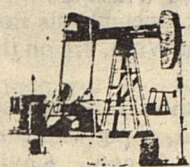

Plains High School Students Claim Math, Science Titles

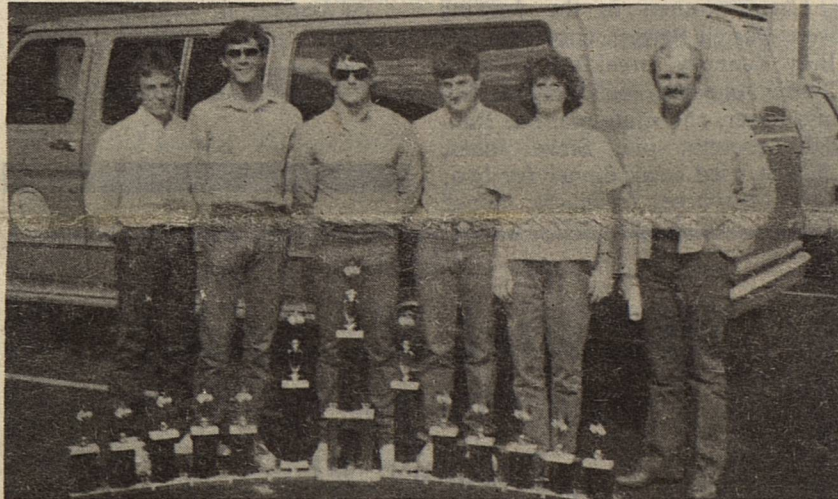

From The Superintendent's Desk

There are several items that I feel will be of interest to you this week. As you read this article there are forty-three school days remaining in the 1986-87 school year. This is a very crucial time in the lives of our students and it is most important that we continue to work toward maximum achievement as the school year nears its end.

We will be administering achievement tests during April. These tests are a very useful tool in measuring the academic achievement of our students. Test results are becoming even more important as we proceed with new school reform guidelines.

It was interesting to read this week that the now famous T.E.C.A.T. examination cost the taxpayers of Texas approximately \$138 for each individual taking the test. The total cost of the test including the day's salary for all employees, was approximately \$27,000,000.

In the next few days we will distribute language survey in order to identify those students eligible for the four year old kindergarten program to be offered next year. To qualify the child must be four years old by Sept. 1, 1986. If you know or are aware of a child that would be interested in and would qualify for our program, please encourage the family to complete the survey and return it to the school by April 15, 1986.

Sixty-two schools competed in the event with teams from Class A to Class 5A. Twelve Class AA schools competed.

The calculator team took the first place trophy with 916 team points, beating Liberty Hill's 798 points. Their coach is Devitt.

In the freshman division, Guetersloh won first place with a score of 218. In the sophomore division, Stowe was first with 254; McMinn, second with 254. In the senior division, Livengood was second with 190; Miss Nance, seventh; Kennedy, eighth; Wall, ninth; and Miss Lowrey, tenth.

Number Sense competition found Guetersloh winning first with 159 points in the freshman division; McMinn, first with 292 and Stowe, fourth, in the sophomore division. Scoring 173, Traci Nance was second in the senior division; Toni Lowrey, third, 104 points; Wall, seventh.

Number Sense team totals were 737 points for the first place Class AA division. Liberty Hill was runner-up with 587 points. Coach is Cullins.

The science team finished second back of Liberty Hill. Individual winners were freshman division, Guetersloh, seventh; sophomore division, McWhirter, fifth; McMinn, eighth and Stowe, ninth; and senior division, Wall, second with 124 points; Livengood, third with 77, Kennedy, fourth, Traci Nance, fifth and Toni Lowrey, ninth.

The math and science teams have put in many hours in preparation for UIL and will compete April 4 in Shallowater. Students winning there will compete in regional events two weeks later in Big Spring.

County & District Clerks Attend State Conference

Yoakum County Clerk, Ruby Bruton and District Clerk Mae Barnett joined some 450 other officials for the 14th annual County and District Clerk's Seminar, March 18-20. Theme of the seminar was "Informational - Not Political".

"During an election year, we're interested in efficiently carrying out our job of conducting elections," said Ruby Bruton, County Clerk. "This means staying abreast of current information about election codes and responsibilities rather than political rhetoric.

"Conferences such as this give us an advantage in providing the best public service possible while minimizing the burden on taxpayers," explained Mae Barnett, District Clerk. "With federal and state governments cutting back on funds for local governments, county officials have to be more resourceful in making ends meet."

During the seminar, the county

and district clerks were addressed by Robert Aldemeyer of Kenton County, Ky., president of the National Association of Counties, and Texas Secretary of State Myra McDaniel.

Major discussions included election codes, probate law, child support enforcement, records management, juvenile law and bankruptcy sales.

The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The institute provides a forum of mutual support for county officials, the Extension staff and various government, academic and business leaders of Texas.

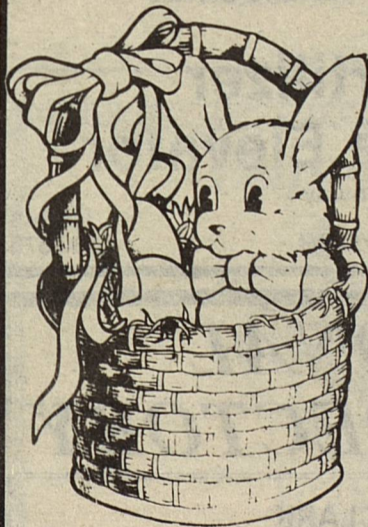

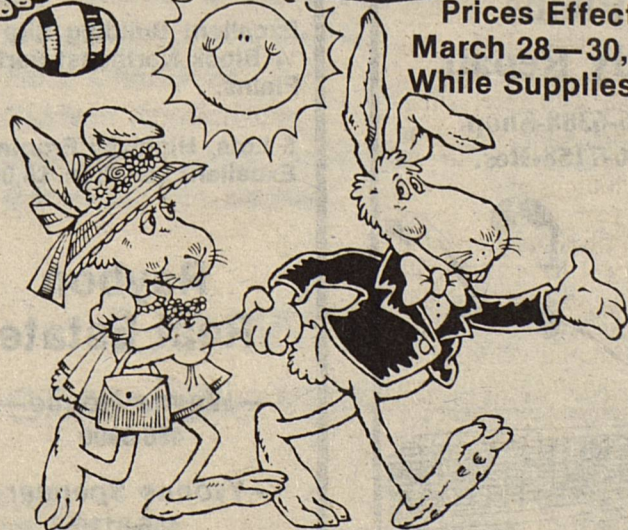
