Melvin Lowrey Is Candidate

Lowrey's wife, Linda, is Criminal District Attorney for the 121st Judicial District. As a state official, Mrs. Lowrey's salary and benefits are not subject to action by the Commissioner's Court. Linda has two children, Deanna, who is a senior at Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri and James, who works on a ranch in Roanoke.

Lowrey said he is enthusiastic about the opportunity to serve Yoakum County and asks the voters for their support.

City Ordinance #101 Explained By Plains Supt. Dean Andrews

With the passing of the City Ordinance 101 by the Plains City Council, Tenth Street, which runs in front of our school, has become a one way west bound street.

According to Dean Andrews, Superintendent, beginning on Monday, Nov. 13, 1989, the street directly in front of Plains Schools will become one way street beginning at the auditorium (Ave J) and ending at Avenue H. Right turns only will be allowed when entering Hwy 380-82 from Tenth Street. Ferrell Avenue, Avenue J and Avenue H will remain open to two way traffic.

Diagonal parking lines have been painted on Tenth Street and we encourage you to legally park so that we might create a safer student loading and unloading area. This street will remain a 20 m.p.h. zone during school.

"We realize that this is different from the practice of past years," said Mr. Andrews, "But it is also a much safer procedure for our students."

Andrews said that the school appreciates the help of the City of Plains, and especially appreciates the parents' help in making this change work to the benefit of our students.

From The Superintendent's Desk



This is the seventh in a series of eight articles based on research entitled "What Works at Home". I hope you are finding these articles useful and interesting. Each student is an individual and has individual needs. The articles offer a variety of suggestions and hints and contain information which can be beneficial to everyone.

Research Finding:

Many highly successful individuals have above-average but not extra-ordinary intelligence.- Accomplishment in a particular activity is often more dependent upon hard work and self-discipline than on innate ability.

High academic achievers are not necessarily born "smarter" than others, nor do people born with extra-ordinary abilities necessarily become highly accomplished individuals. Parents, teachers, coaches, and the individuals themselves can influence how much a mind or talent develops by fostering self-discipline and encouraging hard work. Most highly successful individuals have above-average but not exceptional intelligence. A high IQ seems less important than specializing in one area of endeavor, persevering, and developing the social skills required to lead and get along well with others.

Studies of accomplished musicians, athletes, and historical figures show that when they were children, they were competent, had good social and communication skills, and showed versatility as well as perseverance in practicing their skill over long periods. Most got along well with their peers and parents. They constantly nurtured their skills. And their efforts paid off.

Developing talent takes effort and concentration. These, as much as nature, are the foundation for success.

EXERCISES:

Encourage your children to try many different activities. Urge them to take part in school clubs, in music, art, sports, etc. If they are in programs, make sure that as many family members as possible go and watch - even if you don't know the other people or understand the activity. Ask your child's teacher or counselor about free summer programs in your community.

Find role models for your children. Not just famous people, but successful students a few years older. Encourage them to imitate or follow the path of those both you and they admire.

Be positive rather than negative. If your child says "I want to be a movie star," don't say "You couldn't do that; your poor and ugly and dumb." Say, "Why don't you give the drama club a try and see how it goes. The only rule is that you have to give it a good try."

The practice necessary to master any skill can be lonely, frustrating, and boring. This is where your child most needs your support and company. Ask the child learning a musical instrument to practice so you can listen while you do your work. If your child is learning a sport, take a watch and time her when she runs; catch for him while he practices pitching.

Never pass up the opportunity to mention someone who has succeeded because of hard work and effort. Point out, wherever possible, that your child has always reminded you of this hardworking, disciplined "star". Let everyone know that you are convinced that your child was born with the character and discipline to succeed no matter what the odds.

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Brownie Girl Scout Troop 74 held its investiture and re-dedication ceremony Monday evening in the Scout House.



Debbie Taylor presented Jerri Lollar and Carroll Murph with Girl Scout and World Association pins.





