## Voters To Decide Candidates

Yoakum County residents will go to the polls Tuesday to cast ballots for governor, a U.S. Representative, numerous other state officers and a number of County offices. Absentee voting in the election ended Friday.
At the county level, voters will find an unopposed ballot for all offices but a write-in campaign has been launched in the Precinct 4 Commissioner's race.
Incumbent Johnnie Fitzgerald is seeking re-election as Commissioner. He is opposed by write-in candidate Larry Murphree.
In the Governor's race, voters will choose between Democrat Mark White, Republican Bill Clements and Libertarian Party candidate Theresa Doyle. Three candidates are also on the ballot for Lieutenant Governor, Bill Hobby, Democratic; David Davidson, Republican and Bill Howell, Libertarian.
Republican Larry Combest seeks re-election as U.S. Representative. Opposing his is Democratic candidate Gerald McCathern. Attorney General candidates are Jim Mattox, Roy Barrera Jr. and Mike Stephens. For Comptroller of Public Accounts, Bob Bullock is opposed by George Meeks.
Ann Richards seeks re-election as State Treasurer with Robert F. Reid, Libertarian Party candidate providing opposition.

## Cattle Seminar

## To Be Held

A one day seminar is being presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The program will be held Tuesday, Nov. 4 at the Dawson County Community Building in Lamesa.
"The program is designed to be practical," said Dr. John McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist. "We want producers to get infor mation they can incorporate into their management program.'
The program Nov. 4 in Lamesa is being tailored for operators in Dawson, Andrews, Borden, Gaines, Garza, Howard, Lynn, Martin Midland, Scurry, Terry and Yoakum Counties. It will be at the Dawson County Community Building on the fairgrounds.
The program will begin at 9 a.m. and conclude about 3:30 p.m. A catered lunch will be served courtesy of program sponsors. There is no fee for persons attending the program.
Changes in farm programs and crops economy have increased the interest in stocker cattle, McNeill said.
He will open the program with a look at cost-effective management of stocker operations. This will include an update of research and result demonstrations, products and techniques that apply to stocker cattle production. It also will look at practices such as use of implants, wormers, vaccines and supplemental feeding programs.
Effective treatment of shipping fever will be addressed by Dr. Larry Hollis of Syntex Animal Health in Amarillo. Hollis, former case coordinator at the Texas A\&M University Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory in Amarillo, will explain vaccination programs and preventive medicine techniques to reduce cattle sickness and death loss.
Marketing tips from a cattle buyer will be provided by Ed Wright, independent buyer from Amarillo. He will explain factors producers should consider when purchasing and selling their livestock, and which can have a great impact on the financial outcome of their operation.
Following lunch, the program will feature a live animal demonstration dubbed, "Do It Right While They're In The Chute". Here Extension Agents and specialists wil join commercial field representatives in showing how to properly administer vaccines, implants, wormers, feed additives, rumen innoculants and other products. They will answer questions and discuss products.

During the closing segment, Dr Dee Griffin, staff veterinarian for Pioneer Hybrid International Guymon, Oklahoma, and Hollis will necropsy cattle that have died from different causes. They will show what producers can learn from a necropsy report and its values in treating problems.
John Farris, Dawson County Extension Agent encourages producers to attend this program to improve their present cattle operation or incorporate cattle into their business if it fits their needs.

McCathern stressed the need for a fair price for farm commodities and for a tariff on imported oil. He stated cotton, oil and wheat prices have decreased drastically since 1981 while other economic indicators have increased. The national debt grew from $\$ 900$ billion to $\$ 2300$ billion. The budget deficit grew from $\$ 87$ billion to $\$ 200$ billion. Trade balance went from a positive $\$ 47$ billion to a deficit of
$\$ 180$ billion. Average jobless rate in the 19th Congressional District climbed from 7 to 13 percent.
McCathern stated he has been a West Texas resident all his 59 years. A veteran of World War II, he has worked in the oil patch and on his own family farm.
The Congressional candidate visited Yoakum County again Oct. 29 when a caravan of supporters stopped at Yoakum County Courthouse at 4:20 p.m. for a brief rally. A reception in the Lowrey Law Office honored the candidate.
