Erhart Henry 'Hank' Goehry Services Conducted Thursday

Services for Erhart Henry "Hank" Goehry, 68, were held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday at the United Methodist Church. Former pastor, Rev. Tommy Wilson, of Rule officiated, with Rev. Louis Crenshaw, local pastor, assisting.

Goehry died Monday, at 10:35 p.m. in Highland Hospital in Lubbock following a lengthy illness.

Born in Norfolk, Neb., he had lived in Plains since 1945. A veteran of World War II, Goehry served in the Army Air Corp and achieved the rank of Master Sergeant.

Burial was in Plains Cemetery under direction of Singleton Funeral Home of Denver City. Masonic graveside rites by the Masonic Lodge of Plains and full military honors by Reese Air Force Base honor guard were conducted.

A well-known figure in the community, "Mr. Hank" was honored by the school Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday as flags were flown at half-mast.

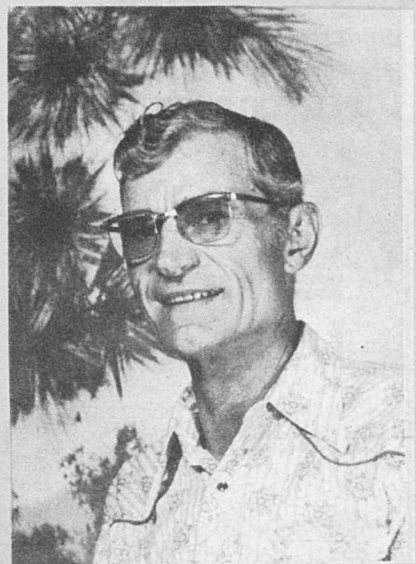
Goehry worked for Plains Independent School District for 27 years during which time he served as the only aircraft inspector in Yoakum County. He attended Spartan Aircraft Training School in Tulsa, Ok.

He married Louise Cheek June 27, 1944 in Norton, Kans. and was a member of United Methodist

Church since 1945. He was also a member of the church choir, Masonic Lodge of Plains, Worthy Patron of the Order of Eastern Star and a member of the American Legion.

He is survived by his wife, Louise; one son, Myron D. of Denver City; one daughter, Marilyn Reinert of Denver City; a sister, Bonnie Hudson of Colorado Springs, Colo.; a brother, E.F., of Norfolk, Neb.; four grandchildren and numerous cousins, nephews and nieces.

Pallbearers were members of Masonic Lodge.

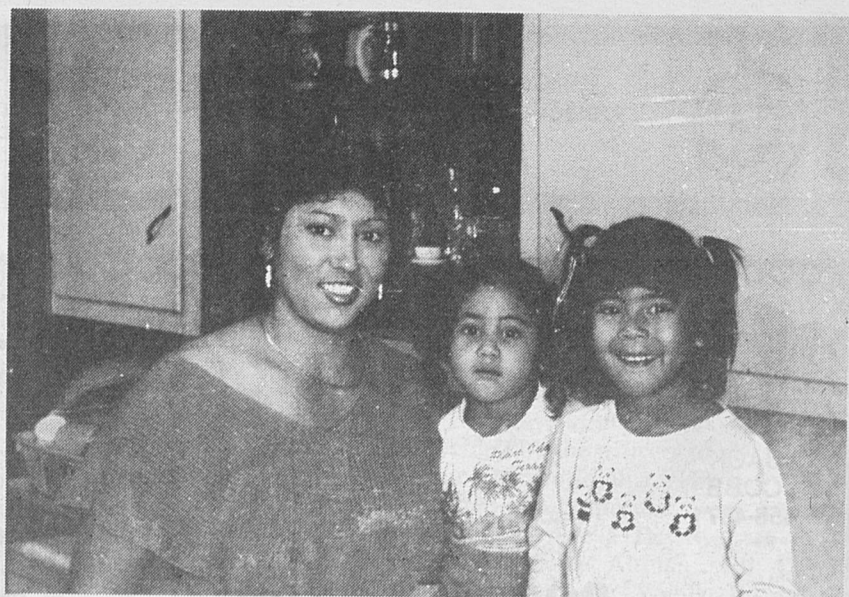
The show, which will be held in the old courthouse, will be open to the public from 3 to 5 p.m. It will honor the Texas Sesquicentennial celebration and will include conser-

