CHICAGO MAN TALKS TO LIONS

Last Tuesday at the noon hour the Lions Club met for the regular luncheon at the Methodist church. President Paul Holcomb being in attendance upon the national convention of Lions, Vice-President Thornton opened the meeting. Special music was rendered by Miss Bonnie Rives, violinist, with Mrs. Faris Callan at the piano.

Lion Albert Spill was the toastmaster and he introduced Mr. Kin-slay of the West Texas Utilities Co. of Abilene who in turn introduced Mr. W. S. Vivian, of the Middle West Texas Utilities Co., Chicago, who made one of the most wonderful and uplifting talks it has been our pleasure to listen to. He told of the fixed purposes in the lives of several of the nation's great men whose perseverance under trying times and ridicule gave many of the inventions and conveniences now enjoyed all over the world.

One of the speaker's stories which impressed us was of an old farmer who had a fine spring near the roadside by which travelers passed and was hidden from the passers-by by a hedge. His wife suggested that he clear a path from the road to the spring, which he did, suggesting that they would be much happier from the fact that they were of help to their fellowman; and they were happy. A sign was placed by the side of the road saying, "If you are thirsty, stop and drink." Then the good wife suggested that an old bench be brought from the attic and placed by the spring, which was done, and a sign placed on the bench, reading, "If you are tired sit down and rest." And they were happy. Then the good wife suggested that a basket of nice apples be placed near the bench, which they did, with the sign, "If you like apples, help yourself." And they were happy. This little story was the inspiration for the writer of that beautiful verse,

"Let me live in a house by the side of the road and be a friend to man."

Mr. Vivian said we all had springs from which our fellowman could quench his thirst—the springs of human kindness and helpfulness—seats where they could rest and apples which they could eat.

The speaker also told an amusing little story of a rooster which strayed from his own domain into the nearby hills and discovered an ostrich egg. Getting his bill or beak under the ostrich egg, the rooster finally rolled it to his own back yard and calling his flock around him said: "Hens, I have no complaint to make and am not criticizing; I am just merely showing you how many do things in other communities."

Here's another line from Mr. Vivian's address in which is more truth than poetry:

No one has ever figured on the value of a smile;
We know how much a dollar's worth and how far is a mile.
We know the distance to the sun;
the size and weight of earth
But no one here can tell us just how much a smile is worth.

Improved Methods At Ford Plant

If the average car owner ever gives any thought to the subject of heat these days other than to try motoring out to a cool spot to escape it, there's one place where he can take a little lesson that will be as interesting as it is, perhaps, surprising to him. That place is in a department at the Highland Park plant of the Ford Motor Company where he may learn how heat, when it is controlled and maintained to certain definite temperatures, works wonders in treating steel.

The purpose, of course, is to give steel parts used in the building of automobiles qualities that for the greatest durability and thus insure the utmost in safety. It is demonstrated here more impressively than most anywhere else, for in this division of Ford manufacture there are 470 heat treatment furnaces through which steel parts by the million pass daily in preparation for the particular duties they are to perform in the make-up of the Ford car.

Steel, as most everyone knows, may be given various degrees of hardness, strength and elasticity by heat treating and these heat-treatment furnaces maintain the standard conditions so uniformly that it is not only a scientific certainty that each part come forth fit for duty but that it could not be made better by any means at present known.

Intensive experiments carried on by the Ford Motor Company determined the exact treatment needed to produce just the qualities required, processes varying according to the chemical analysis of the steel used and the function the finished steel part is to perform.

There is one battery of these furnaces in the plant through which 2,250,000 small steel parts are treated every day. Another battery takes care of the steel bars from which magnets are made and still another treats the magnets after they have been cut from white hot bars and have been bent to the correct shape, at the rate of 150,000 daily.

Continuous furnaces, those operating on the conveyor system, perform an interesting manufacturing operation. In a series of three of these furnaces front axles to the number of 8,100 are treated every day.

Spindle arms, also are treated in this manner. First they move slowly through 1500 degrees Fahrenheit for an hour and a quarter, emerge to be quenched in solution, then are treated for another hour and a quarter at 90 degrees and come out

to be air cooled. So it goes through every heat treating operation where science and heat co-operates in producing lightweight, strong and durable parts to render the utmost in security to the finished car and safety for the driver.

Temperatures of the furnace are ascertained by delicate electrical treatments. In some cases the temperature is automatically controlled. Where this is not done, the slightest variation is signaled on a switch-board by a system of colored lights and operators who are always on duty at once make necessary adjustments to keep the temperature at the required standard.

Under improved methods in these furnace departments, which include in summer time huge ventilators carrying pure, washed and cooled air down beside each furnace, working conditions have lost their former hardships for the men.

