Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I'm a nonservice-connected World War II veteran. If I die will my widow and two children be eligible for pensions?

A — If your widow's income and estate is not in excess of legal limits, she may be eligible for a pension. Likewise, your children if unmarried and under 18 years of age may be eligible if they do not have an income or estate above the limit. Pensions such as these are awarded in case of need.

Q — I am a World War II veteran. Can I still get educational benefits under the GI Bill?

A — All educational benefits for World War II veterans have expired except in rare exceptions. The nearest VA office can tell you if you are one of these.

Q — My son has been in a nursing home for incurables since childhood. He will be 18 soon. Will his pension be stopped then?

A — No. Since he is unable to become self-supporting his

Pre-Registration Begins August 21 At Cisco College

Pre-registration of students for the 1961-62 school year will begin Monday, August 21, at Cisco Junior College, according to an announcement today by President Grady Hogue. This will continue through Sept. 9 with regular registration set for Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 11-12.

Mr. Hogue said the dormitories would be open Sunday, Sept. 10, for both boys and girls.

The schedule calls for freshman Sept. 13 and 14 with first classes on Sept. 15.

The college will run a bus south to May to pick up students at Ingram's Cafe each day in May and at the Elite Cafe daily in Rising Star. The fee to ride the bus will be \$6 per month or \$54 for the school year.

Tuition will be \$70 per semester. Mr. Hogue said the costs for a non-dormitory student would be only \$140 per year plus another \$54 for those riding the bus.

A record enrollment of full-time day students has been indicated for the coming year, Mr. Hogue said. Anyone with a question about the junior college program was invited to visit the college office any time during the day.

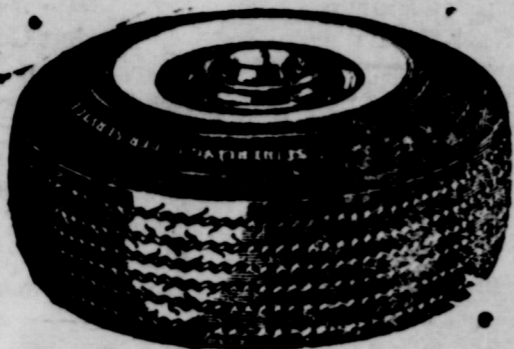

Continued from first page the drouth years. One 100-degree day was recorded—in June. During the past week the city thermometer has approached but had not reached that level Tuesday. Saturday it touched 98 degrees. Monday recorded 93 and Tuesday a high of 94 was registered. The last rain of any consequence fell on July 23, when 1.17 inches were measured by the official gauge of the city. Only a trace was measured Monday. Among other crops which are sharing the bright outlook are pecans. This crop is rapidly becoming highly important in the farm economy of the section, with an increasing number of large commercial orchards being cultivated here. The prospective yield is one of the best in many years.

Continued from first page the following distinguished speakers and group discussion leaders: Rev. D. L. Dykes, Jr., of Shreveport, Louisiana, will speak Friday evening, Saturday morning, and Saturday evening. He is pastor of the First Methodist Church in Shreveport and has been the platform speaker on college campuses, Methodist youth assemblies, pastors' retreats, and annual conferences.

Roy L. Farrow of Dallas, executive secretary of the Texas Methodist College Association, who will teach a course on Christian stewardship and tithing, has been influential in helping to increase Methodism's per capita giving in Texas from \$19 in 1946 to approximately \$60 in 1960. Rev. Edward H. Otwell of Cleburne will present information on church work in towns and in the country. He is executive secretary of the Town and Country Commission in the Central Texas Conference and was selected as the "Rural Pastor of the Year" in 1958.

Eugene F. Jud of Waco, associate director of the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement and former conference lay leader, will conduct a study on Methodism's new Discipline.

Don Sessions of Fort Worth will discuss the work of Methodist Men's Clubs. He is the brother of Rev. C. C. Sessions of Cleburne, superintendent of the Cleburne District.

Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas, resident bishop of the Fort Worth-Dallas area, will preach the closing sermon on Sunday morning. He administers the work of the Methodist Church in the Central Texas and North Texas Conferences, comprising about 750 Churches with a total membership of about 254,000, and is the author of "To Fulfill This Ministry" and "Proclaiming The Good News."
