Big events are in store for area riding, bull riding, double mugging, residents next weekend with the 33rd Annual Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo. "Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" has been selected for the theme of the big event.

The Rodeo Parade will launch the big weekend. It is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, July 31. The rodeo will open that evening at 8 p.m. and continue at that hour Friday and Saturday in Yoakum County Rodeo Arena. A cowboy dance is scheduled each evening after the rodeo.

Special session of Yoakum County Commissioners Court was held July 21. Representatives of Denver City Chamber of Commerce and Hospital Board met with the court to request that petitions for a hospital tax bond election continue to be checked and validated until after Aug. 4 to allow the election to be held with the general election Nov. 4. The court agreed with the request.

Upon recommendation of the Hospital Board, the court approved a motion to advertise to receive bids for the purchase of an anesthetic machine.

Kathy Wood, director of non-residential services, Community Services Division of Lubbock State School, and Letha Nixon of Denver City met with the court to ask support for mentally retarded people over 21 years of age who are ineligible to attend public school. They presented a request for funds to furnish transportation of participants from Yoakum County to attend teaching and training workshop in Seminole and participate in a work program. Action was postponed for further study.

Howard Gayle of Gayle Enterprises of Denver City requested the county to enter an operating agreement with his company and Rural Cable Inc., an Arkansas corporation, to run a cable company outside the existing franchise area of Denver City and Plains. Commissioners will consult with County Attorney before making decision.

Judge Cobb read a letter from State Treasurer stating that a prorata portion of lateral road funds will be sent Oct. 14 to the County Treasurer for use in the upcoming fiscal year for county lateral roads.

A budget amendment for line item transfers was requested and granted Sheriff Rice.

Ordinances Approved

Three ordinances were adopted by the city council at their last meeting, two of which were deemed necessary to help with the clean-up campaign underway in Plains.


Ordinance No. 81 deals with both residential and business property. It states that owners or occupants of lots or properties, both business and residential in the city of Plains must be kept free from weeds, brush and rubbish, such as abandoned or junk autos, abandoned oil field equipment, abandoned houses beyond repair, unsightly pens and outhouses, dead or fallen trees, unusable appliances such as refrigerators, stoves, washing

unusable appliances such as refrigerators, stoves, washing machines and furniture beyond repair; old boxes, cartons and other unsightly or unsanitary matter. Notices will be given to owner or occupants of lots or properties in violation of this ordinance.

Ordinance No. 82 pertains to junk vehicles and allows for such to be declared a public nuisance. The ordinance further provides for a notice to abate such public

nuisance; provides for a public hearing for the disposal of junk vehicles to be demolished and also provides for a penalty and to establish an effect date and suspend the rule of requirements of reading of the ordinance of three separate days.

Ordinance No. 80 dispenses the office of marshal in the City of Plains and confers the duties of said officer on a peace officer of Yoakum County.





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Yoakum County Residents To Vote On Hospital Proposal

Yoakum County residents will go to the polls Nov. 4 to decide the fate of a proposed new \$3.8 million hospital for Yoakum County. According to Hospital Administrator Ed Rodgers, "The vote will be a simple yes or no choice."


Tickets to see the performance will cost an additional \$5.85 per person. Barbecue supper is \$5 per person or persons may take picnic supper.





From The Superintendent's Desk

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This week we heard the news of a special session of the legislature being called on August 6, 1986, to address the budget shortfall of about 3.2 billion dollars. The State leadership has insisted that education reform would not be touched in trying to find monies to correct this deficit.

I think education will be addressed in three areas during the special session. Those areas are consolidation, increased sales tax, and career ladder.

Disenchantment over the career ladder has prompted some key lawmakers to talk about scrapping it to help bail the state out of its budget crisis. One of those persons quoted in the news was Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls. "The teachers I have heard from would not object to doing away with it — and it does have the potential to save the state a lot of money," Farabee was quoted as saying.

Senator Carl Parker of Port Arthur, one of the original proponents of the program, said, "Some districts have regarded the career ladder as a mere gimmick for passing along money rather than as a system for ensuring quality."

Some criticisms of the plan are that the program has been underfunded from the start, with many capable teachers who meet the selection criteria being left out because their school districts did not have enough money to give them bonuses. Also some claim that the system for determining which teachers should qualify has been too political and often has resulted in deserving teachers be-

ing shut out of the program. Teacher groups complain that evaluations, a critical factor in determining whether a teacher qualifies for the career ladder, were slipshod in many school districts. Thousands of teachers appealed local decisions with reportedly about 300 of those appeals now before the Texas Education Agency.

Commissioner Kirby says that the State Board's recent adoption of a statewide appraisal system to be used by all school districts will help solve the problem. "I believe the people of Texas still want to pay more to our best teachers....and I believe the system has to be given a fair chance to work," he said.

Districts were supposed to spend at least 30 percent of their state funds for career ladder and other school reforms on incentive pay. A study by TEA reportedly indicates that more than 300 of the state's 1,092 school districts did not spend all they were required to on incentive pay. Many of the districts said that they needed the money for budget shortfalls in other areas.

We will talk about increased sales tax and consolidation in another article.




