$1 / 2$ pkg Betty Crocker Big Batch chocolate chip cookie mix (1 pouch) $1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ sugar
$3 / 4 \mathrm{c}$ dark or light corn syrup 1 T margarine or butter, melted 2 eggs
$11 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ pecan halves
Heat oven to $350^{\circ}$. Prepare cookie mix as directed on package for 3 dozen cookies except - press dough evenly in ungreased rectangular pan, $13 \times 9 \times 2$. Bake 20 mins.

Beat sugar, corn syrup, margarine and eggs until blended. Stir in pecans. Pour over baked layer. Bake until topping is dark golden
brown, 25 to 30 mins. Loosen edges from sides of pan while warm Cool; cut into bars about $2 \frac{1}{4} \times 1$ inch. 48 bars.
High altitude directions ( 3500 to 6500 feet) Decrease sugar to $1 / 3$ cup.

PISTACHIO-PINEAPPLE PIE $1 / 4 \mathrm{c}$ butter or margarine

## 2 c coconut

$11 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ milk
1 envelope Dream Whip, whipped 1 pkg Jello Pistachio instant pudding
1 can crushed pineapple ( $81 / 4 \mathrm{oz}$ ) Combine butter and coconut press in $9^{\prime \prime}$ pie pan. Bake $300^{\circ}$ for 20 mins. Cool. Blend milk, whipped topping, mix and pudding mix in bowl. Gradually increase beating speed and beat at high speed for five mins. or until thick. Fold in drained pineapple. Spread into pie crust, chill 3 hours.

## CHEESECAKE PIE

Beat together until smooth, two 8 oz. pkgs softened cream cheese, 2 eggs, $2 / 3 \mathrm{c}$ sugar and 2 t vanilla.
Pour into prepared $9^{\prime \prime}$ graham cracker crust. Bake in $350^{\circ}$ oven 25 mins. Combine 1 c dairy sour cream, 2 T sugar and 1 t vanilla. Spread pie with topping, sprinkle lightly with nutmeg and bake 7 mins longer. Cool, then chill.

Article 5972 of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes and Supreme Court order effective Sept. 1, 1985, requires each newly elected/appointed Justice of the Peace to complete a 40 hour course in the duties of the Justice of the Peace office and to also complete a 20 hour course each year thereafter. This article affects all justices who took office since Aug. 30, 1963. This training program is provided at virtually no cost to the county through a grant from the Texas Supreme Court.
