

Since 1891 the nation's population has increased 80 per cent. In these 34 years our church membership has increased 130 per cent. Last year alone nearly 700,000 new members were added, bringing the total to heart home one night last week. something over 46 million- somepopulation.

Figures may or may not mean much. The mere fact that a person is a church member doesn't evidence good behavior or good citizenship There are black sheep in every fold. But the criminal check-sheet show Jim Seals Tuesday afternoon. that a majority of wrongdoers who are apprehended do not profess almovement for the public good.

So church growth is an index to national decency and welldoing. It evidences order and stability, and at least a desire to do what is right.

A SEVERE LESSON

Generally non-advertisers are also non-readers. If any of them do read, here is a lesson from Chamaign, Ill. Five years ago, the leading mercantile firm of that city suddenly quit advertising. It had been spending much money telling the people if its business and inviting them in. The other day the firm went into bankruptcy, and the head of the concern said it was because the firm made a mistake five years ago and stopped advertising.

THE REAL DANGER

Horses and mules are still so necessary to the economic life of America that no one is likely to be alarmed just because the Department of Agriculture asserts that there is danger of an acute shortage in a few years. Breeders will naturally raise more colts as the price of draft animals raises, and the supply can also be increased by importation. The real danger, according to many agricultural obserbers, is that in a few years there will be very few farm lads who know how to drive anything without a throttle.

TURNED A TRICK

Stamp-collecting enthusiasts have turned a trick on the Postoffice Department and got away with it. A few of them have used a half of a one cent stamp as half cent postage under the new postal regulations that call for perpayment of that amount, Wednesday - Thursday and by some slip of good nature or inattention various postmasters have let these home-made stamps pass muster. But the game is finished by departmental orders in spite of the fact that the postoffice would save on printing bills if the practice was popularized.

MONEY TO BURN