YAH-KEE-MON-DOOS

1 lb ground beef
3 stalks of green onions
1 egg
1 T salt
1 T pepper
2 c flour
milk (to desired consistency)

Mix uncooked ground beef, green onions, egg and seasoning. In separate bowl, knead flour and milk. Roll out. Cut into medium circles. Add 1 T mixture to each circle, fold and press the ends together with a fork. Deep fry. (This is a Korean recipe)

KOREAN FRIED RICE

1 lb ground beef
2 stalks chopped green onions
1 chopped bell pepper
6 chopped mushrooms
4 T Soy Sauce
salt & pepper
1 1/2 c rice

In large skillet fry ground beef and mushrooms, season with salt and pepper. When almost fried - add chopped vegetables. While the beef is being fried, boil rice in another skillet, when tender, drain.

Add to the ground beef mixture. Mix well and add Soy Sauce.

SWISS CHRISTMAS COOKIES

("this recipe was given to me from a Swedish friend of mine")

3/4 c butter
1/2 t grated lemon peel
1/4 t lemon juice
3/4 c sugar
1 egg
1 egg yolk
2 3/4 c sifted all-purpose flour
1/8 t salt
1 egg yolk, beaten

Cream butter with lemon peel and juice, add sugar gradually, beating until fluffy. Add egg and 1 egg yolk, beating thoroughly after each addition.

Then add a mixture of flour and salt in fourths, mixing until well blended after each addition. Chill dough thoroughly, at least one hour.

Roll a third of dough at a time about 1/4 inch thick on a floured surface. Cut with fancy cookie cutters. Transfer to lightly greased cookie sheets, brushing tops with beaten egg yolk. Bake at 375° for 10-12 mins. Yield: about 6 doz cookies

FLUFFY LIME PUNCH

1 qt unsweetened pineapple juice; chilled
1 qt ginger ale; chilled
1 qt lime sherbet
1 qt vanilla ice cream

Combine ingredients in a large bowl. Using a hand rotary or electric beater, beat until just smooth. Pour mixture into a chilled punch bowl. Float lime slices garnished with small sprigs of mint in center of slices and serve.

