



Jones Readying Tractor For Ride In Rodeo Parade

Steve Jones is getting ready for the rodeo parade.

Jones hopes to have restoration completed on a 1952 Model G John Deere tractor. He has been working on the restoration whenever possible for about six months.

"I acquired this machine from a gentleman in Levelland," he says. "I've been able to get most of the missing parts from Deere and Company although some cannot be bought. You have to go through


wrecking yards of old farm machinery in hopes of finding those

missing pieces," Jones adds.

Restoration is a slow and timely process when done right, says Jones. "There are lots of people willing to help and assist in finding parts and fixing what you have," he explains. "Even if it is old, this one will look brand new when completed," Jones states. "Most remember these as 'Popping Johnnies'".

Restoring Old Tractors Is Catching On In Texas

Old tractors are a fascination for Eddie Earnest, an interest he's held for several years.

As a youngster, Earnest drove a John Deere Model G on his father's farm. In 1969, he bought his own John Deere "G" to use on his own farm. He still owns this tractor and is currently working to restore it to look like new.

Earnest's first effort at restoration was with a 1936 John Deere Model B that had belonged to his father-in-law, Leon Clanahan. Earnest and his sons, Michael and Keith, began working to restore that tractor early in 1987 with the hopes of having it ready to drive in the Old Settlers' Reunion and Rodeo

As parade time neared that year, Gary Six, Yoakum County ASCS Director, bet the men they would not be able to complete their task in time for the parade but if they did, he would ride in a wagon behind the tractor. Earnest and his sons stayed up all night, finished the tractor, got it to town and found a wagon for Six to ride in, in time for the parade.

Earnest explains that restoring old tractors has been a popular pastime in the northern U.S. for

many years but is only now getting started in this area. Each year, he explains, there are several shows in South Texas and the Dallas area. He hopes to have two tractors restored to exhibit in the next two years.

"Sometimes you have to buy two or three old tractors just to get enough parts for one completely restored tractor," he says.

First Rodeo Recalled By Those Who Organized

Denver City's first rodeo was held on a sweltering July 4, 1941. Loyd Patton came to Bill Harris Powell of Plains only a few days before and requested that he and Wilma Powell

organize the event.

"Bill had lots of volunteer help." said Mrs. Powell. Former commissioner Clyde Hartwick, Donald Bookout, Aaron (Big A) Morris, Loyd Patton, Loyd Chesser, H.I. Caudle, H.G. Ramby, Stanley Duval, Dub Dulin, Kirby Nutt, Jimmy and Buzz O'Neill, Carl Rushing and Cecil Bickley were some of the

A hog wire arena was constructed in two days where the current Denver City public swimming pool is located. Powell's cow herd and mares were driven to Denver City from Plains on horseback. "Tractors plowed the arena and cold drinks were served the fence builders," remembers Mrs. Powell.

The afternoon of July 4th, vehicles were driven close to the arena fence to help keep in stock. A flatbed truck was furnished by Loyd Patton for the announcer Horace Owens, sheriff of Lovington and Lea County.

Wilma Powell kept time for calf ropers, wild cow milking, bronc riding and wild cow riding. Some contestants were Pee Wee Patterson, Jack Lowe, Pat Henard, Jeff Beal, Pete Sampson, Bill Story, Phil Williams, LeRoy (Pee Wee) Henson and Charlie Hollar.

"I think we charged 50 cents admission and entry fees were \$3 as I

remember, said Mrs. Powell. "The crowd really got their money's worth with the wild and frightened pasture stock."

To promote good will, before the rodeo a free barbecue was held at a vacant lot where city hall now stands. Trenches were dug and the men stayed up all night cooking meat. "Dewey Adair and Lavelle Bilbrey were cooks, as I remember," said Peggy Bickley who was in charge of the lemonade. "I squeezed a whole case of lemons with my new electric mixer and put the juice in a five gallon water bottle to be diluted as needed," said Ms. Bickley. The lemonade was served from a building where Jerry Mansur's office now stands. Beans and potato salad were brought by the ladies to complete the menu.


"At 11:00 a.m., the barbecue was nearly ready and back in the north a red duster came up," said Ms. Bickley. "It covered the food in sand and people grabbed plates, ran to their cars, and went home.'


"Although the weather did not cooperate, it was good to celebrate our nation's independence and promote community spirit," said Ms. Bickley. "A number of those young men went on to serve in World War II after Pearl Harbor and this was a good memory for those boys," she added. Wilma Powell agrees, "This year's 50th Celebration for Denver City will cause people to remember where we have been and be another good memory some day."

This week I want to discuss non-professional personnel and their requirements for employment.

Teacher aides and secretaries are required to have a high school diploma or a graduate equivalency diploma as a minimum requirement. We also ask for, and check, previous work references. Any reported college credits are also checked. The immediate supervisor in the area where the opening occurs, is responsible for securing a replacement. The Superintendent of Schools then approves the appointment.

Cafeteria employees are not subject to academic requirements (high school diploma), but must have the ability to read receipts and perform duties as specified in the job description for cafeteria workers. Our cafeteria manager is the first line supervisor who arranges and conducts interviews and makes recommendations for the Superintendent's approval.

In the maintenance, transportation, and grounds area, applicants must have a high school diploma or G.E.D., and possess the ability to carry out duties as specified in the job description. These employees are selected by the immediate supervisor with approval of the Superintendent.

As superintendent, I look to principals, cafeteria, maintenance and transportation supervisors, to see that all employees are being supervised in a manner that will produce the best results for Plains I.S.D. I feel very fortunate in the fact that we have good people working for Plains I.S.D. Our school could not operate without our nonprofessional personnel. They are some of the most dedicated people on our staff and they make a real contribution to Plains I.S.D. I am proud that they are a part of our school team.

A number of openings remain in both the boys and girls basketball camps scheduled later this summer by South Plains College.



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

Community Action will conduct the distribution from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day in the Catholic Church.

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
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


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


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
