Newell Squyres has been agency manager of Yoakum County Farm Bureau since January of 1980. The Bureau is located west of the Square.

Yoakum County Farm Bureau has 333 members. In addition to personal lines of insurance, the Bureau is politically active at state and national levels to benefit agriculture and implement member developed policies.

Farm Bureau sponsors various youth scholarships for free enterprise. It offers a property protection program and group purchasing of tires and batteries.

Among other benefits offered, the Plains Volunteer Fire Department receives a fee from Farm Bureau for rural fire calls to Farm Bureau member's insured property.

A nine-member board oversees the local Farm Bureau office. Terms of office are for two years.

Other fun events include tobacco spitting, three legged races and cow chip throwing contests.

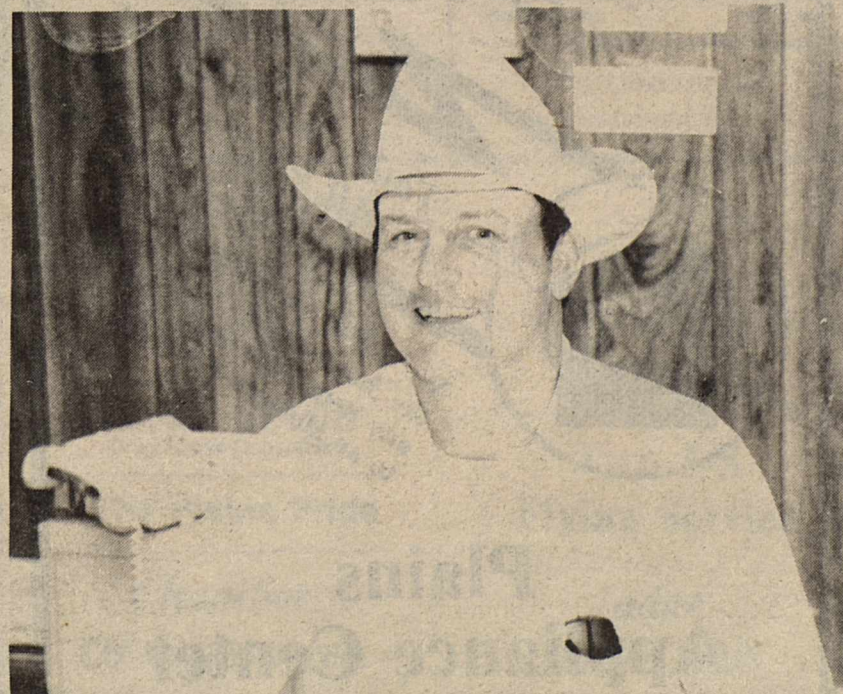
Stacey Bradley, a young lady from Denver City who was just

recently named Miss Texas National Teenager, will be a special guest.

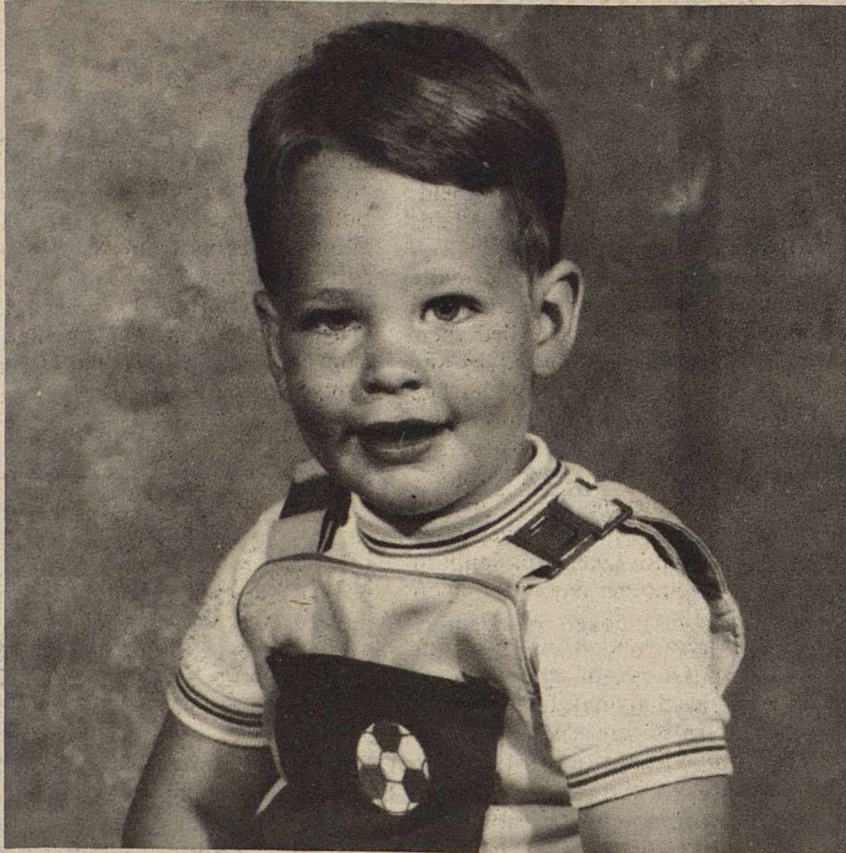
A two-man Scotch tournament is scheduled for interested golfers. Entry fee is \$30 per team. A hole-in-one on a designated hole will win a super cab pickup.

