Property owners receive value notices

Texas property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value by local appraisal districts. On May 14, 1993, Yoakum County Appraisal District mailed 8,500 property owners their notices showing the 1993 proposed value. Saundra Stephens, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay from this notice," Stephens said.

Stephens emphasized importance of the notice and the key information that it contains for a property owner. "A property owner has the right to appeal to Yoakum County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and other areas," she said.

The appraisal review board, more commonly called "ARB" is an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's value. The ARB also hears and settles protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Take special note of the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure or any other type of fixtures the land.

The appraisal notice also includes information on year exemptions granted to the property. It provides last year's value, too.

Notice to property owners whose values increased more than \$1,000 will also include "estimated" taxes. Generally, taxing units set final 1993 tax rates in August and September.

Stephens ask that a property owner look carefully at the legal

description and mailing address to be sure that there is no errors. "We try to send all mobile home owners (personal property) a notice. If you no longer own the mobile home, or any type of property that you receive a notice for, now is the time to let us know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October,

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely. A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing

Stephens added, "If you did not get a notice and want 1993 information about your property, please call the appraisal district at 806-456-7101. The general deadline for protesting to the ARB is June 16 for this year.
