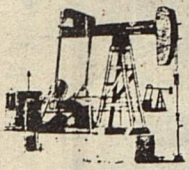

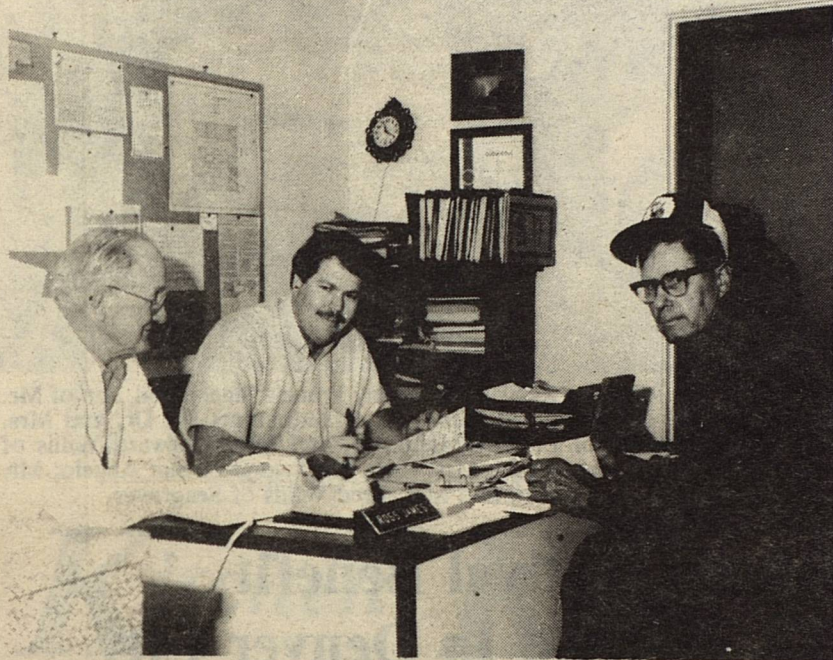

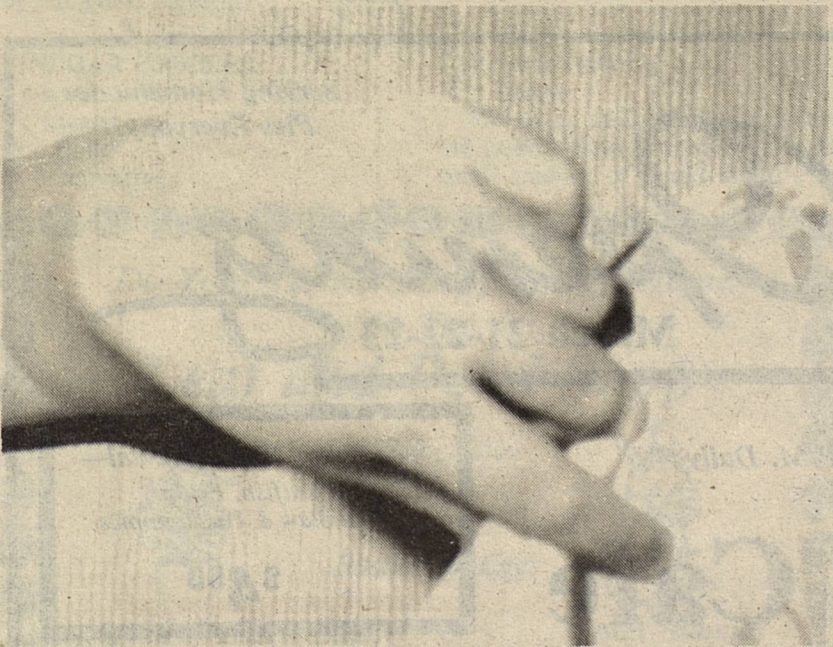

The sentiments on the cards are appropriate for a variety of occasions.

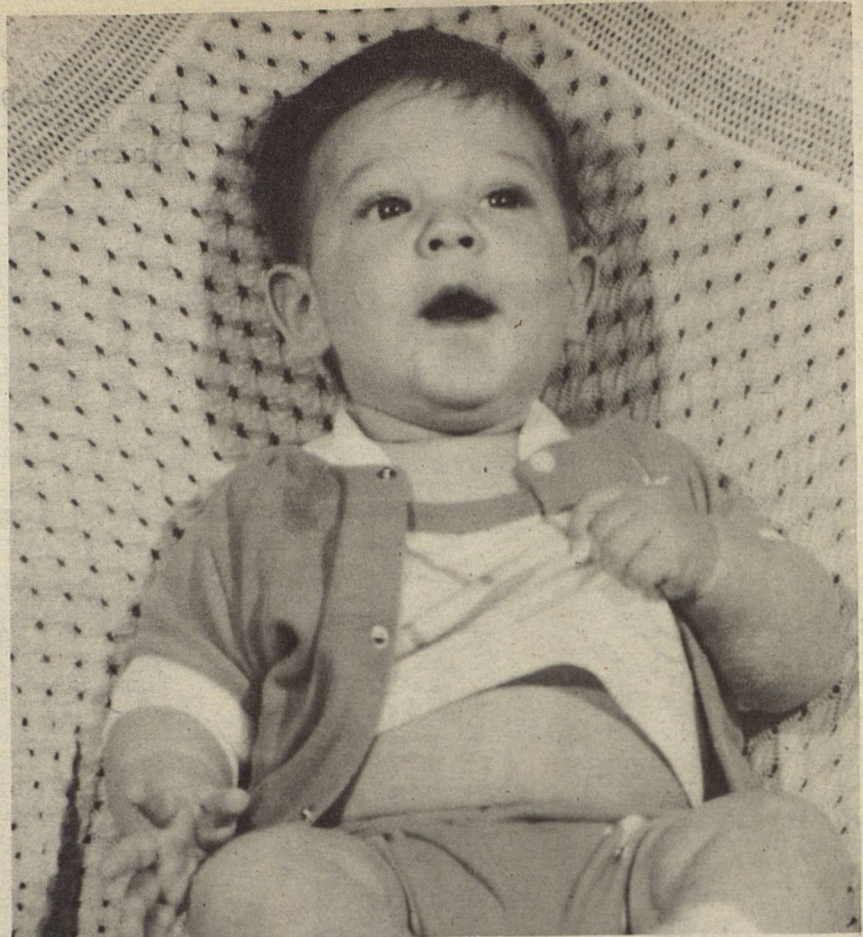
"The amount of the contribution is not disclosed to the recipient of the card. The contribution can be from one individual or from many, such as a family or a group of employees," she said.