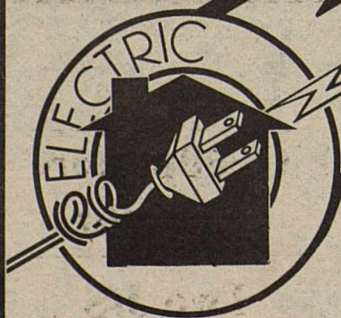
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Senior Citizens

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Champion Glider Pilots Make Forced Landing Here

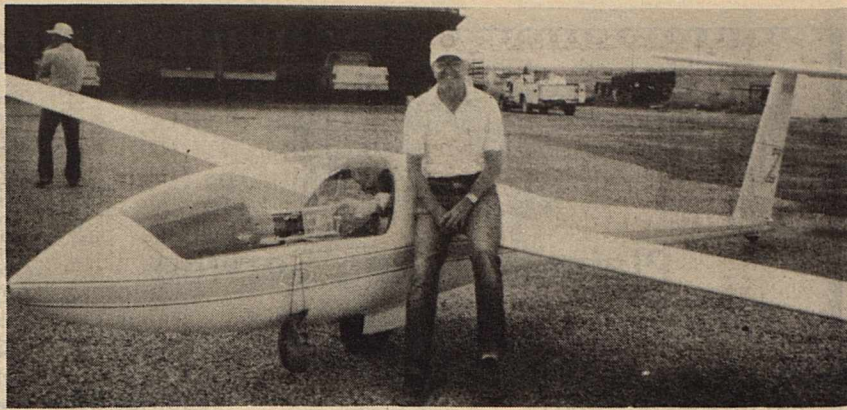
Six of the 40 sail-planes participating in the Region 10 Championship Contest held in Littlefield, June 24-28 landed at the Plains Airport Monday afternoon.

Glider or sail-planes normally cruise at 80-90 mph over a chartered course on air currents called thermals. Thermals are caused by the earth heating the air above it. The cloud cover Monday afternoon forced the pilots to land before reaching their destination.

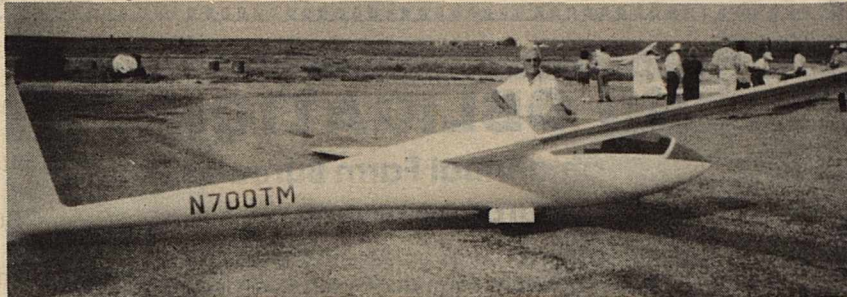
After contacting their ground crews, the pilots and planes were loaded up and taken via land in order to try another day of flying on Tuesday.

Pilots who landed in Plains included Al Hume, of Phoenix, Az, who has been flying gliders for 20 years. He is an engineer with Motorola. Jim Crisp, a Lubbock physician, has been flying the past ten years. Ed Shilen, firearms manufacturer from Ennis, has also

been flying ten years. Also Ken Jacobs, with 30 years flying time, is an engineer with LTV at Arlington. Bob Leonard, engineer and test pilot for Cessna from Wichita, Ks. Aircraft Corp. He, too, has been flying gliders for 30 years. Tim Feager, a construction foreman is from St. Louis, Mo. He has 16 years flying experience.

Active in the First Baptist Church, Gale enjoyed serving her first year as superintendent of the pre-kindergarten class at Vacation Bible School so much she has already signed up to serve again next year.

She is a member of Stateline Extension Homemakers Club, a 4-H Adult Leader and thoroughly enjoys being involved with her kids in 4-H projects.

Gale shares recipes that have become favorites. The biscuit recipe is one that has been passed down through four generations.

