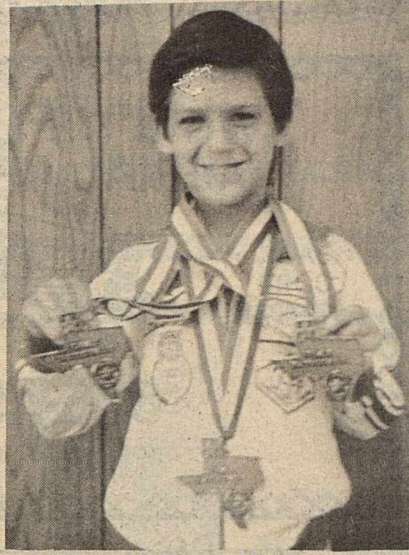

School Board Appoints Melvin Lowrey To Attend T.A.S.B. Assembly In San Antonio

Plains School Board met Monday, June 10 in the administration building with Jack Palmer, Melvin Lowrey, Terry Davis, Edwin Livengood, Ty Earl Powell and Jack Spears present.

Others present were Dean Andrews, superintendent; Wanda Ashburn, business manager; principals Robert Parks, Jim Conner and John Nance; and James Smith, resource center director; M.L. Standefer and Bill Wagner.

Following the reading and approval of the minutes, the board appointed Lowrey as delegate to TASB assembly to be held in San Antonio, Sept. 28, with Davis as alternate.

Board voted to enter into a contract with Student Plans Southwest for an all-school insurance coverage, and with National Federation of State High School Associations for liability policy with lifetime medical and disability settlement option and basic catastrophe accident medical policy.

Bids for a 1985 pickup to be used by the VoAg department were opened and Gene Messer Ford was awarded the bid at a cost of \$10,027.81 for a 1985 Ford, four-door, F350 crew cab pickup as specified.

Bids submitted for the purpose of installing an epoxy bonded aggregate paving of the swimming pool deck area were opened with the bid from Futura Stone at \$7,620. being accepted.

Bids for a telephone system was awarded to Lanier Business Products at a cost of \$9,550.

Board accepted the annual evaluation for the school as presented by the principals.

School calendar was reviewed and board voted to leave it as it was adopted March 4.

Junior/Senior High Handbook was adopted as presented; board authorized Supt. Andrews to destroy the 1985 trustee election ballots and the May accounts

payable were approved for payment.

Financial reports on general operating, cafeteria, tax and transportation were made by Supt. Andrews.

Utility costs from January 1981 through May 1985 were presented. Supt. Andrews reviewed the status of various school project and presented information concerning future school board meetings and the presence of friable asbestos in the schools, stating there was none present.

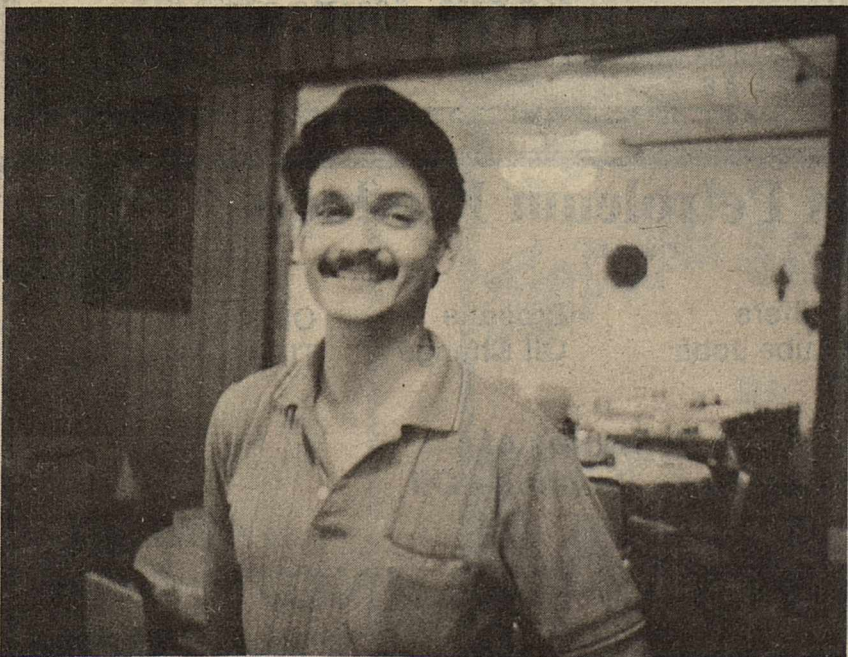

Ladd Winn Named National Champion In Amarillo Meet

Ladd Winn became the 1985 USAF National Championship winner in power tumbling and trampoline competition Saturday, June 8 in Amarillo.

Tumbling since the age of two and one half, his previous National Championship competitions were in Cleveland, at the age of six, and in Las Vegas at the age of seven. He was the youngest competitor in the Cleveland meet and placed fifth in the nation both years.

