**REGISTERED BEEF CATTLE SHOW WILL PAY PREMIUMS THIS YEAR**

The third annual Eastland County registered Beef Cattle Show to be held in Cisco next May will offer \$500 in premiums to the owners of the prize winning animals, S. P. Crofts, prominent Angus breeder of Cisco and president of the group, reported today.

It will be the first that cash prizes have been awarded since the pure-bred show started in 1953. Only ribbons have been awarded in the past, Crofts said.

The exact date in May for the show has not been set. It is expected to be set to coincide with the Ranch Day of the Cisco Junior College and the Cisco Kid Fiesta and will be held in downtown Cisco instead of at the show barn on the Moran highway as in the past. Several business firms have offered to donate space for the one day affair, according to T. G. Caudle, Cisco Hereford breeder and general superintendent of the show.

There are 39 breeders of reg-

istered beef cattle of the Hereford and Angus breeds in Eastland County, according to information from County Agent J. M. Cooper's office in Eastland. Most of them are small breeders.

Due to the expressed desires and wishes of the breeders at several meetings, the classes for the show have been changed to allow many individual animals to be shown. It was pointed out, however, that emphasis will continue to be placed on the group classes, where more than one animal is shown together. The classes of animals have recently been mailed out to all breeders in the county.

**Curried Rice and Tuna Make a Tasty and Thrifty Filling for Luscious Tomatoes**

Rice brings together the deep sea goodness of tuna fish and the Oriental excitement of curry in this versatile main dish. The curry powder contributes exotic flavor and intriguing color enhanced by the bits of green pepper and the brilliant red of the tomatoes.

Served piping hot from the oven or cold and refreshing on a bed of greens, this "something special" for the family is also something quick and easy for Monday.

**INGREDIENTS:**  
8 medium sized ripe tomatoes  
4 tablespoons minced onion  
2 tablespoons minced green pepper  
4 tablespoons butter or margarine

1 7-ounce can tuna fish  
2 cups cooked rice  
1 teaspoon curry powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 cup water

**PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE:** To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and leave over this

low heat for 14 minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat. Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep unused rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

**METHOD:** Peel tomatoes easily by scalding, plunging into cold water and then peeling. Slice off stem end of tomatoes. Carefully scoop out pulp. Cook onion and green pepper in the butter or margarine until tender. Add the tuna fish, rice, curry powder, salt, pepper and water. Mix thoroughly. Fill the tomatoes with the tuna and rice mixture and bake at 350° F. about 15 minutes or until the tomatoes are tender. Serve hot. Garnish with green pepper rings if desired.

For a cool and refreshing salad, chill the tomatoes after they are stuffed and serve on salad greens. This recipe makes 8 servings or 3 cups of the curried tuna and rice mixture.

grow it in the pond where the fish live. This will consist of plant and animal life found in the water.

The production of microscopic plant and animal life often referred to as plankton or Bloom is the first and most important step in the whole food chain. An abundant supply of plankton can be produced in water containing lots of plant food such as all fertilizers contain. This plant food normally finds its way into the pond by being dissolved from the soil as the water flows in from over the watershed.

The plant food in the water is largely determined by the fertility of the watershed over which the water flows. Poor land means poor water and poor water means little food for the fish. To increase the production of food in the pond, we now think in terms of fertilizing these acres of water as we fertilize land for crops. The principle is the same, and same kinds of fertilizers may be used.

Various mixtures of fertilizers may be used to fertilize ponds: One recommended fertilizer is 200 pounds of cottonseed meal plus 100 pounds 20 per cent superphosphate. The 300 pounds of this mixture is suggested for ponds of 1/2 surface acre of water or less, for one year. Apply as follows: First application 150 pounds broadcast over pond in early spring. Second, third, and fourth applications of 50 pounds each at four to six-weeks intervals. Using the same method of application as with Cottonseed meal and superphosphate you could use 300 pounds of a high grade commercial fertilizer or use 250 pounds of barnyard manure per application.
