For the first few years I believe that by growing different crops in the field, such as alfalfa, oats, wheat, maize and cotton, something can be kept growing the year round that will need water, but if there should be times the water would not be needed We have over a mile of large slough with a sandy gravel bottom in which we can run the water and sink it. In later years a large reservoir can be built if necessary above the ground, and of sufficient size to hold all the flow for three or four months, and released on the field by gravity when most needed. This reservoir made by building levies across the field at the highest point, running north and south and connected at the lower end. Of course the cost of such a project would be prohibitive now and would not be needed anyway for several years. I believe that with the proper arrangement this farm can be made very valuable, and that the sewage disposal can be turned from a liability into a substantial asset. Many details remain to be worked out but it appears that we are about to solve this problem for all time to come. This has been by far the knottiest problem the city council has ever been called on to face. 




