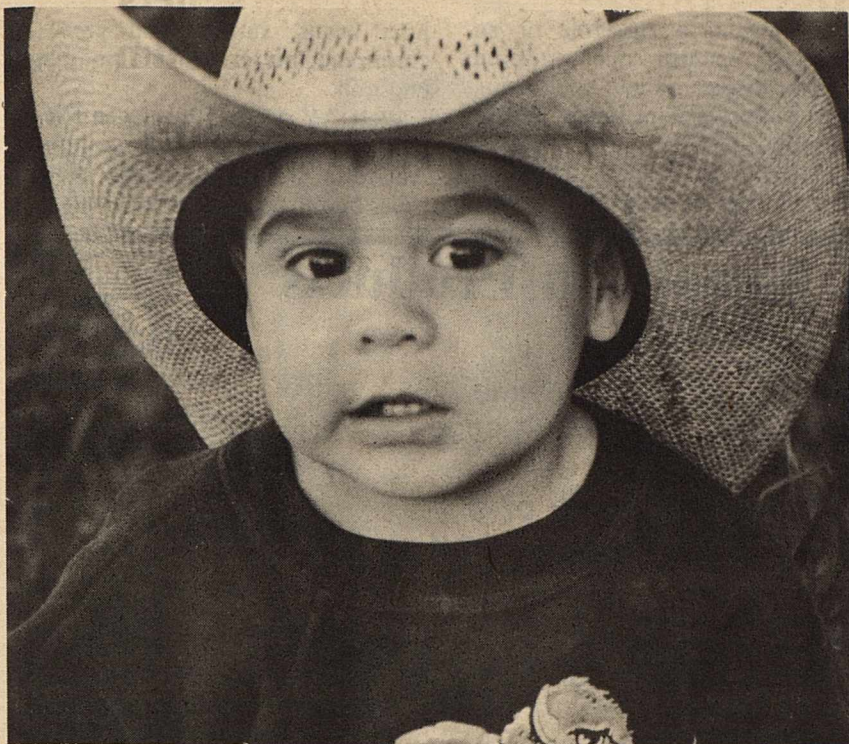

Kitchen Korner

Alma Lynn McGinty has been cooking since she was 10 years old and had many experiences to share with Kitchen Korner readers this week.

Alma moved to Yoakum County from Eastland County when she was only seven years old and began cooking as a result of her mother's death.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.V. Been, lived in the Moreland Community near Bronco. Alma remembers they had to open and close four gates every time they went to Bronco to get the mail and again when they returned home.

Alma attended West Texas State Teachers College in Canyon and majored in art. She was married to Rufus N. (Rusty) McGinty and traveled the rodeo circuit for a number of years. Rusty was World Champion Bulldogger at one time.

Cooking while on the rodeo circuit provided some challenges for Alma Lynn, who purchased just enough food for one or two meals at a time. This made meal planning a real necessity.

She recalls, "One time in Salt Lake City, I paid for a small amount of groceries with a twenty dollar bill and the grocer gave me change in silver dollars. The change weighed more than the groceries!"

Rusty, who died in February 1964, was a rancher. Alma Lynn says "all the trials you've read about...I had them, plus some! I have cooked for 20 to 25 hungry branding hands too many times to count!"

Last minute guests could always find a place at her table back then ...and still can!

Alma Lynn is a very busy person who always seems to be in a hurry. Her hobbies are sewing, reading, crocheting and piecing quilts.

The McGintys reared two daughters. D'Lois is married to Jay Earl Bryson and lives in Odessa. D'Lynn lives in Amarillo. Grandchildren are Dana Lynn and Jon Mac Bryson.

SORGHUM COOKIES

- 1 c sugar
- ¾ c shortening
- ¼ c sorghum
- 2 c sifted flour
- 1 egg
- 2 t soda
- ¼ t salt
- ½ t cinnamon
- ½ t ginger

Cream sugar and shortening. Add egg and sorghum. Beat well. Add dry ingredients that have been sifted together. Roll in small balls (1 t heaped). Shape with greased hands. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet and bake 10-12 mins. When they puff up and crack, remove from oven. They are done when slightly browned. Yield - 4½ doz.

CRANBERRY SAUCE

Let set till it starts to jell. Add:
 1 c diced celery
 1 c chopped nuts
 1 c chopped marshmallows or cottage cheese ("I prefer marshmallows")

Mix and let set. Cook 2 lbs of berries in 1 c water. Then add to rest of mixture. ("I like to place the chopped marshmallows in the hot cranberries and let them melt which adds a very pretty frosted color.")

ANADAMA BREAD

- 2 c hot water
- ½ c yellow corn meal
- 2 T shortening
- ½ c molasses syrup
- 1 t salt
- 5 c flour

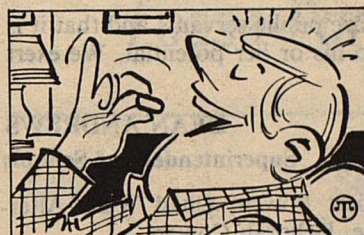
½ c hot water
 1 pkg yeast
 Place corn meal in hot water and mix well, add shortening, molasses, salt, and cool to lukewarm. Put yeast in ½ c lukewarm water to soften. Add to corn meal mixture with flour to make stiff dough. Let rise until it becomes smooth and elastic or doubles in size. Work down again and put in well oiled pans, let rise (should rise at least one hour, each time). Bake in 350° oven for 30-45 mins. Yield - 2 loaves.

BROWN SUGAR COOKIES

- 1 c shortening
- 2 c brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 t baking powder
- ½ t salt
- 1 t soda
- 3½ c flour

(You may need to add ¼ c more flour)

Mix all ingredients together. You may add dates, nuts and raisins, if desired. Cook in 350° oven for about 10 mins. or until a lt. brown.

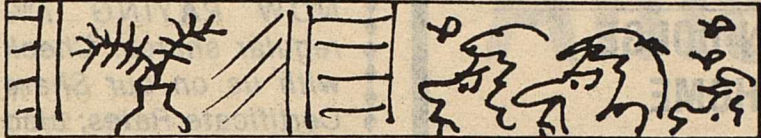
