Schools' Populations Count Continue Here

Muleshoe school's allotment of state funds depends to some extent on the school census now being conducted, and all residents of the school district are encouraged to cooperate in getting the completed forms back to the school by the January 31 deadline.

Due to be counted are all persons who will be at least six and none over eighteen on September 1, 1964, with no other factor considered.

School officials stress that the

fact that the child is married, has dropped out of school, etc., makes no difference provided he is within the age bracket.

Those who have not returned a census form should contact any of the school offices and request one, and those who have neighbors who have not done so are encouraged to get one for them.

Cooperation of all residents is needed so that Muleshoe school district may receive its proper share of state funds for education of its scholastic population.

I. M. Stinson Announces For Re-Election

Subdivision Expansion Plans Told

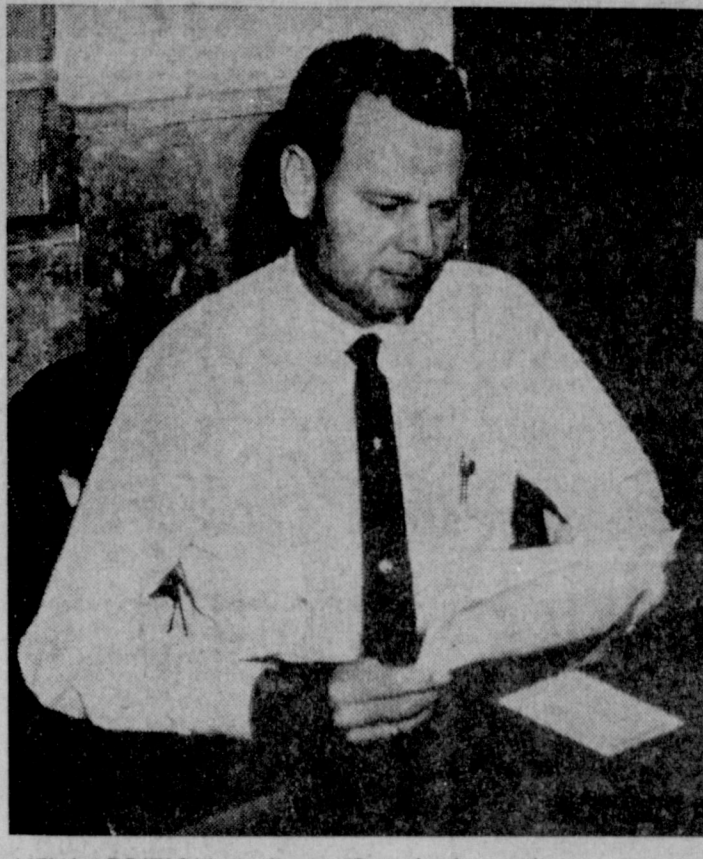
Another sign of Muleshoe growth came this week when a local company released expansion plans for its already successful suburb here.

Parkland Place Corporation has announced plans for the near future expansion of Muleshoe's Richland Hills subdivision.

Engineering work has begun along the south end of Avenue I where the land group will open up additional 16 lots in about 30 days, according to Eddie Lane, agent.

Lots will sell from \$1,425 to \$2,200 in the new area which is rolling and high. Both Avenue G and I are expected to be paved in the immediate future, according to Lane.

Engineers have also begun detail work to eventually open up land held by the corporation just west of the present Richland Hills subdivision. However, it will be quite some time before that area is opened up.

Library Demand Growing Throughout Bailey Area

County Jails Seven With Court Actions

One person was convicted on charges of transporting and D-WI, two others on charges of D-WI and four others on worthless check charges in county court this week.

Marcelle D. Phelps plead guilty to transporting and D-WI charges and was sentenced to three days in jail and fined \$100 on each count. Her driver's license will be suspended for six months, according to Roger Gorrill, county attorney.

Golden B. Benton plead guilty to a D-WI charge and was sentenced to three days in jail and fined \$100 and costs. He will lose his license for six months.

