He was a farmer and worked for Anderson Grain in Tokio and Brownfield. He was a member of Tokio Co-op Gin Board of Directors. He was a former elder at Hill Side Church of Christ in Plains and was an elder at

Tahoka Road Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Alfred of Tokio, Johnny of Lubbock, Sidney of Levelland and Mike of Odessa; a daughter, Sherri Hatfield of Midland; six sisters, Myrtle Head, Ida Mae Shelton, Evelyn Cruce and Ethel Day, all of Brownfield, Irene Ledbetter of Kermit and Ala Bowers of Whiteface; 11 grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.



LIFE IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

You must get up early to meet the schedule of an elementary student in Plains. Many arrive at school by 7:30 a.m. with the majority of our students reporting in by 7:45 a.m. After a bowl of cereal, or the like, students enjoy visiting in the school cafeteria until opening exercises.

During opening exercises, we honor those students celebrating a birthday by singing to them. We then pledge our allegiance to the national flag, led by one of our students. Mrs. Blair then leads our students in singing a patriotic song to honor our nation. This gets us ready to dismiss to our home room classes by a.m.

Upon reporting to home rooms, we begin a very busy day. Many of our teachers have a beginning exercise in their classrooms - such as a calendar study. Time then must be spent in language arts (reading, spelling, writing) math, science, health, fine arts, music, social studies, computer studies, and physical education. Because of T.E.A. rules and policies, we must meet at least a minimum number of minutes in each of these required subjects. We also squeeze lunch and recess into what is left of a very tight schedule.

Fortunately, life in the elementary is not all hard work. We take time out to celebrate national holidays with parties and other appropriate activities. Recently we celebrated Presidents' Day by releasing over 230 helium-filled balloons. We actually had a card returned from a small town near Dayton, Ohio. This means one of our balloons traveled nearly 1200 miles!

We are looking forward to U.I.L. contests on April 17 and 18 in Wellman. Also a few field trips and picnics are on schedule during May. With an elementary track meet scheduled toward the end of school, we have many activities left to enjoy.



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McClure's Brother On Computer Team

Brand Hilton, a senior computer science major from Lubbock and brother of Kay McClure, is one of four members on the Texas Tech Computer Science Team, which recently placed third in the 13th annual Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) Scholastic Programming Contest.

The team finished higher in national competition than any previous Tech team. There are 55 teams in their regional competition. In November, 1988, they finished second in Regional Competition behind Rice University. There are 23 regions around the world, representing at least 700 teams for the most recent competition. The top two finishers were UCLA and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Tech came in with a very impressive third.

The teams are given eight programming problems to solve in a six hour time. The judging was based on the number of completed problems, and ties were resolved based on the least time taken, including penalties for submitting erroneous solution.

The top two teams finished six problems; Tech was close behind, solving five problems.

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
