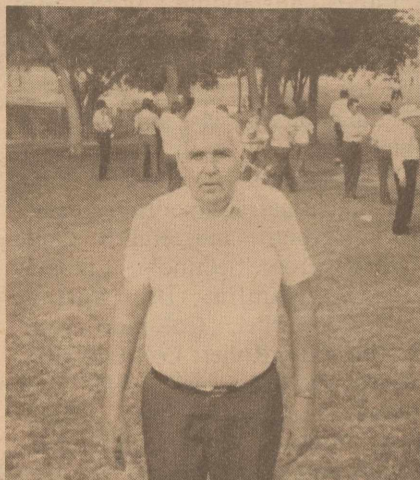

The couple will exchange wedding vows July 12 in First Baptist Church of Cisco.

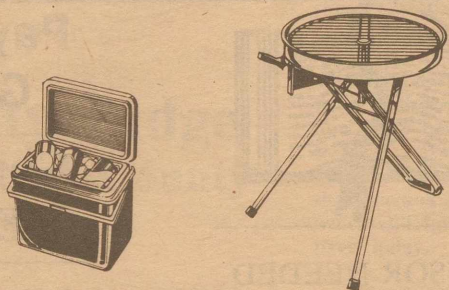
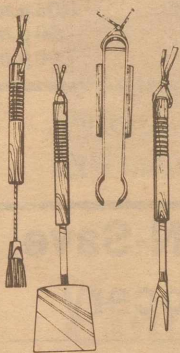
Miss Schaefer is a graduate of Cisco High School and attends Cisco Junior College. She is employed by City Drug in Cisco.

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Emergency Loans Available For Disaster Stricken Farmers

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration, Ross W. James, FmHA county supervisor, said recently.

James asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought, grasshopper infestation, hail, flooding and high winds which occurred between January 1, 1985 and December 31, 1985 make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 604 9th Street, in Plains.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until January 15, 1987 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings, (including

homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Mr. James said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of five percent for the first \$100,000 and eight percent on any amount over \$100,000 and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay. Applicants who certify that other credit is available may also receive these loans at a higher interest rate.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

Pecan Trees Benefit From Zinc Application

Pecan trees in the home landscape will grow faster and make nice shade trees with zinc applications applied in a foliar spray. There is still time to apply zinc, according to Mary Dale Williams, County Extension Agent. Pecan trees should not be fertilized after June.

George Ray McEachern, Extension Horticulturist, shares the following information: Beautiful pecan trees and regular harvests of high-quality pecans begin each spring with frequent zinc sprays. Good foliage is the secret to optimum growth, healthy trees and regular production. Mature pecan trees can have double the amount of foliage with three or four zinc sprays in April and May. Leaves on mature trees are full grown by June, so spray early and frequently. Young pecan trees can grow six feet instead of six inches in one year if zinc is sprayed onto the foliage every two to three weeks from April until August. This is, of course, in combination with a good management

program. There are three types of zinc which can be used in Texas: Zinc Sulfate, NZS or NZN. Each is effective. Commercial pecan producers have used zinc sulfate with good results for over 40 years. Caution will need to be used, however, because zinc sulfate can kill many types of plants, so spray it only onto pecan foliage. NZN is a new type of zinc which is a liquid. It was developed by Dr. J. Benton Storey of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. NZN is highly soluble, less toxic to other vegetation and readily available at many garden centers. The commercial rates of zinc for spraying pecan foliage in Texas are 2 pounds of zinc sulfate, 2 pounds of NZS or 1/4 quarts of NZN per 100 gallons water. The homeowner should use 2 teaspoons of zinc sulfate, NZS, or NZN in one gallon of water. Other forms of zinc, such as zinc chelates or tree injectors, have been tested but have not been found to be an effective source of zinc for pecans in Texas.

Air Controllers Being Sought

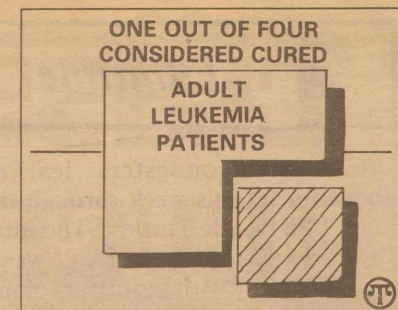
The Federal Aviation Administration has announced a nation-wide Air Traffic Controller recruiting program.

The agency plans to hire 2 to 3,000 controllers in the next year and is actively seeking candidates through its "We Need more of the World's Best" recruiting campaign.

An FAA spokesman said the agency wants U.S. citizens, age 30 or under, with 4 years college, or 3 years work experience, or an equivalent combination of the two.

Candidates must pass an aptitude test, with a high score, for final selection. Aviation experience is not necessary. Persons hired at the \$17,824 starting salary receive free training at the FAA's Oklahoma City Academy with final placement throughout the U.S. Depending on their assignment, controllers can receive up to \$55,000 in basic annual salary through Civil Service advancement.

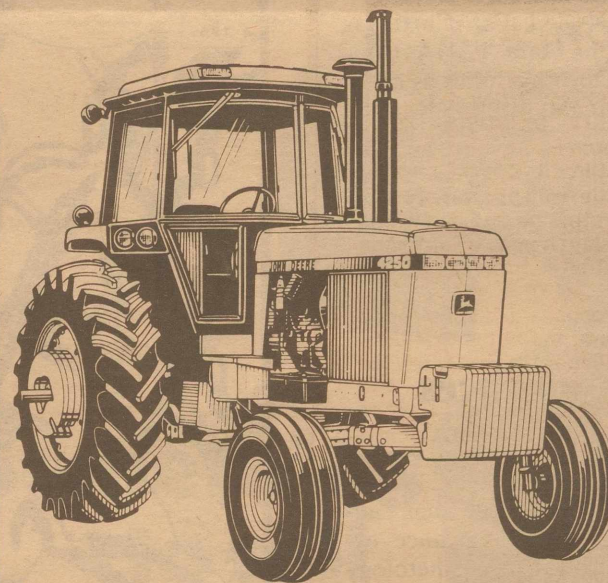

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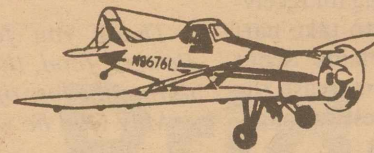

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Producers Invited To Workshop

Cotton and Sorghum producers in Yoakum County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 3 at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, David Kight, county Extension agent said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second workshop is scheduled for July 8 in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining the scope of the training, and explaining general concepts of pest management, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent Entomology headquartered at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mark Brown, Extension Agent Entomology from Crosbyton.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent Entomology based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available. Mark your calendar now.