His sister, Ashlee, 10, has also been tumbling since the age of three and one half, and placed 10th in the nation in the Cleveland competition. She qualified in the Amarillo meet to compete in the Junior Olympics. Open to competitors 18 years of age and under, only the top eight contestants place, regardless of age. Ashlee placed 7th in the nation in trampoline.

Ladd and Ashlee, along with their partners, also competed in synchronized trampoline, placing 2nd and 8th, respectively. They will be preparing for Intermediate World Competition in Ohio in July, and the World Acro Games to be held in Paris, France in October, 1986.

Members of the Acro Spirits and the Plains Royal Bounders tumbling teams, Ashlee and Ladd are coached by Pat and Sherry Green.

Subscription Sells To Begin For Paper

Announcement is being made this week that subscriptions to the Plains Pride will be sold to those wishing to have the paper mailed to them.

The trial period of three months for the new publication for Plains is up at the end of June and free distribution will be discontinued, as agreed when the paper was started.

Subscriptions will sell in Yoakum and surrounding counties (those that touch Yoakum borders) for \$15 for one year or \$25 for two years. Tax must be paid, which would make the total for one year \$15.77 and for two years \$26.28. All other subscriptions will sell for \$16.82 for one year (tax included) and \$27.33 for two years (tax included.)

From The Superintendent's Desk

Last week I talked about the 69th Legislature and some of the changes that affect our school system. I want to share additional information with you this week. It seems that we receive new information daily.

We see the major change for our school as being the 1-22 teacher pupil ratio in kindergarten and first grade. This will necessitate the employment of two new teachers.

The duty free lunch period for teachers will be handled by teacher aides.

The no-pass no-play rule will present a real problem for most schools

and ours is no exception. We have hopes that the Stateboard of Educations will make a few changes to help solve some of the problems. We are also hoping for help in discipline management that will allow administrators and teachers the right to discipline students in order to create an atmosphere conducive to learning.

We will advise you of other changes as they occur and will continue in our efforts to implement those changes to the benefit of the students of Plains Independent School District.

She has a son Clint, age 12 and daughter, Molly, age 6.

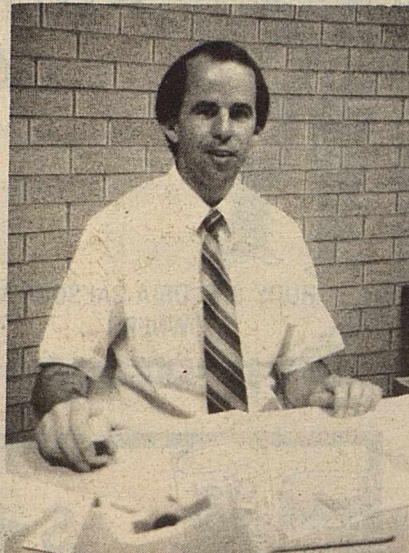
Her hobbies include playing the piano, cooking, swimming and Bible study. She also likes to collect unusual pieces of pottery when they travel.

His hobbies are hunting, wood-working and fishing. He also enjoys working with young people of all ages.

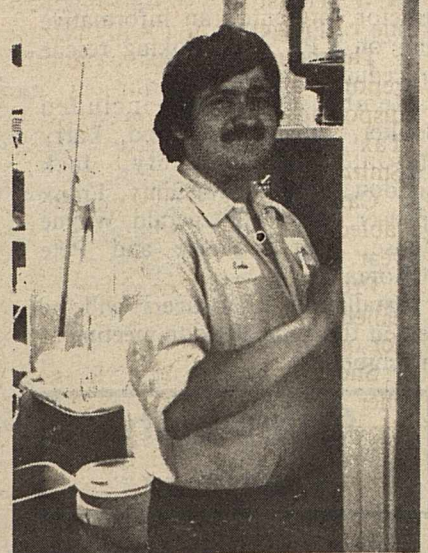


STEVEN ALLDREDGE, special education instructor and special ed language arts and math teacher, received a BS degree in Park Administration and a MA in education from Texas Tech.



Texas Veterans Are Eligible For State Housing Assistance

According to Dan Beck, Veterans Service Officer for Yoakum County, a large number of veterans have used the State Housing Assistance Program to purchase a home. This program was established by the Texas Legislature in 1983, and went into effect February 1, 1984. Since that date, some 15,000 veterans have applied for the financial assistance provided through the State of Texas.

Eligible to participate in this program are veterans who were legal residents of Texas at the time of entering into active military service, and were honorably discharged after serving 90 days or more at any time since September 16, 1940. Also eligible are veterans who entered service from other states, but who have resided in Texas for five years or more.

Under this program, the eligible veteran locates the home he wishes to purchase, completes a purchase contract through a private mortgage company, and makes application to the State Veterans Land Board. The application papers are processed by the mortgage company, representing a down payment on the veteran's loan, and usually resulting in a lesser interest rate than would be applied to the loan without a down payment or a smaller down payment.

