## N. D. Robinson Is Buried Friday In Carbon Cemetery

Funeral services for Nolen Dingler Robinson, 46, were conducted from the Carbon Methodist Church Friday at 2 p. m. with Rev. Ernest O. DeWald, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Cisco, officiating. Burial was in Carbon's old cemetery with Wylie Funeral Home, Cisco, directing.

Mr. Robinson was born in Waco, Texas, January 8, 1914. He had been a resident of Eastland County most of his life. He entered the Armed Services and served in the Corps of Engineers during World War II. After the war he settled in Odessa and had made his home there since.

## National Quota For Peanuts Set For Coming Year

The national marketing quota for the 1961 peanut crop has recently been set by the Secretary of Agriculture at 970,000 tons with a national allotment of 1,610,000 acres for picking and threshing, according to word received here.

Both the quota and the acreage allotment were set at levels required by law. Growers approved quotas for the 1960, 1961, and 1962 crops in a referendum held Dec. 15, 1959.

The marketing quota was determined by multiplying the "normal" yield for the past five years (1,205 pounds per acre) by the minimum national acreage allotment of 1,610,000 acres.

If the minimum-allotment provision of the law were not in effect, the national marketing quota for 1961 would be 250,000 tons less and 415,000 acres less than the approved totals.

The 1961 crop national peanut acreage allotment, less one-tenth of 1 percent reserved for new farms, is apportioned to states in accordance with provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. The acreage allotment for each state will be apportioned among individual peanut-producing farms within the state.

Texas ranks second in acreage allotment with 356,037 acres as compared with the leader, Georgia, which has an acreage of 527,964.

In April of 1960, the United States Department of Agriculture announced an increase of 1,761 acres in the 1960 allotments for states producing Valencia-type peanuts. This increase was in compliance with the Act of 1938, as amended, which provides for an increased allotment for types of peanuts that are in short supply.

## Vets Questions And Answers

Q -- My father, a World War Two veteran, died of a non-service-connected disability and I may be eligible to receive VA pension since I am under eighteen and not married. Please explain the active service requirements which apply to my deceased father.

A -- Your father must have had at least 90 days of active service, part of it during wartime. Also, he must have been discharged under other than dishonorable conditions. There are certain exceptions to this 90-day service requirements which your nearest VA office will gladly explain.

## New Watershed Is Being Formed In This Region

A "Northeast Tributaries of the Leon River" watershed is now being formed, according to information contained in a recent newsletter of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District No. 525 of Texas.

"Rush Creek" watershed still has a strong organization working toward more land treatment and more cooperators with the district. C. B. Williams, chairman, said, "Maybe next year we will get a watershed plan."

As of September 1, 1960, the SCS watershed party had 60% of the total flood prevention plan complete. The watershed plan was scheduled for completion by February 1, 1961.

Landowners of Flat Creek in Comanche County and south prong of Leon in Eastland County were considering an Upstream Watershed Application to the State Soil Conservation Board, the newsletter continued.

District No. 525 comprises some 5,559 farms and ranches with 1,346,412 acres in Eastland, Comanche and Erath Counties.

## See Texas First

### Tex-Aeological

Texas is one of the most fertile fields in all of North America for archaeological research.

Remnants have been discovered here of the Maya-Aztec area, the Pueblo area, and the Mound-Builder area.

The caves of the Big Bend region for instance have produced evidence of the Basket-Maker and the Pueblo cultures.

### Lucas Gusher in Beaumont

Discovery well of the famous Spindle Top Oil Field, the Lucas Gusher, can be seen four miles south of Beaumont, Texas, near the Gulf Coast and Louisiana border.

The well blew in at 1,160 feet in 1901, flowing 75,000 barrels of oil a day.

This Jefferson County well was the first important oil discovery on the Gulf Coast and marked the beginning of an era for a district that is now a major oil refining and exporting center of the world.

Tyler, Texas, raises more than two-thirds of the commercial rose bushes grown in the United States.

### Good Enuf for Comstock

## Sale Of Savings Bonds In County \$32,596 In Oct.

October E and H Savings Bonds sales in Eastland County totaled \$32,596 according to Guy P. Parker, chairman of the county Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales for the first ten months of 1960 were \$447,356 which represents 86 % of the county goal. First ten months sales in Texas were \$129,501,248 or 78.2% of its 1960 goal of \$165,500,000.

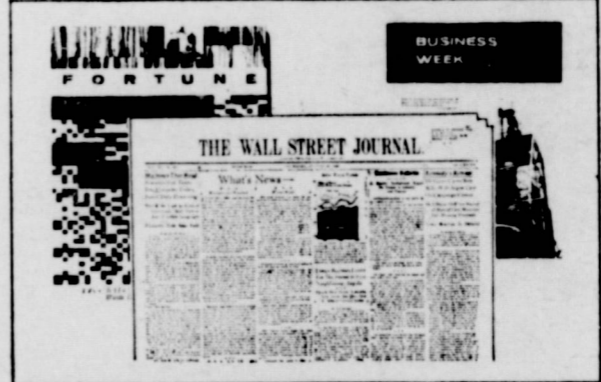