LIGHT BUTTERMILK BISCUITS

1 1/2 c flour
2 T baking powder
1/4 t soda
1 t salt
1 c buttermilk
4 T melted shortening

Preheat oven to 450° and melt shortening in 9x13 pan. Remove

from oven. Combine flour, baking powder, soda, salt, buttermilk and 2 T of the melted shortening. Stir until well blended. Pour onto generously floured surface. Sprinkle more flour liberally onto dough. Flatten and fold sides to middle, then fold top and bottom to middle. Repeat the folding 1 or 2 times. Flatten to about 3/4 inch thick and cut with biscuit cutter (any round-edged object will do) Use all dough. Coat one side of biscuit in remaining shortening already in pan, turn and place in corner. Repeat until all biscuits are coated and placed closely together. Pan will not be full. Bake at 450° about 10-20 mins. until golden brown.

FUDGY CHOCOLATE PIE

FILLING
1 c sugar
1/4 t salt
4 T cocoa
4 T flour
3 egg yolks
1 c milk
1 t vanilla
2 T butter or margarine
1 baked pie shell

Combine sugar, salt, cocoa and

flour in large sauce pan and stir to blend thoroughly. Add egg yolks and 1/2 c milk, stir until well blended and add remaining milk. Cook and stir constantly over medium heat until thick. Remove from heat and add vanilla and butter. Beat with electric mixer on high until smooth. Set aside to cool while preparing meringue.

MERINGUE

1 T cornstarch
1/2 c boiling water
6 T granulated sugar
pinch salt
2 T cold water
3 egg whites
1 t vanilla

Blend cornstarch and cold water in saucepan. Add 1/2 c boiling water and cook on medium heat until clear and thick. Let stand until cold. In a mixing bowl, beat 3 egg whites until foamy. Add 6 T sugar, gradually, while beating stiff - not dry. Add 1 t vanilla and salt. Gradually beat in the cold cornstarch mixture. Turn mixer to high speed and beat well.

Pour cooled pie filling into baked pie shell and spread meringue on top of pie filling. Bake at 350° for 15 mins. This meringue cuts beautifully and never gets sticky or weeps.

FLUFFY WHITE FROSTING (almost like Marshmallow Cream)

1/2 c light corn syrup
3 T water
1/4 t cream of tartar
1 1/2 t vanilla
1 c sugar
3 egg whites
1/4 t salt

In top of double boiler, combine sugar, corn syrup, water, egg whites, cream of tartar and salt. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating with mixer or rotary beater until mixture stands in peaks.

Remove from heat; add vanilla. Continue beating until frosting holds deep swirls. This is a real pretty frosting and tastes very good.

MEATY MEXICAN CHEESE DIP (Makes 2 Qts)

1/2 lb sausage
1/2 lb ground beef
2 lb Velveeta cheese
2 12 oz cans evaporated milk
1 med onion, chopped
1 8 oz jar medium or hot picante sauce
1 16 oz can refried beans
1 4 oz can chopped green chilies

Melt cheese in double boiler and add milk. Brown ground beef and sausage and drain. To meat mixture, add refried beans, chopped onion, green chilies, picante sauce. Mix well and heat until warm. Combine cheese and meat mixtures. Serve warm. Can serve from crock pot on low. (Half ingredients for smaller amount)

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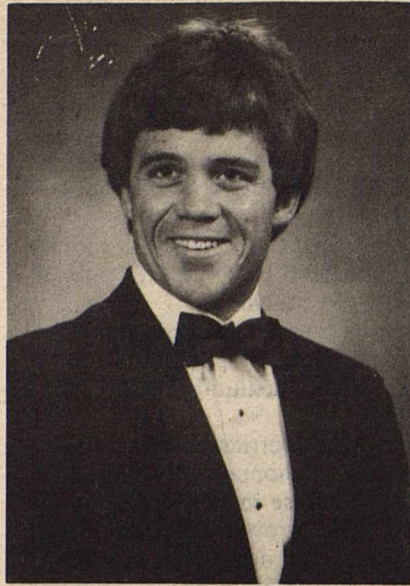

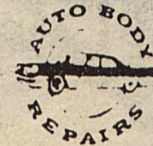

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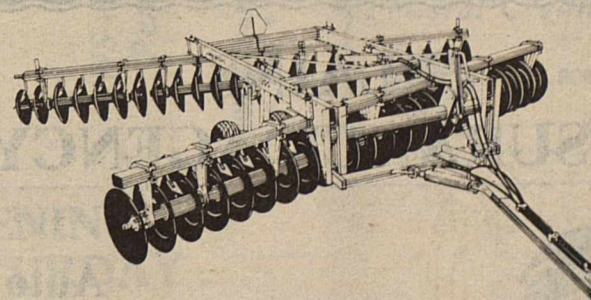
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Bridal Shower Compliments Mrs. Nick Hanna Sunday

From The Superintendent's Desk

This is the second of our reports concerning summer responsibilities. This week we will consider duties in the maintenance area.

