"The building of athletics in a new school is a decidedly difficult task. Mosley has accomplished much in this respect and whoever might succeed him has a sturdy foundation left upon which to work.

"There are few athletic men in Texas college circles, junior or senior, who have had a wider experience or are better known than Mosley, not to mention the fact that Mosley's academic training is also of high standing, including both the bachelor's and the master's degrécs.

"His athletic career started with Abilene High School, where he participated in all phases of athletics, graduating from there in May, 1903. Abilene high was then known for its prowess in competing against the teams of Simmons College with success. The next two years found him at Decatur Baptist College, where he won his lotters both seasons in basketball and baseball. In March, 1909, he began his long period of association with Baylor University. From Baylor he took his A. B. in 1913, and his A. M. in 1915.

"As a student in Baylor, Mosley won eleven letters in four years of competition in football, basketball and baseball. One year he did not play basketball. In the summer of 1913 Mosley began his professional career on first base with the Dallas Giants of the Texas League. In the spring of 1914 Baylor brought him back as baseball coach and assistant to Football Coach Payne. 




