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## From The Superintendent's Desk

Our students in grades three, five and nine, have taken the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test and the results are now in our school.

The 66th Texas Legislature (1979) passed Senate Bill 350 which amended Section 16.176 of the Texas Education Code to provide compensatory instructional services for educationally disadvantaged children. The Texas Education Agency was directed to adopt and administer appropriate criterion-referenced assessment instruments designed to assess basic skills in mathematics, reading, and writing for all students in grades 3,5 and 9 . House Bill 723, passed by the 68th Legislature in 1983, further required that students who fail to demonstrate mastery of the exit level competencies in the 9th grade "shall retake the assessment instrument each year the assessment instrument is administered." Students with a physical or mental impairment or a learning disability may be exempt from taking the tests.

To carry out the law, committees of Texas educators, including teachers, principals, curriculum specialists, education service center staff members and university professors were convened in Austin to work with the Texas Education Agency in reviewing and refining previously developed essential objectives and measurement specifications for reading and mathematics. A committee of Texas Education Agency and school district specialists from across the state was formed to identify essential objectives for writing and to develop appropriate measurement specifications. Criterionreferenced tests for Grade 5 and exit level were completed in the fall of 1979 and the first annual cycle of assessment testing was conducted in February and March of 1980. Criterion-referenced tests for Grade 3 were completed in 1980 and administered for the first time in 1981. The sixth assessment cycle was conducted in February of 1985.

We invite parents of students in grades 3,5 and 9 to contact the student's principal or Mr. Alexander, to discuss their child's test score. The overall test scores are good and we congratulate each student for their accomplishments.

## Area Producers Are Invited To Attend Hale Co. Workshop

Cotton and sorghum producers in Yoakum County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.
The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and midseason pests and will be held Tuesday, June 4, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, according to David Kight, county extension agent. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route, south of the city.
The second workshop is scheduled for July 9 in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.
The workshop has been expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield,
and hold down production costs, Kight said.
The workshop will begin at $8: 30$ a.m. with Dr. James Leser, extension entomologist, outlining the scope of the training and explaining general concepts of pest management, pesticide safety, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton flea-hoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, extension agent-entomology headquartered in Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, extension agententomology based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.
The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands-on session inwhich participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available. For a detailed agenda, contact the county extension office.
