Mix to above mixture. Then add 1 c hot water
Bake at $350^{\circ}$ for $30-35 \mathrm{mins}$. ("I bake mine in three $9 \times 9$ inch pans. And for lots of icing I make the
following recipe.")
3 eggs, well beaten
1 c butter or margarine, melted
$3 / 4$ c cocoa
approximately 7 c powdered sugar, sifted
Beat until of spreading consistency.

EGGLESS, ALMOST
BUTTERLESS \& MILKLESS
CAKE
First put in sauce pan:

2 c sugar
2 c hot water
4 T melted butter
2 c raisins
1 c chopped nuts (pecans)
2 t cinnamon
$2 t$ cloves ("I omit this.")
pinch of salt
Boil all this 5 mins. When cold add:
2 t soda; dissolved in 1 T hot water 3 c flour

Can be baked in loaf or layer pan ("I prefer loaf with no icing, or Bundt pan'") Bake at $350^{\circ}$ for approx. 40 mins.
ICING
2 c brown sugar
1 c sweet cream
Cook slowly until soft ball stage. Remove from heat and beat until creamy.

APRICOT TANG TEA
2 c Tang
2 c sugar
1 c instant tea (any brand) 1 pkg lemonade mix ( 2 qt sz ) 1 pkg apricot Jell-O (small) $11 / 2$ t cinnamon
$3 / 4 \mathrm{t}$ cloves (" I omit this in mine.")
Mix thoroughly and store in air tight container. Use 2 heaping teaspoons to a cup of hot water.

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## Commissioners <br> Meet Monday

The Commissioners Court convened Monday, April 29, at 10 a.m. with following members present, Paul Cobb, County Judge, presiding; John Avara, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; R.W Thurston, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Jim Barron, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; Johnnie L. Fitzgerald, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; and Ruby Bruton, County Clerk \& Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioners Court.
Bob Thurston made a motion to approve road crossing permits in Precincts No. 1 and 2 of Northern Engineering International Company. John Avara seconded and motion was carried with unanimous approval.
Motion was made by John Avara to approve O'Keefe Subdivision, Lots 1 and 3, located in Section 889 Block D, John H. Gibson Survey. Motion was carried unanimously after being seconded by Thurston.
Avara moved to advertise to receive bids on May 20, 1985 for AC5 asphalt and 5/8"' gravel to seal coat 35 miles of pavement. Cost of materials to be paid by the issuance of time warrants at a rate not to exceed 7 percent interest. Thurston seconded; motion carried by all.
Myrl Slentz, chairwoman of the Sesquicentennial Committee met with the Court requesting funds for operating expenses for projects.
Commissioner Thurston moved to transfer $\$ 1,000$ budgeted for historical fund to the Sesquicentennial Committee. Commissioner Avara seconded and motion carried with no opposition.
Mrs. Slentz presented a Sesquicentennial plaque and flag to County Judge Paul Cobb, accepting on behalf of the County. A flag was given to Mary Jo StRomain and Eleanor Simpson, representatives of the Plains Committee.
Miscellaneous bills and extra hire were read and approved on motion and seconded by Fitzgerald and Thurston.
The session adjourned at 10:45 a.m.

From The Superintendent's Desk

I would like to share information with you this week about the University Interscholastic League. The U.I.L. began in 1910 as the Debating League of Texas High Schools, and merged with the Texas Interscholastic Athletic Association in 1912. The U.I.L. is a non-profit organization providing educational extracurricular academic, music and athletic contests for the students of Texas schools. There are approximately $1,500,000$ student participants each year. The League has been so successful that one out of each two graduating students has participated in a U.I.L. event.
This being the seventy-fifth anniversary of the U.I.L., I would like to list the contests, beginning with academic. They are: one act play, journalism, spelling, number sense, calculator applications, debate, informative and persuasive speaking, prose and poetry reading, ready writing, science, shorthand and typing.
The largest activity is in music. In 1983-84, approximately 345,000 students from 1806 junior and senior high schools, participated in music competition. Plains was one of the 1806 schools that participated and advanced to the regional and state contests.
Athletic contests include football, cross country, swimming, basketball, soccer, track, golf, team tennis, tennis, baseball, volleyball and softball. Texas has more high school football and basketball teams than any other state.
Plains Schools began participating in University Interscholastic League activities in 1938, when the first football program was organized.
The organizational structure of the U.I.L. consists of a state executive committee composed of twelve people appointed by the President of the University of Texas at Austin, and a legislative council composed of twenty persons elected from each of the four state regions and one person from each of the five classifications of schools.
I am privileged to be serving as a member of the U.I.L. Legislative Council. The Region I, Class AA that I represent has forty-seven schools and covers an area from Quanah, to Anson, to Eldorado, to Presidio, to Clint. I accept this responsibility as partial repayment for the countless benefits provided by the League. The Texas Intersholastic League Foundation has awarded higher education grants totalling over four million dollars to four thousand, six hundred and forty-nine students.

All U.I.L. standards and regulations are adopted by the schools themselves. Any person may present a proposal for change. Proposals are to be presented to the legislative council prior to May 1 of each year. The proposal is then submitted to one of four standing committees - policy, music, athletic or academics. The standing committee will send the proposed change to all schools and request their reaction. The fifth step is a public hearing on all changes, scheduled for the third Sunday in October. Then, following the public hearing, the standing committees make recommendations on all proposals submitted. In step seven of the plan, the legislative council takes action on each proposal. If the proposal passes the legislative council, then the proposal is placed on a referendum ballot to be voted on by all schools. Then, if passed, the State Board of Education must approve the change before it is implemented.
Now if I have coherently explained the method used to change a U.I.L. rule, and if you understand the framework of the organization, would you please explain it to about half of the Superintendents and Principals in this state! It seems that everyone is alike in one way or another, and we all seem to like rules and regulations as long as they apply to the other fellow, and do not interfere with the things we are doing.

There are many rules that we might like to change for Plains Independent School District however, thanks to Dr. Bailey Marshall, the U.I.L. staff, and to you the participants and supporters, this University Interscholastic League has proven to be one of the best student organizations in the United States.
