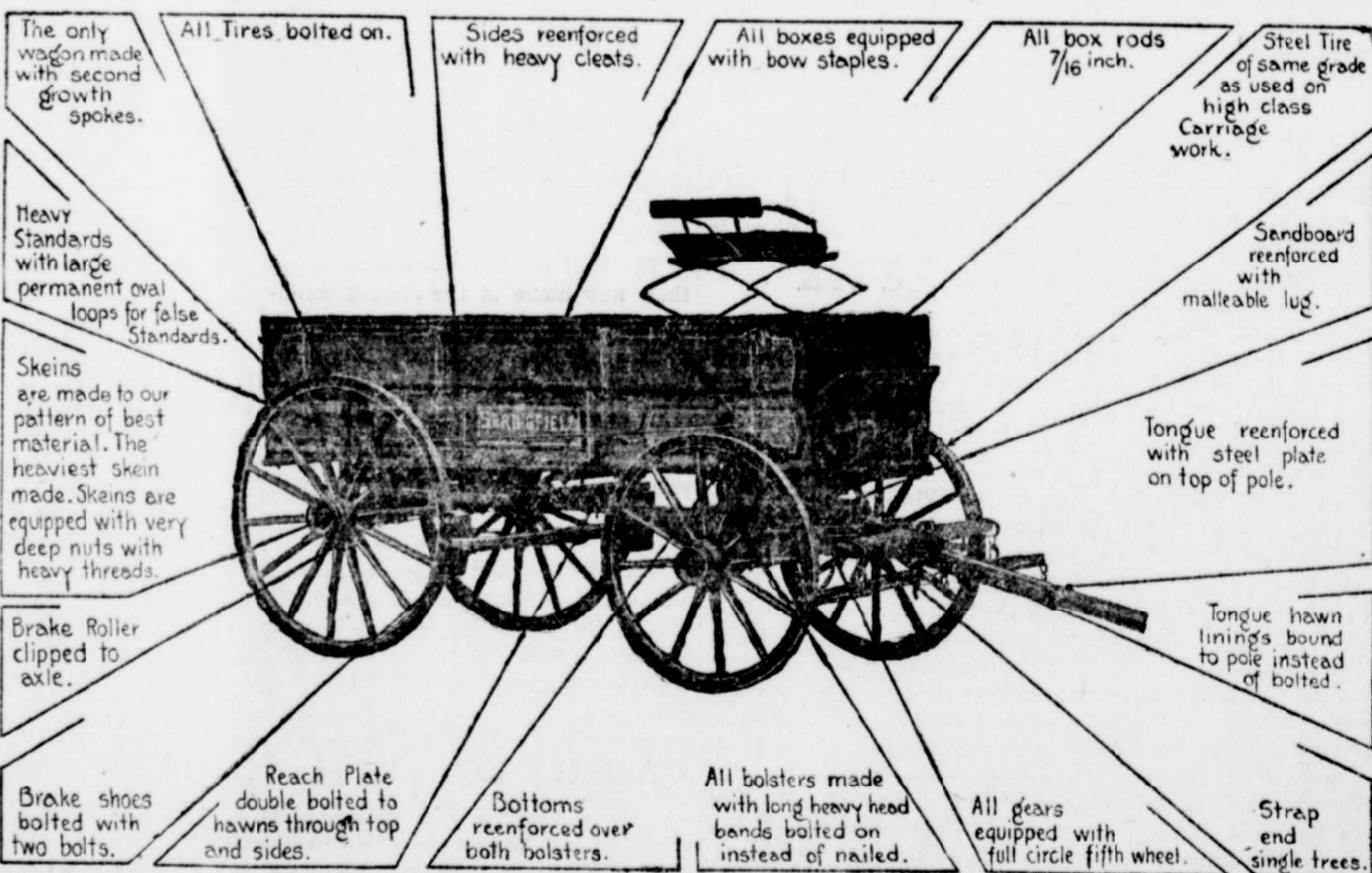

First Methodist At Mart Buy \$6300 Organ

The following news item from Mart, Texas, is given space because Rev. P. T. Stanford, who pastored that church, was at one time pastor of the First Methodist church of this city, and many will be glad to learn of his progress in the Master's vineyard at Mart:

The building committee of the Methodist church awarded the contract for their new pipe organ Thursday, July 2nd. The organ is to be a Hillgreen-Lane, manufactured at Alliance, Ohio, and sold by the Will A. Watkins Company of Dallas.

