ORDINANCE APPROVING STATEMENT OF CITY ENGINEER CONCERNING PROPERTY OWNERS AND THEIR PROPERTY ABUTTING ON DALE STREET FROM ITS INTERSECTION WITH THE WEST SOUTHERN RAILWAY RIGHT OF WAY DESCRIBED AS DISTRICT NUMBER OF THE ABILENE & STREET FROM ITS INTERSECTION WITH THE EAST LINE OF THE ABILENE & STREET FROM ITS INTERSECTION WITH THE NORTH LINE OF ALBERT STREET OF THE ABILENE & SECTION WITH THE SOUTH LINE OF DALE STREET AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WINTERS: That,

WHEREAS, Heretofore the City Council of the said City, by ordinance, directed the improvements of the above named streets, by raising, grading, and paving the same; and

That the portion of the cost of such improvements which may be assessed against such property owners and their property and owners of street and steam railways and their property respectively shall be assessed by ordinance of the said City Council, passed after notice to such owners, and other interested parties, and a hearing to them, and the said amounts, when so assessed, shall constitute a lien against the property of the said hearing to them, and the said amounts, when so assessed, shall constitute a lien against the property of the said owners in accordance with the terms of the law, and shall be declared to be a personal liability of said owners. United States Public Health Service officials have broadcast the warning that this country may expect a visitation of the influenza epidemic which is now raging in Europe. A recurrence in wartime severity is within the range of possibility, it is said. The country should profit by the warning.

Individuals may render themselves less liable to attack by influenza by putting themselves in the best of physical condition and by avoiding the special peril conditions of the disease. These include, first, a rundown condition of the body, due to excess in eating or drinking, overwork, and loss of sleep and, second, the danger that is inherent in closed areas in which a number of persons are congregated.

The human system which is in good condition and has the advantage of pure air is likely to resist influenza. Care should be taken to avoid inadequately ventilated rooms.


