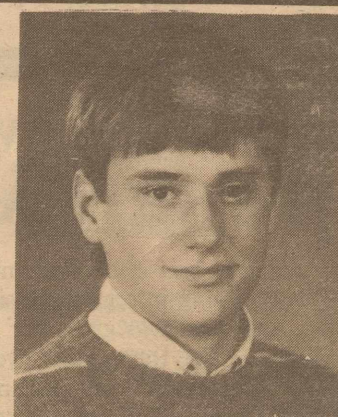

800 Number Now Provides Scholarship Information

The Scholarship Bank announces a new 800 number program for high school and college students needing instant access to private scholarships and loans.

According to The Scholarship Bank, over 500 million dollars in private financial aid is available to students in the form of scholarships, grants, summer internships and loans. The average dollar value of each grant is over \$1000 and the bank will send students in excess of 65 separate grants. According to the director, students may qualify on the basis of major, occupational goal, geographic preferences, type of aid requested, religion, parent's

union, military or employer background, and whether the student is willing to work in an internship, enter a contest or conduct specific research. Numerous grants are given by trade groups and corporations to students with a specific major or an expressed willingness to work for the donor following graduation.

Students should call 800-332-4432 or 800-332-4431 (California residents) and will then receive applications to fill out. Students applying for fall aid should plan to have completed scholarship applica-

tions returned to the individual donors no later than May 1, although some may have earlier deadlines.

According to the director, over 30,000 students have used the services of the bank, a nationwide non-profit organization. Students may also send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to 4626 N. Grand, "J" Covina, CA. 91724 if time not of the essence.

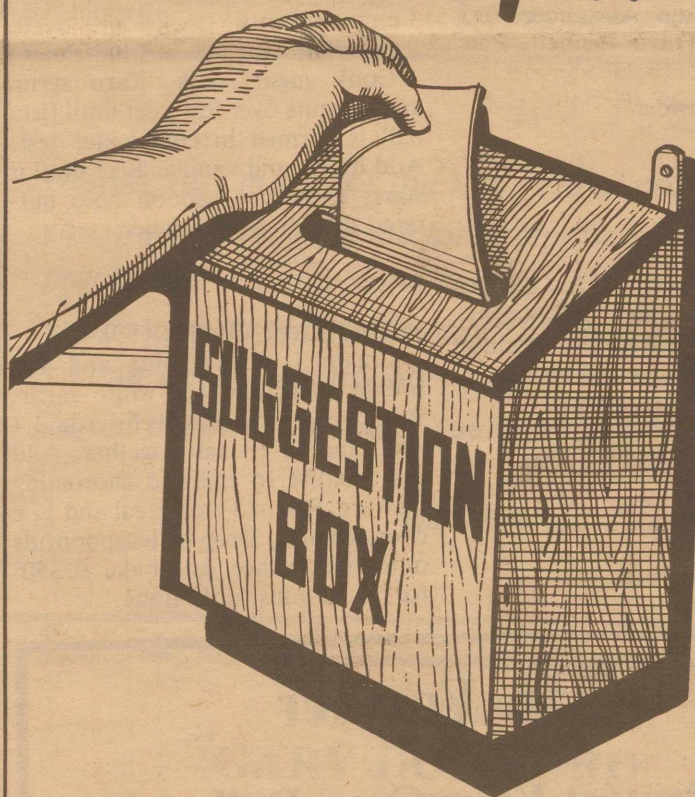

SOUR DOUGH PANCAKES

1 c flour
2 T sugar
1½ t baking powder
½ t salt
½ t baking soda
1 beaten egg
1 c sour dough
½ c milk
2 T cooking oil

Mix and pour rounds on hot griddle. When bubbles form and sides cook slightly, flip over and continue cooking until golden brown.

PEANUT PATTIES

2½ c sugar
1 c evaporated milk
2 T butter
¾ c white Karo syrup

3 c raw peanuts
1 t vanilla

Cook sugar, milk, Karo syrup and peanuts over low heat until firm ball is formed in cold water test. Add butter and vanilla. Beat until it starts to harden. Spoon onto buttered dish or waxed paper.

MOM'S OATMEAL COOKIES

Cream 1 c shortening and 1 c brown sugar and 1 c white sugar. Add 2 eggs and mix well. Add 1 t soda and ½-1 t salt together. Add dry mixture to egg and shortening mixture. Stir in 3 c oatmeal and ½ c chopped nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto cookie sheet and bake at 350° for 10-12 mins. until done.

Car Seats May Be Purchased With Full Cost Refunded

Yoakum County Farm Bureau members can now buy infant car restraint seats at a special price from the manufacturer, and, in addition, be refunded the full cost, according to Lanny Smith of Plains, county president.

"Car accidents are the leading cause of death for children under 5 years of age," said Smith. "That is especially tragic when one realizes that most such deaths and serious injuries could have been prevented with a child-restraint seat."

Child-restraint seats are also required by law in Texas.