ORDINANCE NO. 101

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES IN THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS TO DESIGNATE TENTH STREET FROM AVENUE H TO AVENUE J A ONE-WAY STREET WESTBOUND AT ALL TIMES; PROVIDING FOR A FINE NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200.00) FOR VIOLA-TION; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PRO-VIDING FOR A CODIFICATION CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:

SECTION I

That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Plains, Texas is hereby amended to add Section 6 to Chapter 9 which shall read as follows:

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SECTION 6: ONE-WAY STREETS AND ALLEYS

A. AUTHORIZED

The city council may by ordinance designate one-way streets and alleys and establish the hours during which the designation shall be effective. A person commits an offense if he operates a vehicle on a one-way street in a direction other than the direction indicated by the one-way sign during hours in which the oneway regulation is in effect.

B. DESIGNATED

The operation of a vehicle shall move only in the direction indicated, when signs indicating the direction of traffic are erected at each intersection, upon the following streets or portions of streets:

 Tenth Street from Avenue H to Avenue J is hereby designated a one-way street westbound at all times.

SECTION II

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

SECTION III

That it is hereby declared to be the intention of the city council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance are severable and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the city council without the incorporation in this ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section.

SECTION IV

That it is the intention of the city council, and it is hereby ordained that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Plains, Texas, and the sections of this ordinance may be renumbered to accomplish such intention.

The variety store has clothing for the entire family, Ellis said. It includes jeans, western shirts, children's clothing and tennis shoës. SECTION V

That any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

SECTION VI

That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and the publication of the caption, as the law in such cases provides.

SECTION VII

That the city administrator is authorized and directed to cause to be erected appropriate signs in the manner authorized in Chapter 9, Section 2.A of the Code of Ordinances giving notice to motorists of the regulations contained in this ordinance.



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Whiteface Antelopes Lessen Play-Off Hopes For Cowboys

Two weeks ago the Cowboys were able to secure a first place tie for the Henry Gonzales, eight for 68 yards; District lead with a 25-6 victory over Pierce 12 for 36 yards. Pierce threw 25 the Petersburg Buffaloes.

That tie and the hope of going into the last regular season game against O'Donnell with a post season play-off spot a sure thing, vanished in the waning moments of the Plains-Whiteface encounter.

Whiteface opened the scoring with 13 seconds left in the first quarter when Nathan Demel carried the ball 14 yards for the TD. The extra point kick was no good.

The Antelopes next scored on a one yard plunge by Demel. The two point conversion pass was incomplete. The score was Whiteface 12, Plains 0.

The Cowboys got on the scoreboard before halftime with a 44 yard pass from Monte Pierce to Shawn Booth. Mario Medina ran the two point conversion over to make the halftime score Whiteface 12, Plains 8.

The Plains defense played very tough the second half, holding Whiteface until the final moments of the game.

The Cowboys moved the ball well, but were hampered by six turnovers the second half.

Pierce scored on a one yard quarterback sneak in the fourth quarter. The two point conversion failed, but Plains was ahead 14 to 12.

With just over two minutes left in the game, the Cowboys were on the move again when Whiteface picked off a Cowboy pass. In four plays, the Antelopes covered 70 yards, the last being a five yard plunge by Demel for the TD. The two point conversion was good. The score was Whiteface 20, Plains 14.

The Cowboys were once again moving the ball. The clock showed only nine seconds when Whiteface's Leland Joiner kicked off a pass and ran it 60 yards for the final score with no time left on the clock. Because of a penalty, no extra point try was allowed.



ELECTRIC WATER HEATERS

Hot water is an absolute necessity for most modern day families. But the energy required to provide continual supply of hot water can be costly particularly when we're not attentive to good energy management. In most cases, energy cost for hot water is second only to heating and air conditioning expense. Studies have shown that water heaters account for 17-22 percent of home energy consumption.

Money can be saved through dilligent energy management. A "traditional" water heater can be made more efficient by installing an "insulation jacket" around it. Thermostat settings should be no higher than 120 degrees. Fahrenheit (or 140 degrees is you have an automatic dishuasher). Repair leaky hot water faucets - a hot water faucet dripping at the rate of two drops per second can waste 2,500 galloons a year, water that you paid to heat. Take showers instead of baths and install a flow restrictor on the shower head. Operate clothes washers and dishwashers only with a full load, and use shorter cycles, and "cold" and "warm" settings for laundering when possible.

And finally, a little common sense goes a long way: Don't use hot water when cold or warm will do!
