Graveside Services Held Here For Bill Harris Powell

Services for Bill Harris Powell, 72, of Fort Sumner, N.M. will be at 9:30 a.m. Saturday (MDT), at the First United Methodist Church in Fort Sumner, with the Rev. Randy Loy officiating.

Graveside services will be held at the Plains Cemetery at 4:30 p.m. (CDT), with former pastor, Tommy Wilson of Rule, officiating. Assisting will be the Rev. Louis Crenshaw of United Methodist Church.

Powell died at 5:39 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 9, at the Clovis High Plains Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Born Sept. 30, 1913 on his father's homestead near Fort Sumner, he spent his early years

working on several major cattle ranches in West Texas. He married Wilma Luna of Plains, on April 22, 1934. They moved from this community to Fort Sumner in 1960.

Powell was a prominent cattle rancher and leader in the livestock industry. He was serving as a director of the Clovis Production Credit Association.

Survivors include his wife, two sons and their families, Dallas and Brenda Powell, Paul, and Penne Powell Richards of Sterling, Colo., Ty Earl and Linda Powell, Lebert and JoLena of Plains; two brothers, Joe Powell of San Angelo and Clyde Powell of Portales, N.M., two sisters, Mattie Ella Whitley and his twin sister, Gladys Dressler, both of Lyons, Kans.

Rehearsals for the community Christmas musical will be at 8 p.m. each Monday at First Baptist Church. Denis King will be the director.

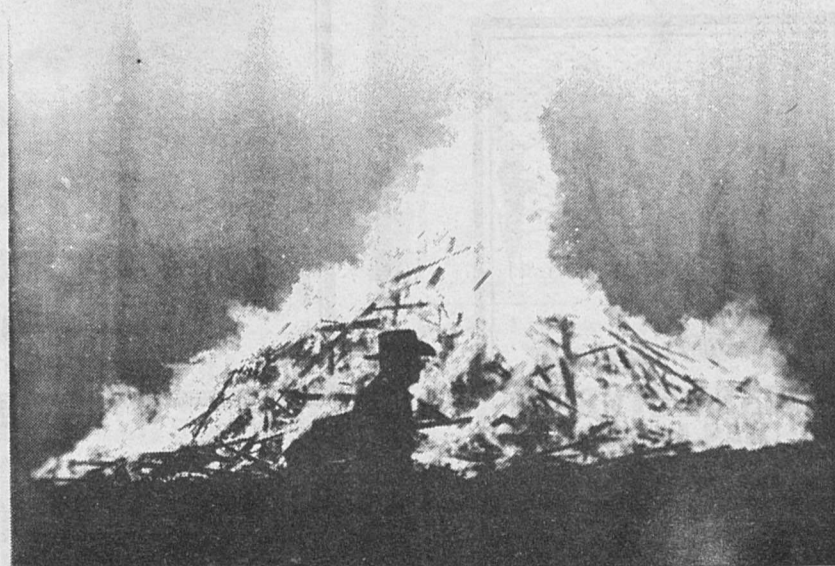

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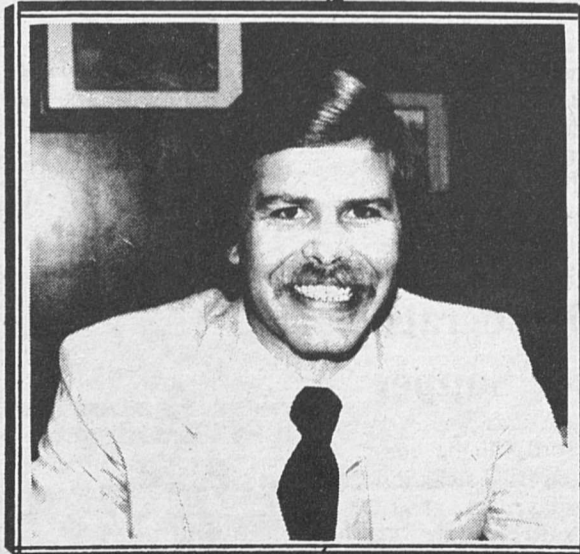

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Cowboys Put The Sting On Lorenzo Hornets, 40-7

The Cowboys sent the returning PHS "exes" away with some pleasant memories on Friday night, Oct. 4 as they rolled over the undefeated Lorenzo Hornets by a score of 40 to 7 in the fifth game of the season.

This victory provided a fitting climax to a week of homecoming festivities, including the bonfire Thursday, and the pep rally Friday. At present, the Cowboy record stands at 3 wins, 2 losses as the team looks forward to next week's game against the Shallowater Mustangs.

