Club Work

During the last two months club work has made steady progress. During this time seven club meetings were held, nine field schools were conducted and training was given in the following subjects: Poultry culling and judging, 5; Grain judging, 4; Livestock judging, 3. Three field tours were made and a number of the club members' cotton and maize plots were visited. Most of the plots were found in good, clean, well cultivated condition.

The second Inter-County Training school in which Concho, Medina and Runnels counties participated was held at Menard, May 26. A number of the club boys from Runnels county took part in this work. The workouts given on fat lambs and beef cattle were very instructive and the boys received much helpful informa-

We now have in Runnels county 12 organized clubs with a membership of 230. Each club has its local leader and every effort is put forth