The organ is to have two manuals and pedals in the console. It is to have twenty stops and nine couplers. Six of the stops are in the great organ, ten in the swell organ and four in the pedal organ.

There are to be eleven complete sets of pipes, and a total number of seven hundred and forty-two pipes. The pipes will vary in length from two inches to ten feet, some of them metal and some wood.

The Hillgreen-Lane organ is an electric-pneumatic type of organ using a unified stop system. There are over a hundred organs of this make in Texas. Among them are the First Baptist church at Mexia, the new Central Christian at Waco, Texas Presbyterian College at Milford, and the new McFarlin auditorium at S. M. U. The First Baptist church at Dallas has a three manual and echo organ which was rebuilt by the Hillgreen-Lane Co.

The console and grill work of the organ are to be of the same material and finish as the woodwork in the church.

First 7 Months Production To Exceed Year of '24

Detroit, Mich., July 15.—Chevrolet Motor Company having established successive production records for April, May and June, will exceed by August 20 the total production for the entire year of 1924, it is announced by R. H. Grant, general sales manager.

Chevrolet production during 1924 was 305,303. During the first six months of 1925 the total production reached 246,081, or only 59,222 under the aggregate for the preceding year.

The company produced 54,944 motor cars and trucks during June, exceeding any previous June in its history. The total for the month was exceeded by only one month of Chevrolet production, October of 1923. Sales to dealers during June were 54,725. At the end of June there still remained 24,654 unfilled retail orders in the hands of dealers.

"I stated recently that the motor car industry was becoming stabilized; that the undesirable peaks and depressions of production were being flattened out," said Mr. Grant. "This statement is substantiated by the Chevrolet production figures for the last three months."

"In April we produced 52,236 cars and trucks; in May 52,853 and in June 54,944. Thus we have a variation of only 2,708 units between the lowest and highest of the three months. And of even greater significance is the fact that our production crept up instead of down during a period in which past experience has led manufacturers to expect a decided decrease.

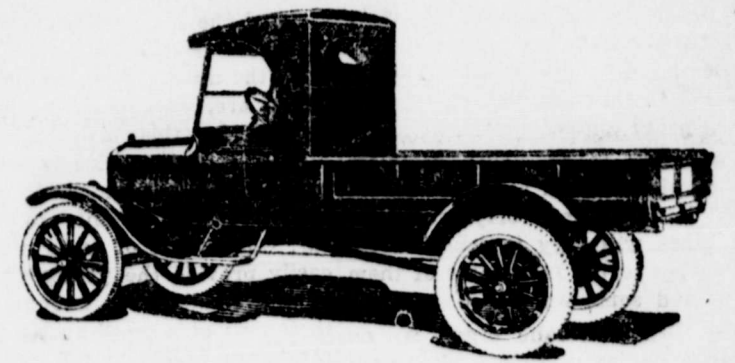

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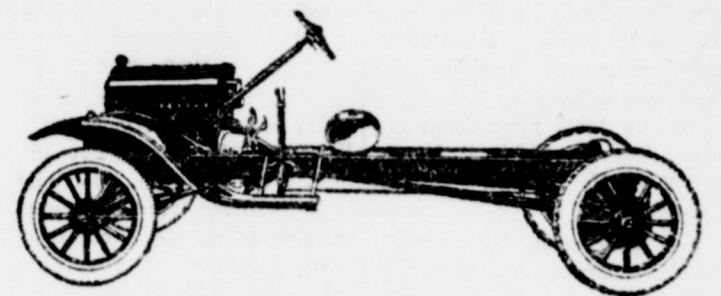

TIRE PRICES SOARING

All over the country tire dealers have announced advances in the prices of their wares. This is not pleasant news for the motorist, but he must grin and bear it, as there is to be little hope of relief. The increase is due to the big jump in the price of raw rubber, tire men say. A year ago crude rubber sold for 17 cents a pound. Now it is about 90 cents and threatening to go higher.

Secretary Hoover sees a serious rubber shortage within the next few years because England has placed severe restrictions on rubber exports from its possessions and this action has discouraged production.

The United States uses three-fourths of the world's rubber supply. Last year the rubber bill of the United States was 185 million dollars. This year it is expected to be 400 million.