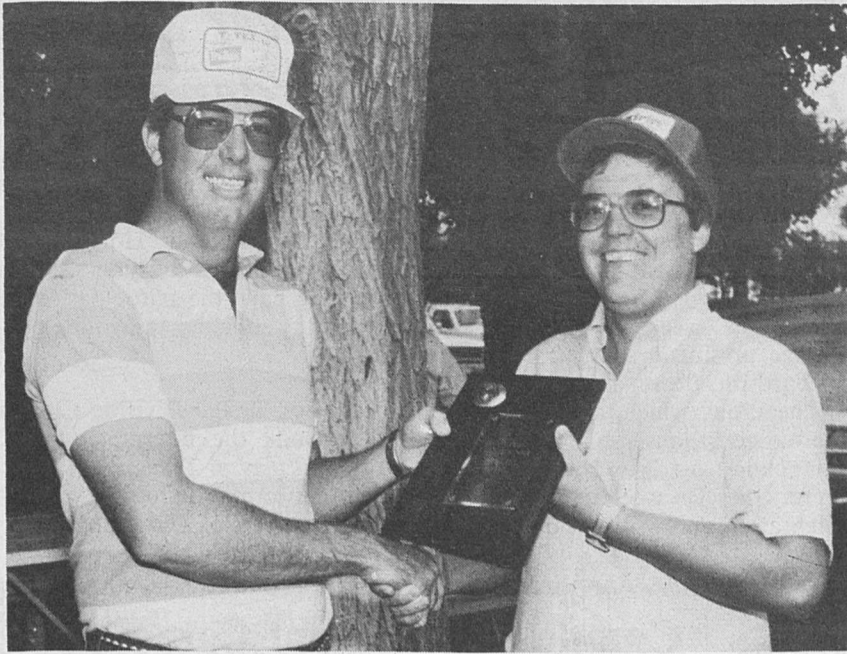

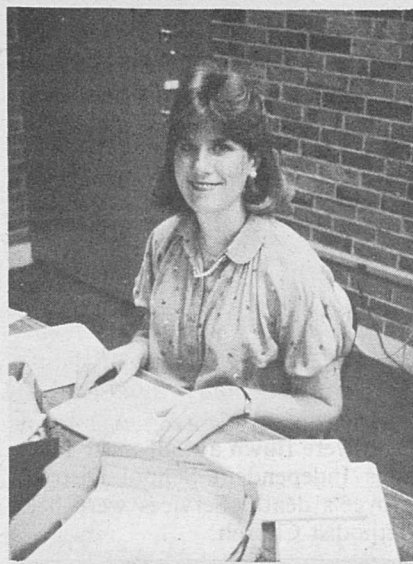

As the Cowboys look forward to next week's homecoming game against the Lorenzo Hornets, their season record stands tied at 2 wins, 2 losses.

The game got off to a fortunate start for the Cowboys as they won the coin toss and elected to receive. Following the kickoff, each team tried their luck at moving the ball on the ground -- first Plains from the 28 yard line and then Lubbock Christian from the 18.

However, both drives fell short, ending up in fourth down punts. Finally, on their next possession of the ball, the Cowboys took to the air and found success.

With 6:56 remaining in the first quarter, sophomore quarterback Shane McMinn connected with senior receiver Mickey McMinn for the first six points of the game.

Adding to this lead, senior Billy Curtis put the ball between the uprights for the extra point and Plains was on top by 7.

As the first quarter moved on, however, the tide started to turn against the Cowboys. The Eagle offense rallied back and as the last 33 seconds ticked off, LCHS running back Dusty Watts carried the ball in for a 75 yard touchdown. At the buzzer, the score stood 7-6, Plains.

In the second quarter of action, the score remained unchanged as neither team could seem to execute a successful drive or even keep possession of the ball. Plains' first attempt to penetrate ended after three short plays with a punt.

The Eagles then took control of the ball on their own 30 yard line but didn't keep it long either as quarterback Bruce Gilstrap made a bad pitch and fumbled the ball away.

This pattern of turnovers and punts occurred frequently throughout the second quarter with Plains having 5 possessions and LCHS having 4. And as the first half came to a close, the Cowboys retained their one-point lead with a score of 7-6.

As the second half got underway, the Cowboys rapidly began to lose momentum against the determined LCHS offense. With 7:52 remaining on the third quarter clock, number 42 Robbie Johnson carried in a 35 yard Eagle touchdown and put Lubbock Christian on top by 5.

With a successful two-point conversion, the score read 14-7 in favor of LCHS.

The Cowboys took control of the ball on their own 39 and executed seven good plays before tragedy struck again. Fumbling on the 48 yard line, the Cowboys handed the ball over to the Eagles for their next scoring drive. In a series of short ground attacks, LCHS drove the ball down the field 52 yards for a score. This time, Dusty Watts toted

the ball in from the one and upped the Eagle's lead by 6. Third quarter action ended with a score of Plains 7, LCHS 20.

The fourth quarter shut the door on the game as the Cowboys were unable to play catch up. Although sophomore Michael Diaz recovered a fumble with 6:01 left in the game and a 17 yard spiral to sophomore Scott Lowrey followed, the Cowboys failed to make the drive count.

A fourth down and 16 attempt at midfield was no good and the Eagles got final possession of the ball with 4:02 left on the clock. And in the final 53 seconds of the game, the Eagles once again penetrated for a TD, thus making the final score Plains 7, LCHS 28.

Next week will be homecoming at Plains High School as the Cowboys line up against the Lorenzo Hornets for their fifth game of the '85 season.
