Bankers Reassured

Director Tines of the bureau, who is now in New York advising with bankers on the situation, holds that to a general lack of information, although he explains that the law permits them to use their discretion in all cases and to grant loans only where they believe they are needed.

He has informed the bankers there that the bonus certificates are the same as paid up insurance policies with a commercial value and have the same loaning privileges. Loans not met, he says, are redeemable within six months, with accrued interest, at the Veterans Bureau which has sufficient funds available to cover a 100 per cent default is necessary, and still have a \$100,000,000 sur-

An appeal by the American Legion to the bankers of the country to adopt a liberal attitude toward the veterans brought a reply Tuesday night from Melvin A. Traylor, pres-\$ ident of the American Bankers Association, declaring fear of red tape in collections on defaulted loans and doubt as to proper identification and signatures had caused bankers to hesitate to loan money freely on the certificates.

Other Points Involved

Traylor had been asked by John Thomas Taylor legislative representative of the Bankers Association that they "should not so soon forget the sacrifices of these men eight short years ago, from which your members among others, were the beneficiaries.'

"Impression is that the government will be hypercritical on the question of signatures and identification," the bankers' head said in reply, adding that this, in his opinion, was the "deterring factor, rather than the question of slowness of payment or tieing up of funds."

"If proper authorities can give reassuring publicity on this point," he asserted, "I am sure the attitude of the banks in general will be entirely favorable."

FEEDING COTTONSEED MEAL CHEAP, EFFECTIVE

Those who are so fortunate as to have produced a quantity of good roughage feed are best prepared to make immediate use of the dairy cow to supplant the expected returns from cotton. Even disregarding this provision, the prices of two of the South's staple feed products have reached their lowest level in years. At present prices cotton seed and cottonseed meal should be put to their maximum use, as they will not only afford two of the cheapest feeds almost immediately available, but at the same time will greatly enhance the value of the manure produced from the animals fed.

With the proper roughage feeds, and most farmers will have some corn stover, shucks, and other carbonaceous feeds, it will be entirely possible to make up a good, useful dairy cow ration with cotton seed and cottonseed meal, using these roughages to furnish the bulk. According to John Arey, dairy extension specialist of North Carolina, a cheap and reasonably efficient ration can be of cottonseed meal, making a ration ith a camera. costing approximately \$1.15 per 100 pounds. Another efficient ration can be made by mixing 100 pounds of cotton seed, 100 pounds of cottonseed meal, and 100 pounds of corn pany has moved from its present a calendar. chops at an approximate cost of \$1.40 quarters into one of the new buildper hundredweight.

Another ration, costing slightly ling on East Dale street. more or approximately \$1.50 per 100 pounds can be made by mixing 100 pounds of cotton seed, 100 pounds of cottonseed meal, 100 pounds of wheat bran, and 100 pounds of corn chops. This ration furnishes a good variety at a moderate cost. The following ration, made up of equal parts of cottonseed meal, wheat bran, and corn chops, although costing \$1.75 per 100 pounds, is not only reasonably efficient but will fill a quite widespread need. In all cases where cotton seed is specified, it should be crushed if possible, and if a reasonable exchange can be made some of the cotton seed could well be sold and the proceeds used to purchase corn chops if such is not available from the home supply.




This house may run either lengthwise or across the width of the lot. The exterior is of stained grey shingles with either a green shingled or tiled roof.