As the first quarter got underway, the Cowboys demonstrated quickly that they meant business. A twenty yard spiral to senior receiver Mickey McMinn and several runs by senior rusher Billy Curtis moved the Cowboys rapidly downfield. Then, with 9:29 on the clock, the Cowboys put their first six points on the board with a flea-flicker play ending in a pass to sophomore receiver Doug Green.

A strong Plains defense followed, and four plays later, the Cowboys once again had the ball. This time, the touchdown came in the form of a 19 yard pass from quarterback Shane McMinn to sophomore receiver Scott Lowrey. Adding to this, the Cowboys faked the kick and ran in a successful two point conversion. So, as the first quarter came to an end, the Cowboys had built up a 14 point lead on the Hornets.

The second quarter saw much of the same kind of action as the Cowboys put two more touchdowns on the board and again held the Hornets scoreless. On an impressive drive starting from their own 29 yard line, the Cowboys alternated between running and passing to move the ball far downfield to the one yard line. Following center

Ronny Wall's lead, quarterback Shane McMinn then toted the ball across for six.

With a successful extra point, the Cowboys were on top 21-0. The final minute of the second quarter was winding down when the Cowboys pulled off their next surprise and recovered a fumble on the Lorenzo 34. Again, taking the ball to the one, they scored in the final 16 seconds of the quarter. At the half, the score stood Plains 27, Lorenzo, 0.

The Cowboys came out after the half and immediately got the upper hand again as they recovered another Hornet fumble, this time on the Lorenzo 33. Next, squeezing by a fourth down and six situation, the Cowboys upped their lead once more as junior Martin Barrientes ran the ball into the endzone.

The Cowboys were ahead of the still scoreless Hornets by 34 points. However, the Hornets retaliated on their next drive by fighting their way down to the Cowboy 11 yard line, and sending number 40, Shannon Winn into the endzone for six. A good extra point attempt followed and, as the third quarter buzzer sounded, the Hornets had made a 7 point dent in the Cowboy lead.

The fourth quarter sewed up the victory for the Cowboys as they stopped the Hornets short in a catch up attempt and added another touchdown to their 27 point lead.

With 7:21 left in the game, senior Mickey McMinn caught a quick spiral in the endzone from brother, Shane McMinn and put the Cowboys at an even 40. The Cowboy defense held the Lorenzo running team in place well, with only mild resistance from number 7 Ronny Young. And as the final buzzer sounded, the scoreboard read Plains 40 - Lorenzo 7.

The Cowboys will again be at home next week as they host the Shallowater Mustangs Friday, Oct. 11 at 7:30 p.m.

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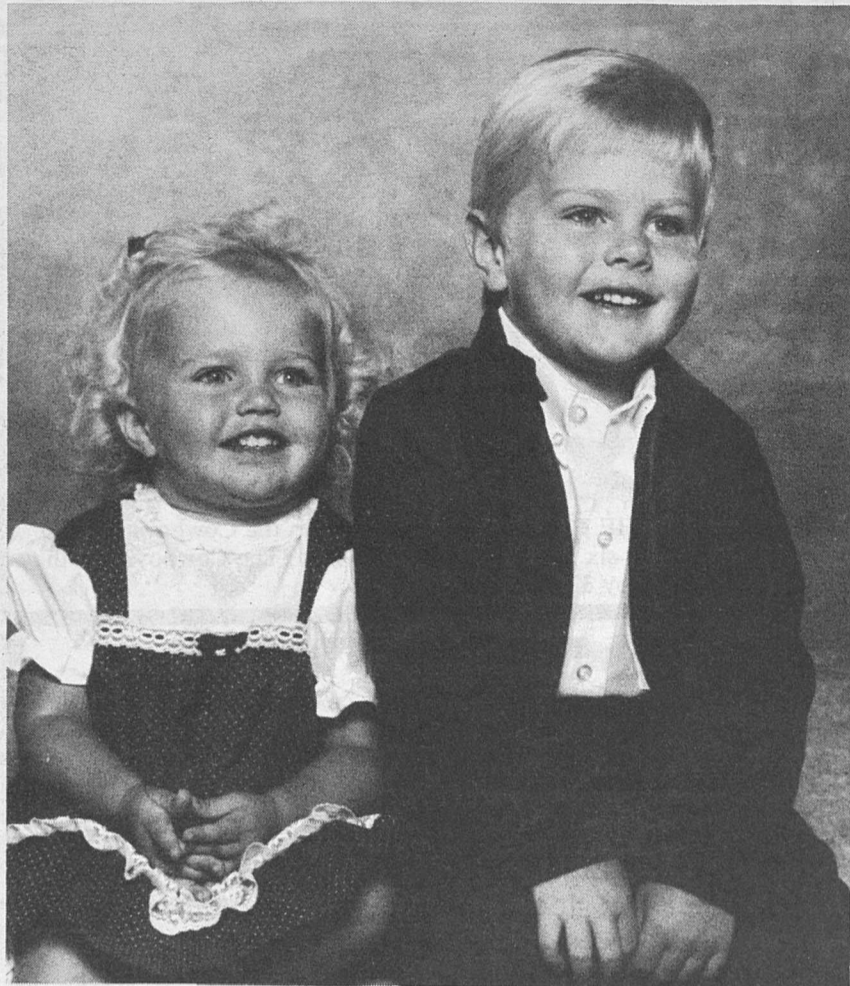

