Farmers Inquire About Details Of Social Security

"Judging from our mail and personal inquiries, most farmers of this area have two questions to ask about the new social security coverage," says E. Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security Office.

He answered the query on possible employer - employee relationship between the landowner and the tenant, as follows:

"The tenant is self - employed if he agrees to produce a crop or livestock on the land of another, with the crop its proceeds to be divided and with the amount going to each depending upon the total of the crop. It does not matter whether the tenant or the farm owner pays the expenses of raising or harvesting the crop. Seed, feed, fertilizer, tools, machinery, insecticides, etc., may be shared or provided by either the farm owner or the tenant. A "share-cropping" arrangement bears some likeness to a partnership, but usually there is no intent to form a partnership, but merely an agreement for a sharing of the crop or proceeds. Many of the usual indications of a partnership are lacking, such as joint liability for debts, joint bank accounts, holding out as partners, etc."

The question on employer - employee relationship between the farm operator and harvesting or other crews is answered this way:

"Employees are often made available to farmers by a 'labor contractor' or 'crew leader'. Some are the employee agents of the farmer; others are acting on their own and thus self - employed in

their own right.

"If the farmer has the right to control and direct the leader in his work, then the crew leader and members of the crew are employees of the farmer.

"Where the crew leader agrees to perform an entire farming operation such as harvesting grain, fruit, cotton, or any other

crop, and is not subject to control and direction by the farmer, he is self-employed. Members of the crew or group used by the crew leader are his employees, and the taxpaying and reporting duties are his, as he himself is self-employed."

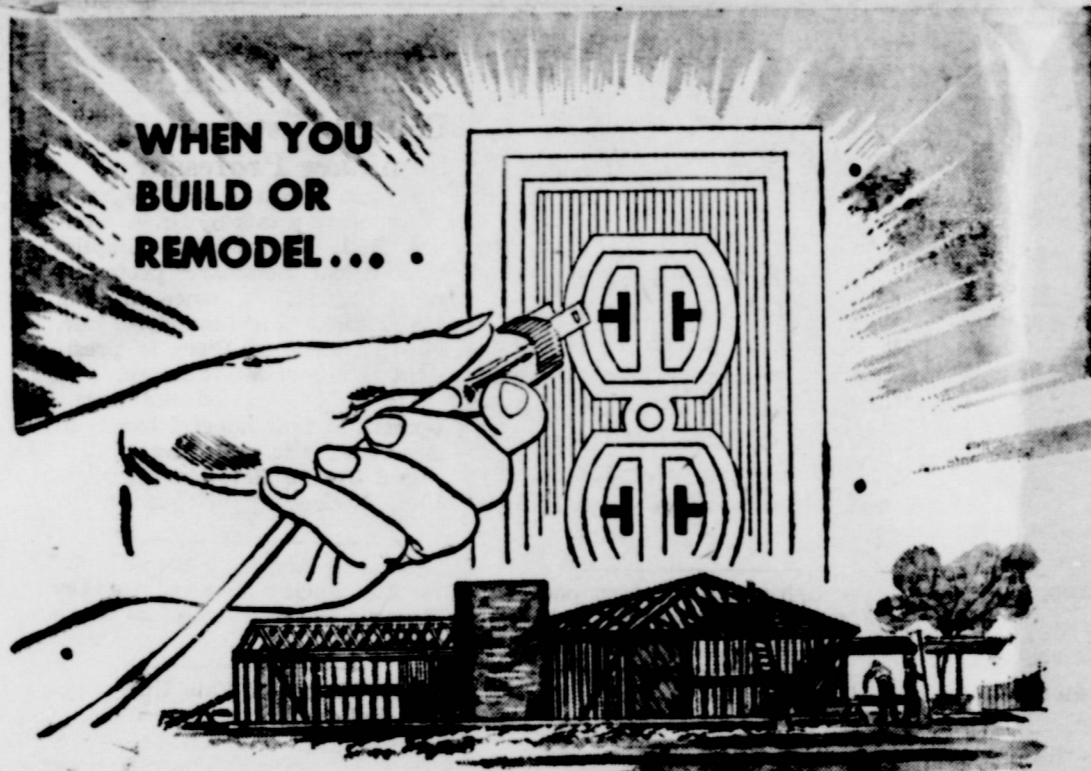

LARGE CROWD ATTENDS MEETING OF SABANNO GAME ASSOCIATION

More than 200 land owners, sportsmen and civic leaders attended a barbecue meeting of the newly organized Sabanno Valley Game Preserve Association at the Centers Point School four miles south of Carbon Tuesday night.

Robert D. Mauermon, biologist with the Texas Game Commission at San Antonio, was a guest speaker. The outlook for quail was the topic of Mr. Mauermon's talk. He offered suggestions as to feeding programs and other things the land owners can do to encourage better quail crops.

More than 30,000 acres of land have been pledged to the game preserve project, President Greenwood of Carbon reported. He added that the association expects to have 20,000 to 30,000 more acres pledged to the project.

The by-laws of the association provide that there will be no deer hunting in the preserve for a period of five years — through 1959. The land owners will abide by all state game laws and report
