Research Plans Are Outlined At Peanut Meeting

Plans for the new Southwest Peanut Research Foundation to conduct a program to benefit the peanut grower were outlined Thursday night at a dinner meeting of area county agents, peanut buyers, newspapermen and others at the Brown Jug Cafe in Gorman.

The foundation has asked peanut raisers to contribute 50 cents per ton on their 1960 crop to finance the work of the organization. This would amount to less than one cent per bushel and would be collected for the organization by the buyers of peanuts.

Funds of the foundation would be channeled mostly through agricultural colleges in Texas and Oklahoma. Major emphasis at present will be placed on finding ways through research to eliminate such plant diseases as Southern Blight and Root Rot, which have caused heavy losses.

Glen Kird, Gorman banker, presided at the meeting. Speakers included Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, and Heazlie Dean of Comanche, a prominent peanut buyer. Some 40 men were in attendance.

Grain Sorghums Will Be Observed In Thursday Tour

Demonstration plots of hybrid grain sorghums will be observed by the county agriculture agent and a committee Thursday, September 15. The group will leave from the Collin Campbell service station at Carbon at 9 a. m. to tour the D. D. Sandlin and the J. E. McDaniel farms near Carbon and the Park Plambeck place near Pleasant Hill. These plots are planted in sandy soil.

If time permits the committee will examine the post-oak and Black Jack Oak brush control demonstration on the Tom L. and Garland Garrett farms.

PIONEER MAN, 85, IS STILL ON SS ROLL ON 20th ANNIVERSARY

Benjamin I. Marshall, 85, of Pioneer is the only Eastland county resident among the six in the Abilene district and the 5488 in the nation who received a social security check for January 1960, the 20th anniversary of such checks were payable.

H. L. Weatherly of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, field representative for Eastland county, talked with Mr. and Mrs. Marshall recently and secured written permission to use their name in this matter. Mr. Marshall is a retired pump-

er, chiefly for the Texas Co., and came to Eastland county some 85 years ago as an infant. He was born Sept. 3, 1874, married Miss Fannie Pittman on Dec. 27, 1896, and the couple made their home in various parts of Eastland county throughout their married life of almost 64 years. He told Weatherly that he was a regular voter, always in Eastland county. He still drives his car, but doesn't enjoy it so much anymore, with the greatly increased traffic on good roads.

Mr. Marshall's benefit rate of

Jan. 1940 was \$27.19; this was raised for September 1950 to \$50.30; for Sept. 1952, to \$56.60; for Sept. 1954, to \$61.60; and most recently, for January 1959 to \$66.00. Mrs. Marshall's first check was for the month she reached 65 (women may now start collecting at age 62), March of 1943. Her checks have been equal to half of his over the years. Interested mathematicians may work out the total paid these two longtime beneficiaries, benefits which were based on his 1937-1939 earnings of \$4102.48, taxed at that time at 1% from employee and an equal amount from the employer.

Vets Questions And Answers

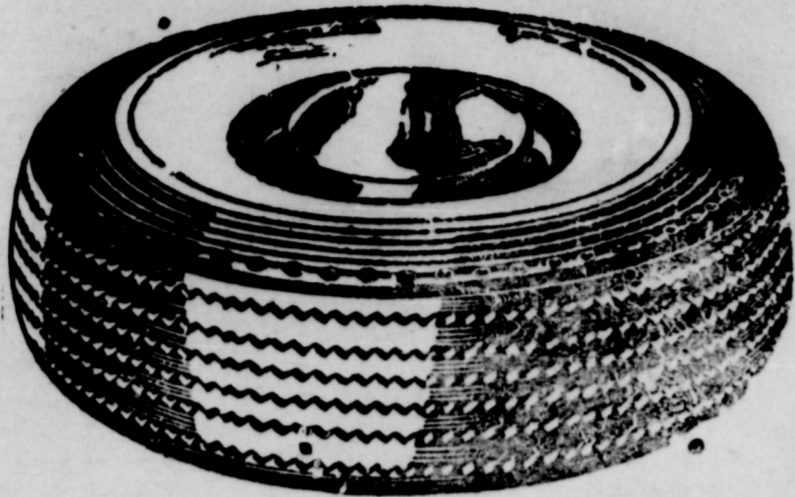

County Votes To Buy Flood Lights For Court House

The Eastland County Commissioners' Court voted Monday to spend up to \$630 to equip the court house with flood lights to be burned at night as requested by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. The vote was 3 to 1 with Commissioner Carl Lamb of Cisco opposing the action.

A delegation from the Eastland CofC appeared before the court last month to request that the flood lights be installed. At that time, the court took the matter under advisement.

At the Monday meeting, Attorney Virgil T. Seabury, Jr., appeared alone to request "a yes or no." He said the Eastland CofC felt that the action would benefit that city more than the county as a whole and that they would pay \$270 of the estimated \$900 installation cost.

It was decided that the money would be taken from the county's permanent improvement fund unless the attorney general held that it was illegal. In the event of an adverse ruling, the matter would be dropped.

The lights will burn four hours each night and it was estimated that the electricity would cost the county \$9 to \$10 per month.

In other action, the court approved the regular monthly bills
