



Plains Cowgirls, competing in the Monahans tournament Friday, fell to the Tigers in a three-game match, 16-14, 14-16, 15-8.

They bounced back on the next four games, however, to win four straight matches and advance to consolation.

They were victorious over Bronte 15-9, 15-2, Seminole, 15-8, 15-5, Alpine 15-5, 12-15, 15-11; and Fort Stockton, 15-8, 15-11.

Meeting the host team for consolation Saturday, the Cowgirls proved to be too much for the Loboes. Plains girls won the match in three hard-fought games, 14-6, 15-8, 16-14. Senior Terrie Spears served nine points.

All-Tournament honors went to seniors Traci Nance and Julie Culwell. Coach Cain stated, "I am very pleased with the Cowgirls' competiveness. The girls are improving with each game. I'm impressed with their teamwork and positive attitude."

Plains Junior Varisty competed in the tournament also and met Pecos, losing a three-game match 15-7, 23-15, 15-10. Odessa Permian fell to the Cowgirls 15-2, 4-15, 16-14. Tonya Lowrey led the offensive effort with 13 points. They played their final match against Fort Stockton, losing 15-11, 14-16, 15-8.

50 Subscriptions Still Required

Seatbelts Become Mandatory Beginning September 1

The Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 45 persons may lose their lives in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period.

"This number is an estimate, not a prediction," said DPS Director Jim Adams. We hope this number will prove to be far too high."

In 1984, 41 persons were killed in collisions during the holiday period, with five others dying later of injuries suffered on the Labor Day weekend.

In an effort to hold down the number of deaths, the DPS again this year will conduct Operation Motorcide, in which the deaths during the period beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 30 and ending at midnight Monday, Sept. 2 will be counted with periodic reports being made to the news media.

"Our philosophy is that public awareness of the number of people who are dying on our streets and highways will make drivers more cautious and help reduce accidents," Adams said.

On Sept. 1, Texas' new mandatory safety belt law goes into effect. The law provides a 90-day grace period before fines can be assessed.

"We're hoping Texans will start getting in the habit of using safety belts," Adams said. "If the vast

majority of motorists make a conscious effort to buckle up during this Labor Day holiday period, we will see a dramatic decrease in the number of deaths."

Last year, 28 of the 46 persons who died were killed in accidents where speed or drinking were fac-tors, Adams said.

"That amounts to 61 percent of the fatalities for the period," the director continued. "The message to Texas motorists is obvious; speeding and drunk driving kill."

In addition to conducting Operation Motorcide, the DPS will place additional troopers on duty to deal with the higher volume of traffic anticipated during the period.

"Mother gave me her child's sterling thimble after that...and since then, I have received thimbles for special occasions. When family and friends take trips, they usually bring me a thimble. I received two from Canada recently and two from Germany."

Sandra said that even the younger people think the thimbles are "pretty neat." Curt Randall sent her the thimbles from Germany.

"The day I put the thimbles on display at Yoakum County Library, there were several children who watched and asked lots of questions."

The exhibit at the library consists of thimbles made of porcelain, sterling, gold, pottery, horns, wood, crystal and pewter. Sandra's brother made her a thimble from a cow's horn and there is another from Scotland made from an antler and another made of leather.

Sandra said that "every daysomeone comes up with a new idea --and of course, I usually want the product -- I just don't always get it!

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



MEXICAN DELIGHT

1 head lettuce

1 sm onion

3 tomatoes

1 avocado

avocado

3 c pinto beans, cooked and drained 2 lbs hamburger

1/2 lb cheddar cheese, grated

In skillet, brown hamburger. Add chopped onion. Season with salt, pepper and garlic to taste.

In large salad bowl, shred lettuce, add chopped tomatoes, chopped avocado and beans. Add grated cheese to brown meat. Toss together and serve with tostados.

POLLO CON CALAVAZA

1 fryer, cut in pieces 6 med zucchini

3/4 t cumin ground seed 2 ears garlic or 1 t garlic powder

½ c tomato sauce

On medium heat, cook chicken in skillet until half done, about 15 mins. Slice zucchini into small pieces. Add to chicken. Add tomato sauce, cumin seeds and garlic and water. Cover and cook till zucchini is done. Add salt to taste.

MEXICAN FRUIT CAKE

20 oz can crushed pineapple (do not drain)

2 c flour

2 t baking soda

2 c sugar

2 eggs

1 c chopped pecans 2 c coconut (optional)

Mix ingredients together in order given. Do not use mixer. Pour into a 13x9 greased and floured pan. Bake at 350° for 35 mins. (Time may vary.) Let cool, top with:

8 oz cream cheese

1 sm box powdered sugar

1 stk oleo

1 t vanilla

½ c pecans

SOPAPILLAS

4 c flour

3 T baking powder

½ c shortening (Crisco)

1½ c warm water

Dissolve shortening in warm water. Add flour and baking powder. Let dough set a room temperature for 30 minutes. Roll into small circles and cut into quarters. Drop these into hot oil until brown. When ready to serve, pour honey over them.