THE WORD "OBEY"

The suggestion to omit the word "obey" from the marriage ceremony of a certain church and to abandon the phrase wherein the bridegroom with his worldly goods does his wife endow, is well taken. The modern emancipation of women has removed them from the class of chattels and placed them upon a footing of business and political equality with men. A leading railroad company has evolved a plan to help summer tourists by selling tickets with payments extending over a period of from 20 to 32 weeks. Now, if they can just arrange with the tourist hotels and sight-seeing buses for similar payment, there will be more stalling than ever among the installment brothers.

PLENTY OF PIN MONEY

Twelve thousand a year to spend on automobiles, phonographs, radios and other devices for giving pleasure. That is the amount which goes every year to each of the 2,229 members of the Osage tribe of Indians, and those are the things on which it is largely spent.

"Oil" is the answer to the question of how the Osages became the wealthiest people, per capita, on earth. Millions and millions of dollars have been paid to them as royalties and bonuses on the streams of oil that have flowed from their reservatins to help run the oil-consuming engines of the world. Twelve thousand dollars is credited to each of these 2,229 members every year, payable in quarterly remittances.

Every newspaper is subject to errors, and we don't believe there has ever yet been a paper printed that was perfect. However, no editor marks a typographical error because he wants to, neither does he make them for the purpose of doing injury to some person or institution. Regardless of how careful he and his printers may be, they will occasionally creep into the paper and accordingly the editor is taken to task by the irate subscriber.

Many errors are somewhat amusing to the outsiders, but while chuckling over the manner in which a misplaced letter makes an article read, they do not realize the embarrassing position in which the editor is thrown. We can sympathize with them, for we too have made errors unconsciously. But in talking of such errors, we are reminded of two near-serious ones which have appeared in two Texas newspapers just recently which although amusing to the reader, have no doubt caused the editors of the journals to lose several hours of sleep. Two weeks ago the Garland News told of how a certain choir was "badly led" by a prominent citizen of the community. All the trouble was caused by misplacing a letter which made the word "ably" appear in print as "badly." After a graceful explanation, Editor Holford has been allowed to remain in town. The second error appeared in a paper a short distance from Honey Grove, and was more disastrous than the one above mentioned. In a personal column the editor intended to chronicle the visit of an esteemed lady of the city, to a style show in Dallas. The editor's intentions were good, but the linotype operator, as all good operators do occasionally, made an error in a line which had to be corrected. This he no doubt did in an acceptable manner, but the person who placed the correction slug in the item got it in the wrong place and when the paper was printed and mailed, the readers read to their dismay that prominent lady was in the county jail and that the sheriff was reviewing the style show. An extra edition of the paper was printed correcting the error. If the readers of newspapers knew exactly how such errors as above preyed on the minds of those responsible for them, they would pity the editor rather than chuckle over the error.