QUICK CRISP SUGAR COOKIES

Preparation: Assemble all ingredients and utensils needed. Have shortening or butter at room temperature. Grease cookie sheets. Sift flour once before measuring. Preheat oven to baking temperature.

Sift together into large bowl of mixer:

2 1/4 c sifted flour
1/2 t soda
1 t baking powder
1/2 t salt

Add:

1/2 c shortening or butter (soft)
1 c sugar
2 eggs, unbeaten
1 t vanilla or 1/2 t nutmeg
1 T milk

Beat on no. 2 speed until well

blended -about 3 minutes, scraping bowl while beating. Wrap dough in waxed paper and chill about 2 hours or roll out at once, if preferred. Roll out to 1/8 inch thickness on lightly floured board. Cut with cookie cutter which has been dipped in flour. Sprinkle with sugar. Put on prepared cookie sheet. Put a seeded raisin or nut meat in center of each, if desired.

Bake at 425° about 10 min. or until golden brown. Cool. Store in tightly covered container.

Makes about 2 1/2 dozen large sugar cookies.

HUNGARIAN COFFEE CAKE

1-Sweet roll dough recipe
1/2 c margarine or butter, melted
3/4 c sugar
1 t ground cinnamon
1/2 c finely chopped nuts

Shape dough into 1 1/2 inch balls. Dip into margarine, then into mixture of sugar, cinnamon and nuts. Place a single layer of balls in well-greased 10-inch tube pan so they just touch. (If pan has removable bottom, line with aluminum foil.) Top with another layer of balls. Let rise until double, about 40 minutes.

Heat oven to 375°. Bake until golden brown, 35 to 40 minutes. (If coffee cake browns too quickly, cover loosely with aluminum foil.) Loosen from pan. Immediately invert pan on serving plate. Let pan remain a minute so butter-sugar mixture can drizzle over coffee cake. To serve, break coffee cake apart with 2 forks.

SWEET ROLL DOUGH

1 pkg active dry yeast
1/2 c warm water (105° to 115°)
1/2 c lukewarm milk (scalded then cooled)
1/2 c sugar
1/3 c shortening, or margarine or butter, softened
1 t salt
1 egg
3 1/2 to 4 c all-purpose flour *

Dissolve yeast in warm water in large bowl. Stir in milk, sugar, shortening, salt, egg and 2 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Mix in enough remaining flour to make dough easy to handle.

Turn dough onto lightly floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, about 5 minutes. Place in greased bowl; turn greased side up. Cover; let rise in warm place until double, about 1 1/2 hours. (Dough is ready if an indentation remains when touched.)

Punch down dough. Shape, let rise and bake as directed.

*If using self-rising flour, omit salt.

Do-ahead Tip: After kneading, dough can be covered and refrigerated in greased bowl no longer than 4 days.

LAYERED DINNER

Place in layers in greased 2-quart casserole (8"):

2 c sliced raw potatoes
2 c chopped celery
1 lb ground beef
1 c sliced raw onions
1 c minced green pepper (optional)
2 c cooked tomatoes (#1 tall can)
Season layers using in all:
2 t salt
1/4 t pepper

Garnish with green pepper slices, cover and bake at 350° for approximately 2 hours.

6 servings

SWEDISH MEAT BALLS

Mix together lightly:
1 lb finely ground beef
1/2 c fine dry bread crumbs
1 egg
2/3 c milk
2 T grated onion
1 t salt
1/8 t pepper
1/8 t nutmeg

Gently form into small balls (1 1/2"). Brown in hot fat. Add about 1/4 c hot water. Cover. Simmer 20 minutes. Serve hot, with slightly thickened pan gravy. Serves 6.

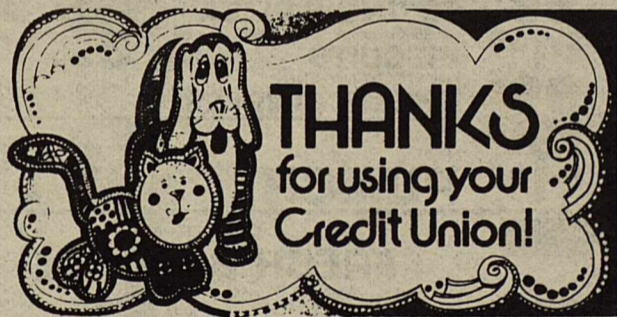

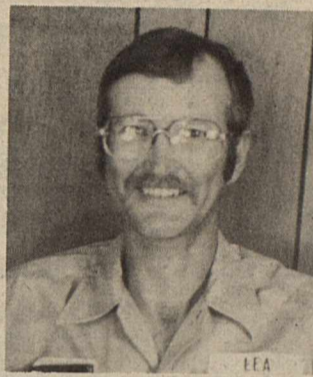