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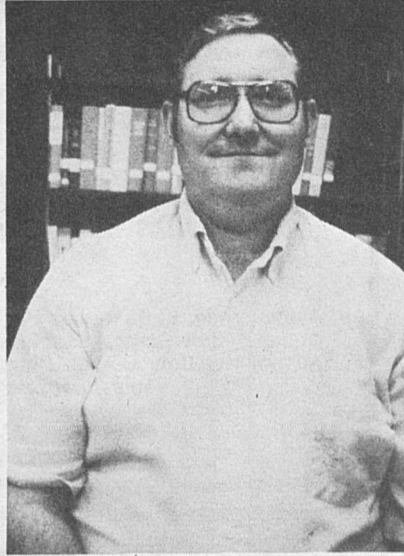

From The Superintendent's Desk

I am not sure that there is ever a good time to talk about taxes, however I hope that as you received your Plains Independent School District tax statement this week, you recognized that there is a reduction of two cents per \$100 value. Our tax rate for 1984 was thirty-six cents per \$100 value, for 1985 it is thirty-four cents per \$100 value.

Our Board of Trustees was able to reduce the rate because of the increase in property value for 1985. The total appraised value for our district for 1985 is \$946,414,790 which is an increase of \$45,943,029 over last year's value of \$900,471,761.

Of our taxable wealth of \$946,414,790 for 1985, \$896,665,540 or 94.75% is mineral and \$49,749,250 or 3.25% is local. Last year our total value was \$900,471,761 with the mineral being \$859,851,900 and the local being \$40,619,861. Our value gain this year is \$36,813,640 mineral and \$9,129,389 local.

The average tax rate for Texas schools for the past year was seventy-eight cents per \$100 value. We feel very fortunate to have our school and the tax base which provides for its operation.

"After winning the Plains Tournament this past weekend, I've realized what a group of competitors I'm working with," said Coach Pierce. "They worked hard the whole tournament and never let up. Congratulations again, Wranglers!"

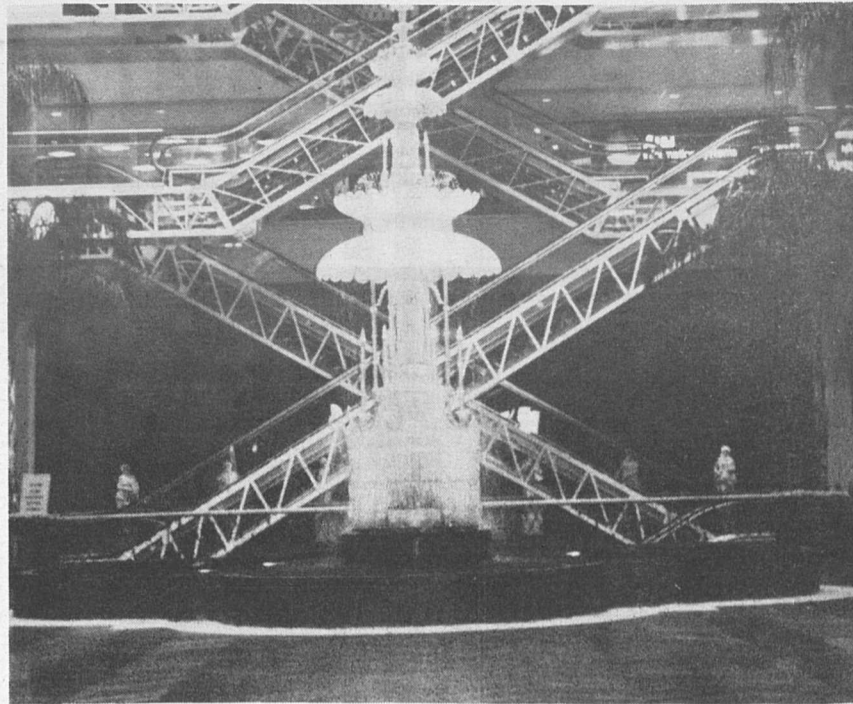
