County Tax Roll Slightly Higher Than Last Year

Eastland County commissioners approved Monday a total tax rendition of \$20,949,780 for this year. Despite several tax cuts, the rendition is slightly higher than that of last year — \$20,948,280.

Eastland countians this year will pay \$69,926.57 in state taxes, \$167,598.33 for county taxes, with school taxes listed at \$69,039.59. The total of the county, state, and school taxes is \$306,564.49.

A spokesman for the Tax-Assessor-Collector's office stated that this year the county has the largest rendered roll and the smallest unrendered roll in the county's history.

The annual county budget hearing will be held September 24 at the regular meeting of the court, it was announced.

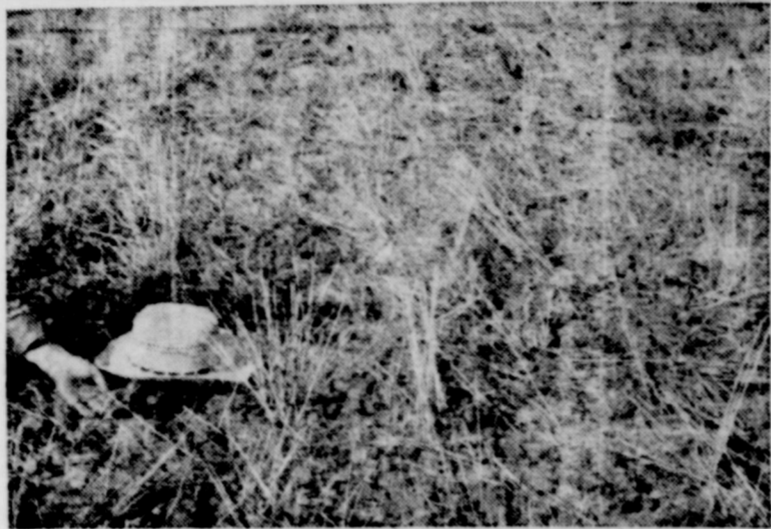