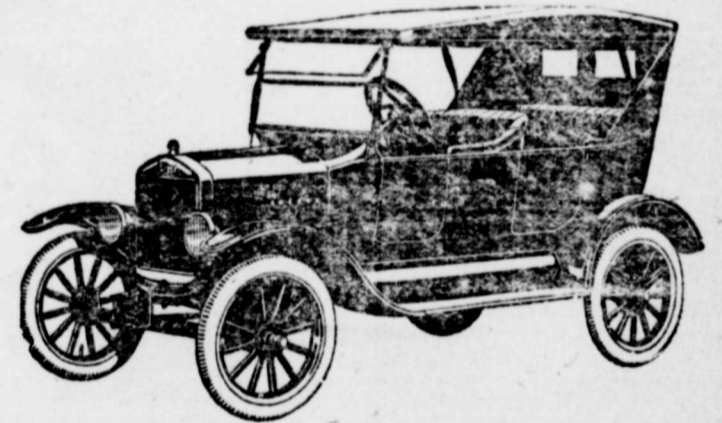

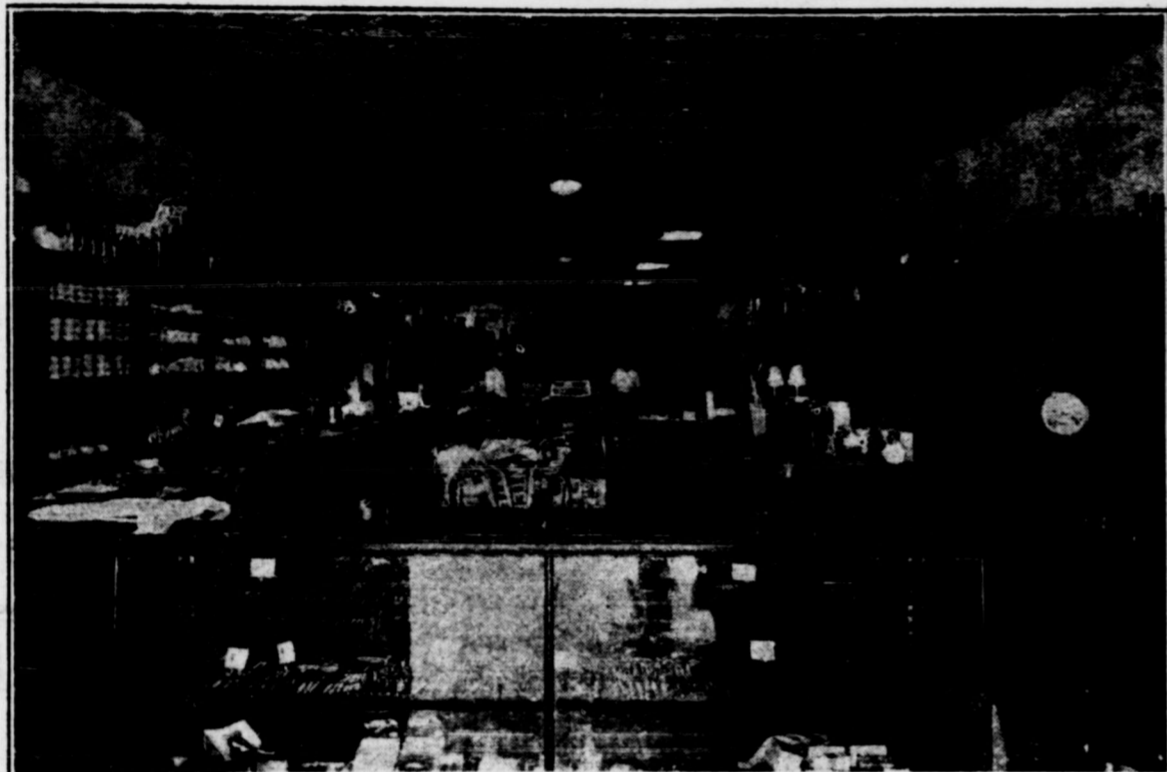

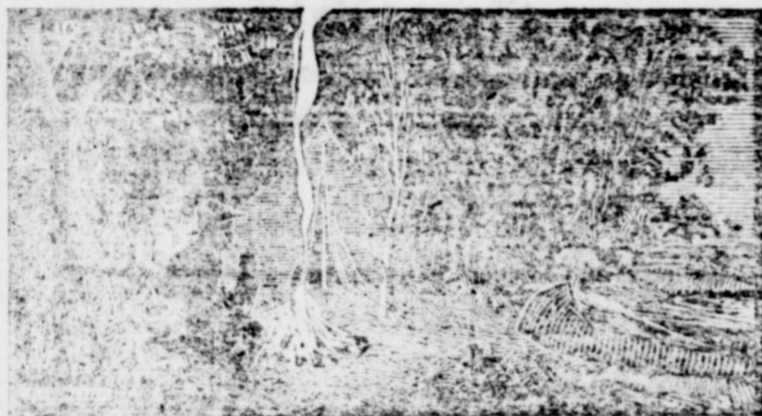
