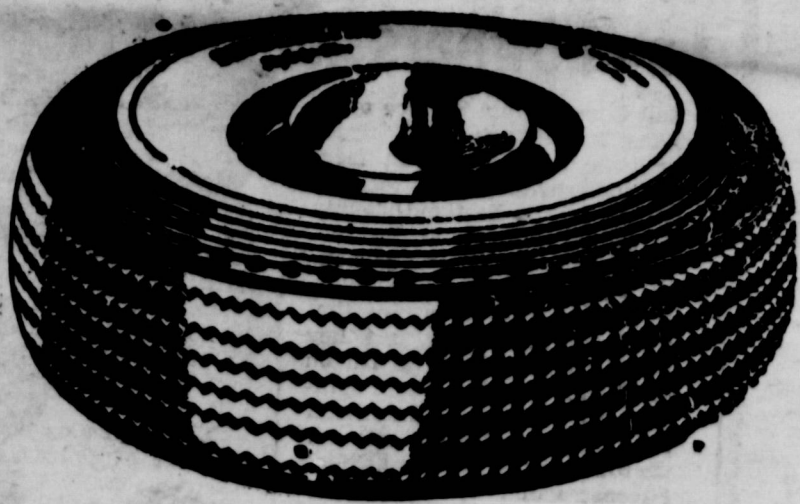

## 40 Farm Ponds Built For Area Land Owners In Past 3 Months

Soil Conservation Service technicians, landowners and contractors have been busy with farm pond construction, E. E. McAllister, head of the Eastland County SCS office, reported Friday.

"Landowners and technicians have made necessary site selections for ponds to determine that the soil will hold water, that they have suitable drainage to fill on normal rain and that a safe spillway can be provided," McAllister said. "After a suitable site has been found the ponds were staked for construction by contractors. SCS men give supervision as needed during construction and make the final check upon completion to determine that the pond is a safe structure and meets all the specifications.

"From this information the total cubic yards of dirt moved into the dam for construction are calculated and this amount certified to the ASC committee for payment. The Federal cost share on farm ponds is 50 percent of cost, not to exceed .09 per cubic yard."

Forty farm ponds have been built in this area during July, August and September.

In the Cisco area Roy Adams, Jennie Gordon, H. A. Thorman, L. L. Wragg, Theo Rich, Homer Smith, E. C. McClelland, S. G. Hill, Emil Reich, W. F. Zuh, A. A. Hansen and Grover Cleveland have completed ponds on their range lands, according to McAllister.

Robert W. Fox, Walter O. Fox, Jr. Harbin, Casey Mezell and M. B. Titsworth of the Eastland area have completed farm ponds.

Near Ranger, J. W. Mosky, Joe Young, E. Gailey, Cella Czernekus, R. L. McCleskey, K. W. J. meson, M. L. Woods, Ted Hall, Howard Wade, Sam Powers, J. W. Steward, Allie Hyatt and Haden Neal have recently had ponds completed.

In the Carbon and Gorman area Ed Glover, Alvis Rogers, C. M. McCain, H. A. Lovell, J. F. Gilbert, Lee ... J. F. Alder-

man and G. L. McDaniel have completed ponds which will help provide water for their livestock.

McAllister said the terracing program has also been active in this area. Terrace systems have been completed on the farms of A. E. Smith, W. T. Booth, Roy Adams, Russell Brown, J. W. Mosley, J. E. McLendon, Johnny Aaron, H. A. Lovell, H. W. Gilbert, Everett Mortin, and S. G. Hill.

"These farmers completed 88,791 feet of field terraces," McAllister said.

W. B. Wright, H. D. Brown and H. R. Casey are now in the process of constructing 50,000 feet of field terraces. Several farmers have made recent requests for construction of terraces, including D. M. Carr, R. C. Reeves, A. E. Smith and Charlie B. Wood, the local SCS technician pointed out.

"Soil Conservation Service for terraces with the land owners, run the lines, supervise technicians determine the need structure and make the final check to determine that terraces will function properly and will meet specifications and certify the total lengths to the ASC committee for payment. Federal cost share on terraces is 70 percent of total cost, not to exceed \$3.50 per hundred feet of completed terrace."

Diversion terraces have been completed by J. W. Mosley, Roy Adams, Robert W. Fox, L. L. Wragg, J. M. McLendon, Ed Gloves, A. E. Smith, W. T. Booth, Homer Smith, W. O. Fox, J. M. Sauls, Emil Reich and Guy Robbins.

McAllister pointed out that "diversion terraces are used to divert water to farm ponds where additional drainage area is needed. This practice, like ponds and terraces, are laid out by SCS technicians and must meet specifications based on design to insure proper functioning.
