It was the first contest of the season for the Plains team. The team consisted of Lance Morrow, Daniel Canada, Nieves Garcia, Chad Hudson and Layne Morrow. The schools were divided into two divisions. The Small School Division consisted of A through AAA, and the Large School Division consisted of AAAA and AAAAA schools.
In the Number Sense Contest, Layne Morrow placed first in the juniors with a score of 274 , Garcia placed fourth in the seniors with a score of 234 , and Lance Morrow placed first in the seniors with a score of 364. The Number Sense Team, coached by Richie Cullins, placed second at the meet with a total of 872 points.
In the Calculator Applications Contest, Layne Morrow placed first in the juniors with a score of 290 , Garcia placed fourth in the seniors with a score of 237, and Lance Morrow placed first in the seniors with a score of 308. The Cowboys went to Anton Friday night and took on the Bulldogs in their third district game.

It was a great night for football and the Cowboys did not disappoint the many fans who traveled to watch the contest.

The Bulldogs received the opening kickoff. They were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt. A bad snap caused the punter to fumble the ball. Mario Medina blocked the punter and Shane Lowrey scooped up the ball and ran 15 yards for the Cowboy touchdown. Rodney Garland's kick was good.

On the Cowboys next possession Medina and Henry Gonzales took turns moving the ball down field on good runs by each. Gonzales almost broke it loose on a 37 yard run to the one yard line. Medina covered the last 15 yards for the touchdown. A muffled snap foiled the extra point kick and the game ended with Plains 40, Anton 0.

Gonzales ran 10 times for 170 yards and 1 TD ; Medina 13 for 121 yards and two TDs; Pierce five for 77; Yeager two for 22 and Justin Stowe four for seven.

Pierce passed seven times with one completion for five yards. Stowe was one for three yards.

Bret Booth caught one pass for five yards; and Dan Rushing had one for three.

Defensively, Lowrey had two defensive touchdowns. Medina was leading tackle with 16. William Matta had two quarterback sacks with Chris Chavez assisting on one.

Total Cowboy yardage was 405.

## RESEARCH FINDING:

Children who are encouraged to draw and scribble "stories" at an early age will later learn to compose more easily, more effectively, and with greater confidence than children who do not have this encouragement.

Even toddlers, who can hardly hold a crayon or pencil, are eager to "write" long before acquire the skills in kindergarten that formally prepare them to read and "write" long before they acquire the skills in kindergarten that formally prepare them to read and "write".

Studies of very young children show that their carefully formed scrawls have meaning to them, and that this writing actually helps them develop language skills. Research suggests that the best way to help children at this stage of their development as writers is to respond to the ideas they are trying to express.

Very young children take the first steps toward writing by drawing and scribbling or, if they cannot use a pencil, they may use plastic or metal letters on a felt or magnetic board. Some preschoolers may write on toy-typewriters; others may dictate stories into a tape recorder or to an adult, who writes them down and reads them back. For this reason, it is best to focus on the intended meaning of what very young children write, rather than on the appearance of the writing.

Children become more effective writers when parents and teachers encourage them to choose the topics they write about, then leave them alone to exercise their own creativity. The industriousness of such children has prompted one researcher to comment that they "violate the child labor laws".

## Exercises:

1) Most children find it exciting to get something in the mail, to write and receive letters. Give them the junk mail you receive. Encourage relatives to write to your children occasionally; let the children write back, even if it's just a scribble. Send your chiid an occasional card from a "secret friend" urging him to work hard at school.
2) Always treat blank pieces of paper and pencils, or crayons as something especially wonderful. "This is yours and you can put anything you want on it." Take a moment to write or draw something yourself. Always treat writing like something that matters.
3) Decide on a family message center - the front of the refrigerator, the back of a door. Play "note tag". Anyone who gets a message must put up a note for someone else. If Joe finds a note that says "Feed the cat", he might write a note that says "I did. I want some gum."
4) When you are going to the grocery store or super market, select a word to look for. You can find a word in a grocery advertisement in the newspaper or a magazine. You could try these: sugar, salt, real, natural, vitamin, green. Have your child write the word down to take with you. See who can find the word written the most times on labels, packages, signs. (This game will help reading and counting, too.)