To encourage the use of such seats among Farm Bureau members who have small children, the Texas Farm Bureau is introducing the child-saver program.

Arrangements have been made with the manufacturer for Farm Bureau members to buy an infant car seat for just \$20. The seat which normally retails for about \$60, can

be kept or passed on to someone else when the child is older. Or, the member can choose to return it to the county Farm Bureau office for a full refund of \$20.

To obtain a Safe-T-Seat, members can pick up an order form at the county office at 902 Ave E in Plains. The order form is to be filled out and sent along with a check for \$20 to the manufacturer. The TFB will pay the difference, including shipping charges. The Safe-T-Seat will be shipped directly to the member.

The seat, a convertible model, is suitable for small children up to 40 pounds or 40 inches, meeting all federal standards. It is also approved for most commercial and general aircraft.

The number of safety seats will be limited to three per member. For additional information, you may contact the county office at 456-2790.

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Voice Of Business

"My father taught me to work," Abraham Lincoln said. "He did not teach me to love it."

Honest Abe was neither the first nor the last to complain about work. At one time or another, we have all griped about the same thing.

Still, there are few of us who do not recognize a moral and social obligation to perform useful work, even if we are not financially obligated to. To regard indolence with contempt is one of the most distinctive, and attractive, aspects of the American character.

Thus, it isn't surprising that we agonize a great deal about welfare. We accept an obligation to provide for those who, for one reason or another, are unable to provide for themselves. But how can we make such provision without discouraging aid recipients from seeking gainful employment?

We are currently embarked upon a great national experiment to resolve this dilemma called "workfare." Though it comes in various forms, the basic idea is to place able-bodied welfare recipients in productive jobs. The goals are to reduce the costs of welfare programs, provide welfare recipients with practical work experience, and reduce the stigma attached to welfare programs.

In 1977, Congress authorized workfare in the food stamp program. Seven demonstration workfare programs were launched in 1979, a number since increased to 39.

By most accounts, the results have been reduced and many people once considered hard-core unemployed have gained their first experience as productive members of society.

In my view, that latter item is even more important than saving taxpayer dollars. Critics of workfare insist it is degrading and cruel to force the poor to work for their daily bread. But though we all complain at times about work, and even Abe Lincoln was less than fond of it, the fact remains that work is an essential part of every human life. It represents much more than a means for paying bills. It is the source of our pride, character and sense of self-worth.

It is through what we do, not what we have, that we obtain self-esteem as useful, productive members of society. If workfare enables even a few welfare recipients to experience that, it will be a successful experiment indeed.

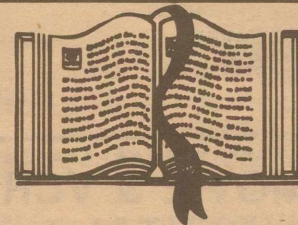

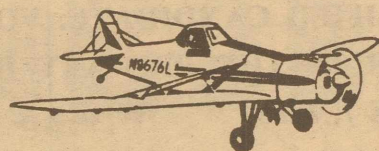

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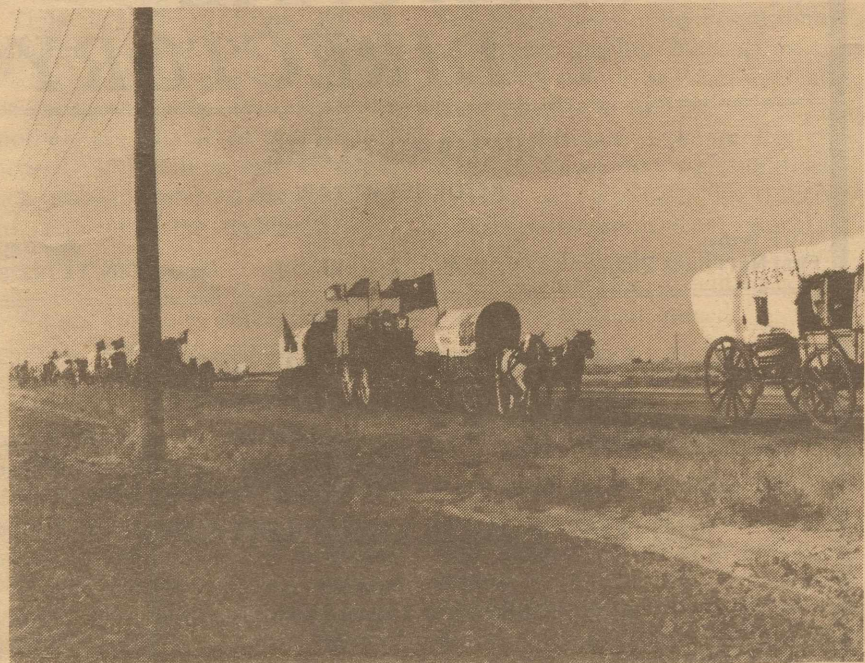
