Don Kincaid, Cisco school teacher, today announced he will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the 22nd District in the May 7 Democratic primary.

Kincaid is a native Texan and has been in Cisco, Texas for the past 10 years.

He is a member of the Cisco School Board, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, and the Cisco Ex-Students Association.

He has been a member of the West Texas Teachers Association and is past president of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association.

Kincaid is a member of the Cisco Church of Christ. He is a former member of the Cisco School Board and is presently president of the Cisco Junior College Ex-Students Association.

In announcing his candidacy, Kincaid said, "We all realize that in the next regular session of the Legislature there will be many vital issues concerning all of us."

"I realize that in asking the citizens of this district to elect me as their legislator, that I am placing a heavy responsibility in my hands. I consider this an important post, and I think I can fairly represent this area's interests."

Tom Creighton, County Attorney of Palo Pinto County, formally announced this week as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Senator from the 22 district.

He has been associated with the law firm of Creighton and Creighton since his graduation from the University of Texas School of Law and was elected County Attorney of Palo Pinto County for three consecutive years.

Mr. Creighton was born in 1927 and was reared in Palo Pinto County. He attended the Mineral Wells public schools and graduated from Mineral Wells High School in 1944. He was honorably discharged from the United States Navy after serving two years as an enlisted man during World War II.

He has been active in civic affairs, serving as President of the Palo Pinto County United States Citizens Association.

5,077 Poll Taxes Paid In County

Eastland County Tax Collector J. C. Allison has reported that 5,077 persons paid their 1960 poll tax and are eligible to vote in coming elections. This number is 1,900 greater than the total receipts issued during the 1956 election year, he stated.

An exact figure on the number of exemptions was not available, but it was estimated that about 30 percent of the total legal voters in the county would be exempted. Eastland County has a population of about 3,500.

Poll tax sales in the Cisco substation also reached a record high this year with 1,209 receipts issued by Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, deputy collector.

Fort Worth Man Low Bidder For Rising Star Job

Ernest Lloyd of Fort Worth was the low bidder on the re-construction of Highway 36 from Pioneer to the intersection of Highway 183 in Rising Star, according to a report here.

Mr. Lloyd bid \$290,833.40 for the 5.8 miles of new highway and will have 200 working days in which to complete the project.

The new road will eliminate the curve just west of Rising Star. Right-of-way has been widened and a 40 foot slab of pavement will be laid from the western city limits to the intersection with

Highway 183. No additional right-of-way has been taken but a solid slab of new pavement will be laid curb to curb. The city will bear the expense of the curbing, it was reported.

Farmers Exempt For New Trailer Title Regulation

Farmers do not have to comply with a new state law requiring title certification on trailers of 4,000 pounds gross weight or more, when the trailers are used for hauling their own produce to market.

This reminder was given local farmers this week by Glenn Justice, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, who said many farmers are not aware that the new law exempts carriers of farm products or produce.

The law, which was passed by the 56th Legislature during its regular session this year, requires certificate of title on all trailers having an unloaded weight in excess of 4,000 pounds. The Texas Farm Bureau was successful in getting an amendment to the law exempting vehicles used by their owners for transporting their own farm produce to market. Mr. Justice explained. He said the exemption does not apply when such products are being transported for hire.

The county Farm Bureau president said that the organization has information on the new law, and others passed by the 56th Legislature, in its file copies of the Austin news letter, a weekly publication issued by the Texas Farm Bureau legislative department while the legislature was in session, and also in a Legislative Report prepared by the Texas Farm Bureau following the close of the 56th Legislature, regular session.

This information through news channels will be of value to farmers, Justice stated, because many of them did not know that the new law had been passed, nor were aware of exemption which applied to them.

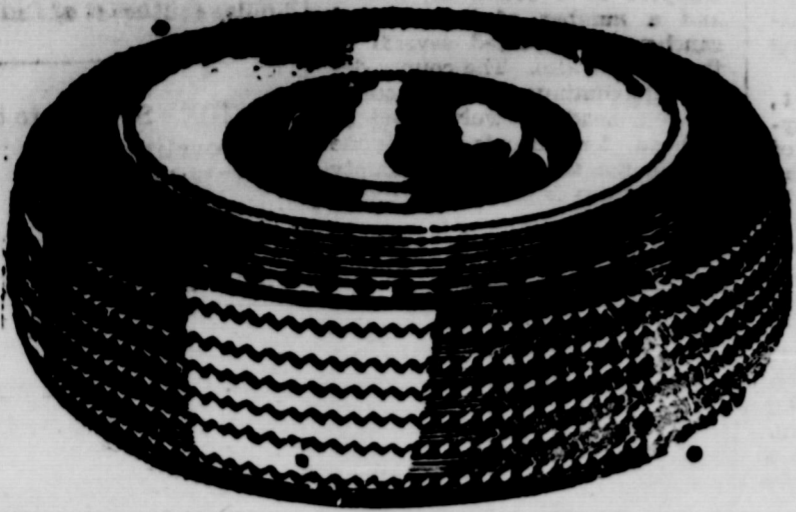

COUNTY IS ASKED TO ASSIST IN FIGHTING PREDATORY ANIMALS

The Eastland County Trappers Association and about 20 area ranchers appeared before the County Commissioners Court Monday to request aid in fighting predatory animals, according to a report here.

The Commissioners Court, which has previously been paying \$135 a month on the salary of one trapper in the county, voted to pay an additional \$100 a month on the salary of a second trapper. They also voted to pay \$500 on the back debt, incurred since August when the second trapper was hired by the Association.

The ranchers testified before the court that there is more wild-life in the county now than there has been in the past 10 years. Losses in sheep, goats and cattle have been "tremendous," ranchers stated.

Ranchers estimated that wool and mohair business in Eastland County brings in from half to three-quarters of a million dollars annually. If kids could be raised without great losses from wolves and bobcats the figure could be doubled, they reasoned.

Homer Boyd, who ranches north of Cisco, told of losing 85 kids this year and 160 last year. He also lost 75 lambs and 50 goats and estimated that his loss totaled several thousand dollars.

Oscar Schaefer said that there is no way to judge how many wolves and bobcats inhabit the county, but about 60 bobcats have been killed on his land in the

past five years.

Since August the two county trappers have killed 38 wolves and a number of bobcats and ranchers have killed several of the animals also. The county decided to continue to pay a bounty of \$5 a head for wolves and \$3 a head for bobcats to anyone killing the animals. The county trappers are ineligible to receive the bounty.

The county will continue to pay the \$235 to the Trappers Association for the services of the two trappers until the Association holds another meeting June 1.