Lonnie Payne plead guilty to two charges of worthless checks and was sentenced to two days in jail and fined a total of \$14 plus costs.

Just How Much Assessment Would Be Increased Stated

Growth of the grass roots demand for better and more complete public library services in Bailey County continues to expand rapidly, according to local reports.

The Bailey County Ministerial Alliance, a group composed of ministers of most churches in the county, publicly endorsed the Friends of the Library Association and its drive for good library facilities here.

The move came at the ministerial group's last meeting, according to Rev. James H. Peters, secretary-treasurer and Rev. Frank Peery, president.

In another move to strengthen the library association, the group has planned a major meeting to be held in the Bula High School auditorium next Thursday at 8 p.m.

The purpose of the meeting will be two fold. The primary purpose will be to explain, in detail, just what library services will mean and how they will work in the south part of the county.

A group of speakers will be headed by Joe Harbin, chairman of the inter-county relations committee.

The second phase will be to sign up members for the association which is about 250 strong presently.

Plans are in the mill at the present time to open a concerted membership drive in Muleshoe. A Special Membership Committee from "Friends of the Library" for the city of Muleshoe under

the direction of J. Frank Peery, vice-chairman of "Friends of the Library" has been set for Wednesday, February 5.

The plan calls for membership to answer questions and enroll citizens in the "Friends of the Library" program.

Membership now stands at 250 persons. The organization has set 500 as its present goal.

In other action costs to county residents for the operation of the library came under study this week. A short time ago County Judge Glen Williams stated that there was no way the county could support a library budget without a raise in property assessments.

At the time of his speech he made no mention of how much property assessments would have to go up for this purpose. It has now been disclosed that the raise would be a minute one-half of one percent of the current assessment.

Here's how it is figured using the county commissioner's own figures.

During the recent bond issue for a new county courthouse, the commissioners released figures showing that it would take a 25 percent increase in assessments to raise \$360,000.

The total budget for the library will run about \$14,000 total. That figure will be divided between at least two counties; making our share \$7,000 at the most.

So to figure the necessary raise in assessments divide \$360,000 into 25 percent. This gives you the increase necessary for \$1,000. Now simply multiply that figure by \$7,000 and you arrive at about one-half of one percent increase in assessment.

In other words if your property is now assessed at \$30,000. The assessment would be raised to \$32,100 dollars AND YOUR TAXES WOULD INCREASE ABOUT TEN CENTS A YEAR. If your property is valued at \$10,000, your tax increase would be about five cents a year.

In a special called meeting Thursday the County Commissioners agreed to hire the law firm of Moorehead, Sharp, Boyd and Tidale of Plainview to represent Bailey County in the \$196,000 land damage action brought against the county as co-defendant.

The case will be handled by Joe Sharp, ex-district attorney for this area. His fee has been set at \$4,000, according to the court-house.

A second attorney will also be hired. Although he has not yet been named he will be selected from among local lawyers, according to Glenn Williams, county judge.

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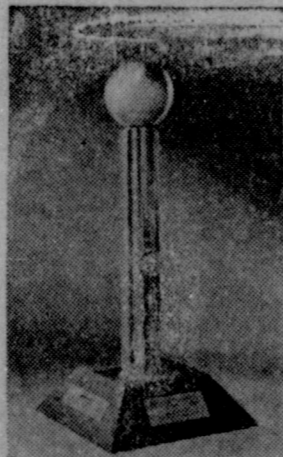

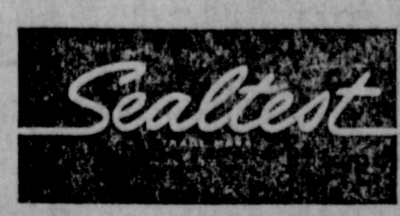

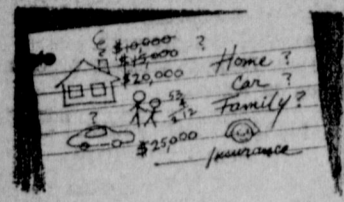