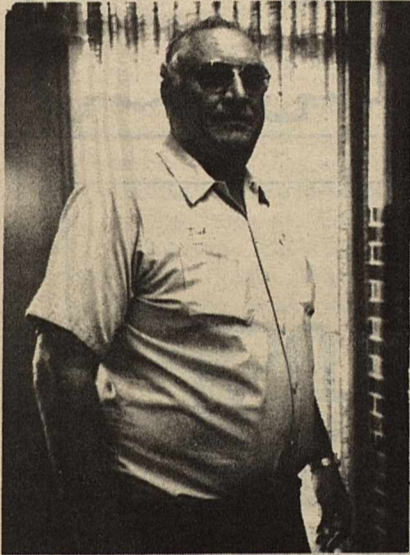
During the next few weeks our maintenance people will be trying to spruce up classrooms and generally improve the appearance of the facilities. In addition to the carpet cleaning, floor stripping and waxing, and general repairs there are many other projects planned. The high school girls gymnasium, swimming pool, high school hallway, classrooms, and the trim on buildings, will all receive a fresh coat of paint and carpet will be replaced in several classrooms. We will also install a new roof on the vocational agriculture shop and on part of the elementary building.

A new telephone system will be installed, and it is our hope that when you call, you will not hear that busy signal so often. We will also install new electrical wiring in the high school building and the junior high gym.

In the swimming pool area our filter flow system is to be repaired. This requires all sand and rocks to be removed from the filter so that the water is filtered correctly to provide protection from infection. In addition, we will install an epoxy stone surface in the swimming pool deck area. We hope that it will be possible to open our pool after July 4, 1985.

And, in our efforts to "leave no stone unturned" in maintaining an attractive facility, as our final detail each week, we will cut grass, cut grass and cut grass!

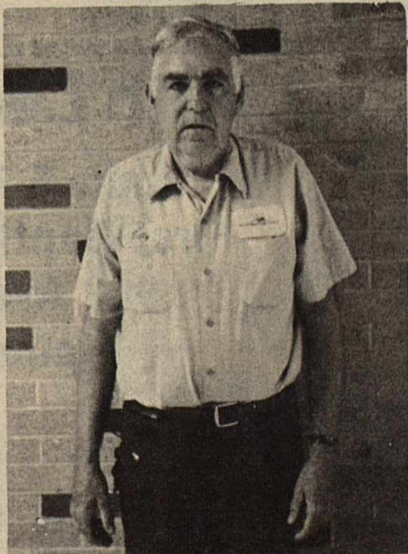

Randy Kennedy Tells Highlights

(Editor's Note: This story is shared by Randy Kennedy, one of 56 Texas teenagers to win a trip to Washington D.C., sponsored by the Electric Cooperatives of Texas.)

"Until recently, Washington D.C. was a distant, almost fabled city in my mind. I knew it only from images on a television screen or articles in a newspaper. During the last two weeks, however, this attitude has changed.

"This summer, I had the opportunity to participate in a five day tour of our nation's capitol, sponsored by the Electric Cooperatives of Texas. Fifty-six teenagers from Texas and almost one thousand youth, representing thirty-three states, were involved in the tour. Formally called the Rural Electric Youth Tour, the trip was originated by President Lyndon Johnson, as a way to educate youth in the process of government. 1985 marked the 21st anniversary of the tour.

"Our journey officially started on Friday, June 7, as the Texas participants and chaperones first met at the Lewisville Holiday Inn outside of Dallas. Dennis Engelke, tour director for the past ten years, made us all feel at home. The next morning, we embarked on a three day bus trip, making stops at West Memphis, Arkansas; Knoxville, Tennessee, and finally Washington. Throughout the week we toured such buildings as the Capitol, the Supreme Court Building, the Library of Congress and the National Archives. We visited many historic memorials including the Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, Vietnam and Iwo Jima memorials. Also on the list of sights were Arlington National Cemetery, Ford's Theatre, Mt. Vernon, and the Smithsonian Institute. On Wednesday, climaxing the official welcoming party was President Reagan welcomed Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi of India to the White House. A police motorcade escorted our twenty-two buses through downtown Washington to the White House, where we viewed the ceremony on the White House grounds.

"Sadly, the trip ended back in Lewisville on Tuesday, June 18, as we said goodbye to the many close friends we had made. We all ended our journey with a much clearer

sense of the importance of our democratic government, the people who lived and died to make it great, and the hard work of our present leaders. In each of our minds there

was a fresh patriotism and respect for America.

"To me, Washington is no longer a distant fable. It is real and it's fantastic!"