all of sugar mixture. Mix well. Then slowly add to liquid. Again stir well. Add butter. Pour into oblong baking dish and cover with favorite pie crust. Sprinkle top with sugar and nutmeg. Bake at 350° about 40 mins. or until crust is brown. Will thicken as it cools. Best served warm.

BARBECUE MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 lbs ground beef
1 c bread crumbs
1 onion, chopped
1 egg, beaten
1/4 t pepper
1 1/2 t salt

SAUCE:

2 8 oz cans tomato sauce
1/2 c water
3 T vinegar
3 T brown sugar
2 T mustard
2 T Worcestershire sauce

Mix first six ingredients with 1/2 can of tomato sauce. Form into loaf and place into a shallow baking dish. Combine rest of tomato sauce

with rest of ingredients. Pour over loaf. Bake at 350° for 1 hour and 15 mins.

SPINACH DIP

1 8 oz frozen chopped spinach
1 c sour cream
1 c mayonaise
1 can chopped water chestnuts
1 med onion, chopped
1 pkg Knorr's dry vegetable soup mix
Cook spinach according to package directions. Cool and drain water out - well. "I squeeze it!" Chop ingredients and mix well. Chill at least two hours. Serve with raw vegetables or chips.

JOHNNA'S PINEAPPLE BREAKFAST CAKE

1 c crushed pineapple with juice
1 c baking mix
1 egg, well-beaten
1/3 c sugar

Mix together. Pour into greased cake pan and bake at 375° approx. 30 mins. or until done. Sprinkle with grape nuts and broil for a few seconds under broiler.

The group also attended several educational seminars conducted by outstanding leaders of the rural electric organization.

The PHS senior was able to attend the NRECA meeting in Las Vegas as a youth delegate through competition sponsored by Lea County Electric Cooperative's Washington Youth Tour program. A blend of sun, fun, education and hard work outlined the week in Nevada.

Commissioners Court

Commissioners Court met in regular session March 10 with all members present.

The court approved a report from the Tax Assessor/Collector of taxes collected for February and a supplement for January.

Approval was given for the County Clerk's establishment of a branch office for absentee voting in the Denver City community building and for the approval of Pearl Prewitt as temporary deputy for absentee voting at the branch office. The clerk's permanent deputies were approved for absentee voting at the main office.

Child Welfare Board members whose terms are expiring this year were appointed for three year terms. Those members are Johnny McCowen, Armida Ybarra, Bill Gravitt, Lisa Switzer and Corena Estrada who replaces Rosie Bitolas.

Juvenile Probation Officer Judy London discussed budget matters with the Court. At her request, transfer of \$2,000 from Service Category Residential Services to Other-Only Local Accounts was approved.

A budget amendment of South Plains Association of Governments was accepted in its capacity as Area Agency on Aging. The increase of \$75 makes a total of \$1,800 provided for transportation.

Concerned Local Residents To Lead County Study

Yoakum County leaders, as well as others throughout Texas, are concerned about rapid changes occurring in the state economy and population — changes that are placing challenging demands on resources of all state residents and their communities.

"These changes point to the need for identifying the most critical issues facing Texans today, and determining new directions the Texas Agricultural Extension Service should take as the state moves toward the 1990s," explains Mary D. Williams, county Extension agent.

This spring, a process for mapping a new plan of action for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be launched. Several Yoakum County leaders will be among more than 10,000 Texans, representing all 254 counties, who will conduct an Extension-sponsored study to identify key local issues.

"Local citizen input is crucial if Extension is to fully address educational needs that reflect the major concerns of all Texans," Williams notes.

The kickoff meeting for the Yoakum County study group has

been planned for Tuesday, March 25 in the Plains School Auditorium by the executive committee of the local Extension Program Building Committee (or Central Planning Committee).

At the local meeting, leaders will form four task forces for identifying the most critical issues in the broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth and community development, the County Agent says.

A second meeting is planned in about eight weeks, when the county study group will present its findings and finalize priority concerns.

As county groups complete their studies, issues identified across the state will form the foundation for a major new statewide Extension educational planning effort for the remainder of the decade, Williams explains.