FmHA Observes 50th Anniversary

The Farmers Home Administration is observing its 50th anniversary this year, still providing financial assistance to farmers and other rural residents and communities unable to obtain credit from other sources at affordable rates and terms.

Linda Brakebill, FmHA county supervisor, said that a total of 92 loans totaling \$5,031,580 and 73 subordinations to other lenders in the amount of \$1,923,948 have been made in Yoakum County this year.

Farmers Home is the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its predecessor agency, the Rural Rehabilitation Administration, was created by a presidential executive order in 1935. The Farm Security Administration succeeded that agency in 1937, and was renamed the Farmers Home Administration by a 1946 act of Congress.

Outstanding loans to Yoakum County residents total \$23,796,923, Mrs. Brakebill said. "Special emphasis is being placed this year on helping farmers with serious financial problems, restructure their debt so they can continue their opera-

New Equipment & Procedures On Tap For SPC Students

Student welding qualifications, a new hydraulics simulator and heating, gas furnace and electrical trainers highlight some of the new equipment and procedures on tap this fall for students in South Plains College's nine occupational training programs.

"Our occupational programs offer excellent training and prepare the student for immediate job entry," explained Frank Hunt, dean of SPC's Technical-Vocational-Occupational Division. "There's a real demand today for highly skilled workers; the key is in the training," he added.

SPC's occupational training programs include welding, automotive

and diesel mechanics, auto body repair, cosmetology, machinist trades, automotive machine, refrigeration/air conditioning and electronics servicing technology.

Registration for SPC's fall classes continues through Sept. 6.



I have been asked several times recently about the University Interscholastic League and school classification assignments.

The U.I.L. is a non-profit organization providing extra-curricular academic, music, and athletic contests for the students of Texas

There are five classifications of schools. They are Class A (134 students and below), Class AA (135-274 students), Class AAA (275-649 students), Class AAAA (650-1,304 students) and Class AAAAA (1,305 students and up). Plains High School with an average membership of 134.18 stayed in Class AA at the last re-alignment. We have the smallest enrollment of any Class AA school in the

In the month of October during the odd numbered years, the U.I.L. State Executive Committee will establish conferences and assign schools to districts. In 1981 Class AA school enrollments were 140-269. If present trends continue as they have for the past four years, then we predict that providing Plains High School enrollment for the 1985-86 school year is around 130 students, we may be in Class AA for a long time to come.


We will keep you informed as to new developments in the reclassification in the U.I.L. and its effects on our schools.

Our sympathy to Mrs. Scott and Ann; and all the Scott family. Also to Ross and Vennie Shook on the loss of a sister.


We have a new face in the kitchen. Mabel Beasley is now chief cook and also JoAnn is back. It's good to have her after a long illness.



"LEST WE FORGET"

Les Carey, Hillside Church of Christ Minister

Kipling wrote the following stirring lines: "Far flung our navies melt away...On due and headland sinks the fire;...All of our pomp or yesterday...Is one with Nineveh and Tyre...Lord God of host, be with us yet...Lest we forget, lest we forget."

It would do us much good in America to stop and do some serious thinking "lest we forget". There are many grave, complex problems facing this nation at this hour. A large number of them developed as a result of our forgetting about certain elementary principles that help a nation remain strong. Forgetting a principle does not change it, nor minimize its importance or need. A person may forget to brush his teeth, but this doesn't eliminate the need for brushing them.

Emergency Loan Applications Accepted Now Until April 1986

Applications for Emergency Physical Loss Loans to farms or ranchers who suffered severe physical losses (not production losses) due to the excessive rains and hail which occured June 2-5 are now being accepted at Farmers Home Administration office in Plains, FmHA Supervisor Linda Brakebill said.

Loans can be made for the amount of actual physical losses less any other compensation, such as insurance.

For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five percent; interest rate is eight percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.125 percent.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until April 7, 1986, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Mrs. Brakebill said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Plains is open from 8 a.m. until 12 noon and 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Field Day Planned

Research which can help Yoakum County farmers reduce irrigation costs and make more efficient use of the water supply, as well as the latest scientific information on crop production and control of weeds and insect pests will be featured during the 76th Annual Field Day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock/Halfway on Sept. 10, according to County Agent David Kight.

The TAES/High Plains Research Facility at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Highway 70, is host this year. The annual program center and its Halfway site, he explained. Tours will begin at 1 p.m. and conclude at 5 p.m.

Five major displays are planned on the motorized tours of the research plots and facilities. Dr. Doug Owen, research scientist at Halfway and chairman of the program, said these will feature reports and demonstrations on farming systems research, irrigation, weed control, cotton breeding and cotton insect control.

An additional stop, which can be reached by a short walk, will focus upon research being done in the production of grapes, an increasingly alternates between the Lubbock popular diversification crop for this
