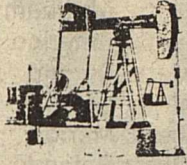


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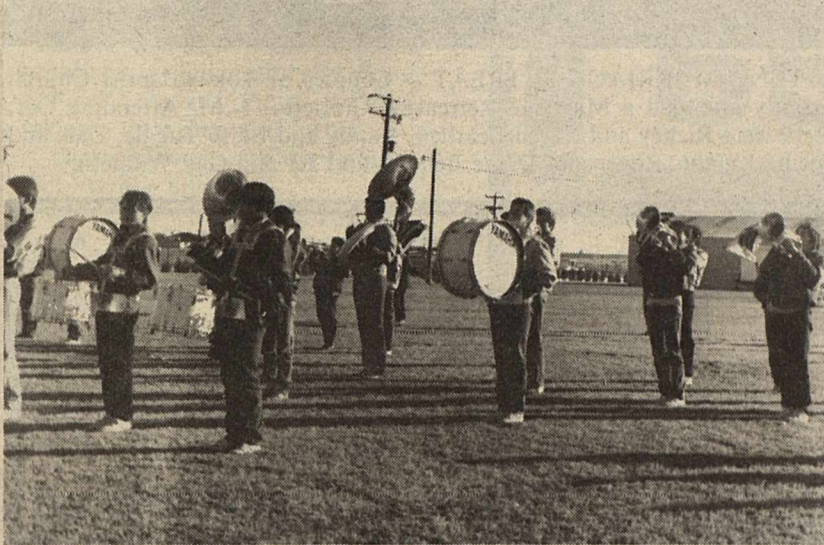

Plains High School Band Wins Second In State

The Plains High School Marching Band returned home Saturday night from State UIL Marching Contest in Austin. The band won second place in State Class A, the highest honor ever achieved by a Plains School Band.

Accompanying the band on their 6 a.m. departure Sunday morning, were Mr. and Mrs. Dean Andrews, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Parks, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Shipp and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strickler.

Performing a seven and a half minute routine at West Lake High School in Austin, the band was declared one of the top five finalists

to march for a different panel of judges at Memorial Stadium in downtown Austin.

The Cowboy Band was in competition with eight other Class A bands. Claiming the State Class A title was Nueces Canyon of Barksdale.

On the band's return trip, the group attended a Cowgirls Volleyball playoff match held in Ft. Stockton.

Mustangs Beat Cowboys

It was a simple case of being over-manned, over-sized and over-powered. None-the-less, the Plains, Cowboys could not hold down a very strong Wilson team and lost the District Championship last Friday night 38-15. The Wilson Mustangs drove the ball 80 yards on 20 plays, picked up five first downs, converted on two third down plays and three fourth down plays to put the first points on the board. Greg Spears went in from one yard out and after the PAT failed, the Mustangs held an early lead of 6-0.

The Cowboys however, came right back on their very next possession. Shane McMinn hit Scott Lowrey in the endzone capping off a 14 play 34 yard drive with 10:26 left to play in the second period. Bryan Baldwin converted the extra point attempt and the Cowboys held their only lead of the night at 7-6.

It took the Mustangs only 1:17 to take the lead back on a pass play from Spears to Chris Burtch that covered 34 yards. Spears ran in the conversion and put the Mustangs ahead to stay at 14-7. Bednarz hit a 26 yard field goal with :04 left to play in the first half and took a 17-7 lead into the locker room.

The Mustangs took the luxury advantage of having the ball first in the second half by driving 87 yards for another score. Greg Spears once again hit Chris Burtch for 34 yards and Ruben Garcia took it in from 23 yards to highlight the drive. Bednarz added the PAT and moved the Mustangs to a commanding 24-7 lead.

A fumble by Alex Barrientes left the Mustangs in great field position at the Cowboy 13 yard line with 2:42 left in the third. Two plays and 17 seconds later, Burtch went in for his second score of the night from nine

yards out and Bednarz added the extra point to up the score to 31-7.

The Cowboys managed to get their final points up on the board just before the end of the third stanza, when Shane McMinn found Doug Green from 13 yards out. McMinn also scored the two point conversion and left the score 31-15.

Justin Bednarz, who had a fumble recovery, a blocked punt and an interception accounted for his second touchdown of the game, to close out the score at 38-15, adding his own PAT.

Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court convened in special session Nov. 3 to open bids on the construction of a new addition to the stock show barns in Plains.

Only one bid, that of B & B Construction of Denver City, was received. The base bid of \$31,364.73 was tabled until Nov. 10 to allow further study by the architect, commissioners and county auditor.

Raises after a probationary period in the sheriff's department were approved for Jeff Corzine and Marcene Phillips. Corzine's salary would then be \$1,733.36 per month; Phillips, \$1,509.37.

Bids were opened on police special autos for the sheriff's department from Mustang Country Chevrolet, Inc. and Brunken Chevrolet. Brunken Chevrolet's low bid of \$19,435.56 for two cars with two trade-ins was accepted.

Approval was also given for the purchase of a display station by County Clerk and to advertise for bids for a computer printer for the Clerk's office, both to be ordered now and paid for in 1987.

District Clerk Mae Barnett requested approval to purchase a personal computer and printer and to allow a line-time transfer of 1986 funds to purchase equipment to be applied toward the purchase. Action was postponed until the end of year when actual amount of excess funds is known.

Commissioners approved a motion to declare an emergency, amend the budget and transfer \$40,905 to the hospital fund with the amount to be borrowed from Depository Bank. Loan amount to be paid back from 1987 hospital budget. A motion to declare an emergency, amend the budget and transfer \$8,000 from precinct one to the Yoakum County Park Fund was also approved.

Extra hire and bills were approved for payment.

Plains Cowgirls ended their 1986 volleyball season in Fort Stockton Tuesday night with an area playoff loss to Tornillo. Momentum went back and forth in the first game before the Cowgirls tied the game at 14-14. Tornillo called time out and broke the Cowgirls' points on the scoreboard before the Cowgirl's got the ball back and made two straight points to win the game.

The second game looked like a repeat of the first game until Tornillo made five straight points for game point. The Cowgirls managed to break their serve and score three straight points of their own before Tornillo got the ball back and won the game 15-10.

In the final game of the match, the Cowgirls got a late start, falling behind early 3-12. Tornillo advances to the Regional Tournament in Big Spring this weekend. The Cowgirls conclude their season with a 14-14 record.

The Cowgirls had an impressive 21 kills out of 45 hits in the match.

The sign for Childrens Protective Services office is completed.

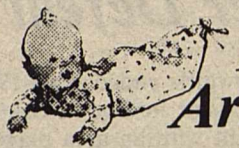

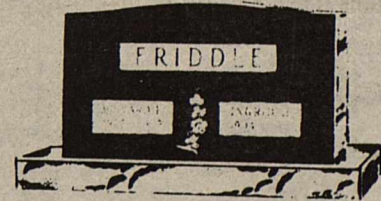
