State Highway **Funds Budgeted** For County Work

The State Highway Commission has allotted \$4,181,000 to provide for right of way and construction costs on the ABC System of highways in District 23's nine counties, which includes Eastland County, according to a report on the commission's recent meeting.

The ABC System includes all state and U. S. highways but does not include farm-to-market money will be spent on certain highways in the system which are not up to the standards set by the State Highway Department as determined by traffic volume.

Preliminary work on many of these projects is already underway as the Commission approved funds for the advanced planning earlier in the year.

Projects for Eastland County include:

State Highway 6 from U. S. 80 in Eastland, north to present Highway 6, 1.3 miles of grading, structures and surfacing.

Ten miles of surfacing, grading and structures on State Highway 6 from FM Road 1027 in Carbon, north to U.S. 80 in Eastland. State Highway 206 from the Callahan County line northeast to

FM Road 569, two miles of work. E. M. Pritchard, District 23 engineer, has announced that the Texas Highway Department will spend about \$860,000 for state and U. S. highway construction and reconstruction in Eastland County during 1961-62.
