Peanut Growers to Vote On Research Assessment

Texas peanut growers will ballot September 24 in a referendum to approve or disapprove a plan under which the growers would assess themselves for the cost of a promotion and essearch program to improve marketing, peanut quality and insect and disease control.

disease control.

The referendum, authorized by the Texas Legislature, will cover 117 Texas counties having peanut allotments and will be conducted by the Southwestern Pearlut Growers Association.

If the grovers approve, the new program will be administered by a commodity produ-cers board composed of nine members and elected at large by Texas peanut producers. The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association is designed only to conduct the referendum.

and purposes: An amendment sponsored by Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, to his original bill was enacted in the regular session of the Texas Legislature and signed into law June 9. This act makes possible effective self assessment programs on most Texas produced agricultural commodi-

Ross Wilson, Gorman, mana-ger of the SWPGA, explains

the program in its inception

The bill specifies that any organization representative of producers of a particular agricultural commodity may petition the Texas Agriculture Commissioner for a hearing for the purpose of determining whether or not the organization can be certified for the purpose of conducting a referendum among the producers of the particular commodity.

Such a hearing was held by the Commissioner on July 16 for the purpose of determin-ing whether Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association should be certified to conduct such a referendum among peanut growers in Texas. SWPGA was duly certified by the Commissioner and the following day the Association Board of Directors officially called a referendum for Sept. 24, 1969.

As proposed the referendum will cover all 117 counties in Texas which have peanuts allotments. The Association is dum in all county seat news-papers in peanut producing counties as well as daily newspapers in 4 metropolitan areas which have circulation throughout the seanut producing areas of Texas. In addition, county agricultural agents will be notified of the referenduum by mail.

The Association will mail ballots to all Texas peanut producers on record in order that each pearest producer may vote either for or against the assessment program and at the same time vote for initial directors of the new association.

Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association is certified only to conduct the ref-erendum. It will not administer the new program. Assessment funds will be collected and administered by a commodity producers board composed of 9 members to be elected at large by Texas peanut producers.

Growers will vote in the referendum on a maximum assessment of \$1.00 per net ton. farmers stock basis, for the first year of the program. This assessment fee is identical to that in effect in most other major peanut producing

states. Any increase in the assessment fee must be submitted to all producers in the state in a biennial election of directors. The change would have to be ratified by a majority of the producers voting in the election.

FB President Jack Cozari Attend Statewide Meet Aug. 18

Jack Cozart, President of the Eastland Couty Farm Bureau has announced that he will ata statewide conference of county Farm Bureau Presidents to be held Aug. 18, at the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

Purpose of the conference is to consider recommendations of a special Study Committee appointed earlier this year by Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean to study the state organization's structure and operating procedure. The committee completed its work last month and made ite report to the TFB board of directors July 29 in Waco.The

board accepted the report and set the Aug. 18 meeting so that the recommendations of the six-member Study Committee could be explained in

detail to county leaders. Following the Austin meeting, the county presidents are expected to take the proposals back to their home counties

to be considered in the Farm Bureau's policy development process which begins on the county level. After consider-October, the counties' recommendations on the proposal will be submitted to the state convention which will be held in November in San Antonio. Voting delegates from county FBs adopt policies for the Texas Farm Bureau.

Sailing from America (some in cars and some walking) the first country was Ireland. The company landed at the Methodist Parsonage to be greeted by the pastor and wife, Rev. and Mrs. E. M. Wisdom. Decorations representing Ireland were beautiful. The American tourists were given a hearty welcome - by the inhabitants of Erin and received badges of Shamrock flags, they were invited to join in singing "Where the Dear old Shannon Flows." 