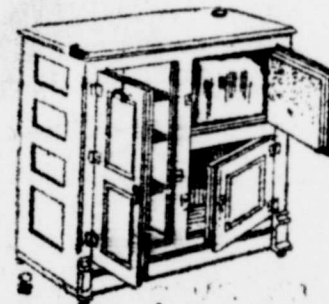

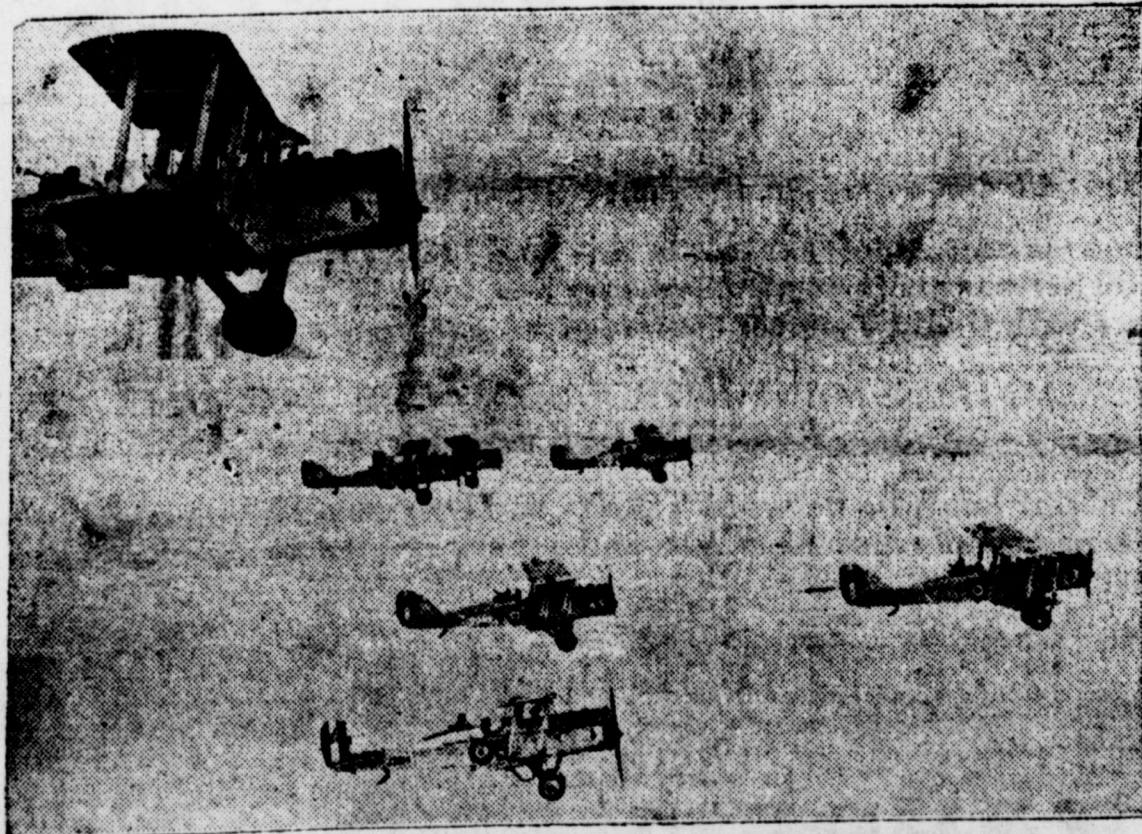

Feed Crops Are Needed Over State

It is becoming increasingly apparent that unless special effort is made to increase this year's production of feed crops in North and Central Texas, wherever conditions warrant such an undertaking, there may be a serious shortage of hay, fodder and grain.

The writer recently traveled through a considerable part of this area and inspected crops and talked with farmers, bankers and business men and all are of the opinion that a special effort should be made to arouse farmers to need for taking advantage of the local rains which may fall in order to plant "catch" crops which will make feed for livestock and not compel them to spend their cotton money for what the farmers should raise.

Dairy farmers, hog raisers and poultrymen are depending upon grain and feed and if their farms do not produce enough they hope to buy what they need close to home. There is a good opportunity for enterprising farmers to plant drought-resistant grain sorghums wherever there is enough moisture in the earth to sprout the seed. Several sections of Dallas county recently had two good rains in succession, moistening the ground several inches deep where the soil was in condition to take up the moisture. Much of the wheat and oat land can be gotten ready for some kind of feed crops which will mature something before fall. The more feed is raised the less will have to be bought.

Perhaps the best crop conditions are to be found in West Texas and Northwest Texas, where frequent rains have done lots of good. Lots of land there could be planted to the grain sorghums—kafr, feterita and milo, also to Sudan grass and perhaps to darso and other quick-maturing sorghums. These can be planted all through July. Feterita has been planted as late as August 1, and made a good yield in West Texas, according to Superintendent

R. E. Dickson of the Spur Agricultural Experiment Station.

West Texas farmers could find a ready market for their grain and feed crops in North and Central Texas, where many farmers will have to buy feed. In recent years much West Texas milo and other similar grains have been shipped to East and North Texas and farmers have come to like them and to depend upon them. An arrangement could be made through county agents and Chambers of Commerce to arouse interest among West Texas farmers to raise these emergency feed crops now to supply those sections of Texas which will have a feed shortage because of deficient moisture.

In an emergency like the present there is no use to depend upon cotton alone to buy feed with. It is not certain that there will be a large cotton crop in Texas and certainly a large part of the State will not produce half of a normal crop, judged by present conditions. The frequent showers do not put a season in the ground such as Texas usually has. The lack of subsoil moisture in the ground below the top of few inches makes it necessary to do everything possible to raise anything which gives promise of producing emergency feed.

Because of the drought at planting time farmers in this section did not plant the usual acreage to feed crops so that some authorities believe North Texas will scarcely produce 50 per cent of its feed requirements.

Many farmers are counting on harvesting their Johnson grass and saving every bit of it in spite of the prejudice there is against this
