The site consists of an oil filter drain rack and a container for collection of used oil. This site is designed for use by do it yourselfers as well as business and governmental agencies. Also on site is a dumpster for disposal of drained oil cans and other containers.

Used oil is classified as hazardous waste and is a contributing factor to underground water contamination. One gallon of used oil has the potential of contami-
nating one million gallons of water, Proper disposal and recycling of used oil will assist in protecting underground water as well as preserve oil as a natural resource.

Proper disposal of used oil and oil filters, recycling (plastics, aluminum, and steel containers), and composting and/or mulching of yard waste are waste reduction practices that will protect the environment and extend the life of our landfills.

According to the Texas Litter Abatement Act, it is illegal to dump garbage in places that are not licensed landfills. It is also against the law to collect or receive litter in a place that is not a legal landfill, even if that place is on private property. For example, you could be subject to prosecution if you allow a friend or relative to abandon a car or discard old appliances on your land. Other common violations include throwing litter or allowing it to fly out of a vehicle, letting someone dump tires or trash on your property, improperly disposing of motor oil, and junking old cars in rivers or lakes.

## Legal Matters

Give your child a legal father
Under Texas law, a child born to unmarried parents has no legal father until paternity is established. If you are not married to your child's mother, you have no legal relationship with the child. You have no right to visitation, and no right to participate in decision making about your child's future. Your child won't be legally entitled to your Social Security benefits and may not be able to inherit from your estate. Last, but certainly not least, you and your child deserve to know each other and to develop a warm and loving relationship -- legally establishing paternity will help to ensure that happens.

If you choose to establish paternity, your first step is to sign a form called a Statement of Paternity. These forms are available through the Office of the Attorney General's (OAG) Regional Child Support Offices (addresses and phone numbers are provided below). Based on this document, an order of paternity can be entered and signed by a judge. Volunteering to work with my office to establish paternity will save you money. By avoiding a lawsuit, you escape court costs, attorneys' fees, and the cost of paternity testing.
